STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On June 14, Governor Greg Abbott announced the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved adding Bell, Robertson, and Terrell counties to the Federal Disaster Declaration.

On June 13, Governor Abbott amended the state’s disaster declaration for severe weather and flooding, adding Hopkins and Titus counties.

On June 8, Governor Abbott announced that the FEMA has approved three additional Texas counties for the Federal Disaster Declaration for severe weather and flooding that began on April 26. With this FEMA approval of 3 new counties for Individual Assistance programs, qualifying Texans in 35 total counties are now eligible to apply for federal disaster assistance.

On June 7, Governor Abbott announced that FEMA has approved 36 additional Texas counties for the Presidential Disaster Declaration for severe weather and flooding that began on April 26. FEMA approved Individual Assistance for 5 new counties, with qualifying Texans in 32 total counties now eligible to apply. FEMA also approved Public Assistance for 31 new counties, with qualifying entities in 38 total counties now eligible to apply.

On June 5, Governor Abbott amended the state’s severe weather disaster declaration to add Bailey, Bowie, Cass, Midland, Red River, and Terrell counties, bringing the total number of counties under the disaster declaration to 117.

On June 5, Governor Abbott announced that FEMA had approved Austin, Dallas, Hockley, Kaufman, and Newton counties for FEMA's Individual Assistance programs.

On May 31, Governor Abbott announced that he added five counties to the state's disaster declaration for Texas communities impacted by recent severe weather. The counties added include Dallas, Fannin, Hockley, Lynn, and Rockwall.

Additionally, the Governor announced that FEMA has approved a request from the State of Texas to add three more counties impacted by severe weather to the Presidential Disaster Declaration. FEMA has added Bell, Henderson, and Tyler counties to become eligible for FEMA's Individual Assistance program.

On May 26, Governor Abbott signed the state's severe weather disaster declaration to add Denton, Montague, Cooke, and Collin counties, bringing the total number of counties under the disaster declaration to 106.

On May 23, Governor Abbott announced that President Biden amended the Presidential Disaster Declaration for Texas counties impacted by severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

This partial approval authorizes all categories of work under the FEMA Public Assistance program for seven designated counties to utilize grant funding for emergency work and repair or replacement of disaster-damaged public infrastructure.

The counties eligible for FEMA's Public Assistance program include Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, and Walker Counties. The Governor's request for 21 additional counties for FEMA's Public Assistance program remains under review.

Additionally, FEMA has approved the request from the State of Texas to add additional counties to the Presidential Disaster Declaration, granting eligibility for FEMA's Individual Assistance programs for those counties. Counties approved for Individual Assistance programs now include Calhoun, Eastland, Guadalupe, Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Jones, Lamar, Liberty, Montgomery, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, Walker, and Waller Counties.

On May 22, Governor Abbott announced that he has added Calhoun, Delta, Jones, and Lamar counties to the state's disaster declaration for counties impacted by severe storms and flooding that began on April 26. Additional counties may be added as damage assessments are completed.

At the Governor's direction and following a review of damage assessments in additional impacted communities which show they exceed federal criteria for disaster assistance, Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) Chief Nim Kidd has requested the addition of six counties to become eligible for FEMA

Individual Assistance programs. Those additional counties include Austin, Ellis, Kaufman, Navarro, Newton, and Tyler.

On May 20, Governor Abbott amended the disaster proclamation for severe storms and flooding to include Calhoun, Delta, Jones, and Lamar Counties.

On May 19, Governor Abbott directed TDEM to request additional counties be added to the Presidential Disaster Declaration for severe weather and flooding that began on April 26.

At the Governor's direction and following a review of damage assessments in additional impacted communities which show they exceed federal criteria for disaster assistance, TDEM Chief Nim Kidd has requested the addition of eight counties to become eligible for FEMA Individual Assistance programs. Those additional counties include Calhoun, Eastland, Guadalupe, Hardin, Jasper, Jones, Lamar, and Waller.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties)

Hockley County: As of June 6, 40,000 cubic yards of debris have been removed to temporary debris sites. On June 3, the South Plains Food Bank Mobile Food Pantry was activated and will arrive at South Plains College on June 5. On June 4, the Hockley County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activated to begin recovery operations. On June 7, FEMA approved Individual Assistance (IA) and Public Assistance (PA) for Hockley County.

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties)

Response efforts continue in Cooke County and recovery efforts have begun in Collin, Denton, and Montague Counties.

Hood County: On June 14, Lake Granbury gates were opened for a total release of 7,600 cubic feet per second (cfs).

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties)

Harris County: The city of Houston has started door-to-door wellness checks for residents on the State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) that did not respond or requested assistance.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 17 – Victoria (Includes Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Lavaca, Jackson, and Victoria Counties)

Calhoun County: On June 2, FEMA with the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) opened a Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) in the Port Lavaca branch of the Calhoun County Library.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 9 – Midland/Ft. Stockton (Includes Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler Counties)

Terrell County: On June 2, a tornado with large hail caused damage in the city of Sanderson. On June 3, a temporary debris management site was approved in Sanderson. As of June 6, the city of Sanderson has had 95 percent of its power restored, the remaining five percent of power that has not been restored are structures that have been destroyed. On June 10, lunch for affected families and volunteers was provided by H-E-B and St. James Church. The FEMA mobile DRC will arrive in Terrell County on June 11.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

Robertson County: On June 6, Lake Limestone gates were opened for a total release of 4,700 cfs.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM): Mass Care is collaborating with our Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners and locally impacted counties.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG): [TDEM Communications Coordination Group \(CCG\) has been released.](#)

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF): There are two ISTF members assigned to the SOC. As of June 7, the Transitional Shelter Assistance program has 5,938 applicants, utilizing 435 hotels with a population of 18,158.

TDEM Private Sector Coordination: TDEM continues to communicate with private sector partners in the affected areas.

Texas A&M University AgriLife Extension (AgriLife): The AgriLife SOC Liaison distributed the TCEQ Carcass Disposal Guidelines to Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Agents in the field. As of June 4, there have been 542 entries from the iSTAT portal from landowners with agricultural damages and 139 of the entries are requesting assistance from AgriLife.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX): Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT): All TX-PWRT personnel have been released for this incident.

Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): TX-TF1 resources have demobilized and TX-TF2 activated additional resources to continue SAR operations in Cooke County.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): [TAMFS resources have been released.](#)

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET): On May 15, one Type 4 VET was deployed to the Emergency Animal Shelter at the Coldspring Community Center, in San Jacinto County.

Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT): On June 6 at 3:00 PM there were 17,000 power outages reported statewide. Oncor reported 9,400 power outages and Oncor crews continue with power restoration repairs. Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) reported 3,000 power outages.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, or waste related issues, including drinking water and wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities. TCEQ staff are available to provide technical assistance and guidance on debris management and have approved 52 temporary debris management sites.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): Multiple TDCJ Agricultural Operations Units sustained bridge, fence, road, barn, levee, and crop field damage,

and a \$550,930.00 crop loss was estimated. The staff and inmate population remain unaffected by the flooding as water levels recede.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR): DIR continues to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. There are no requests for network or technology support.

Cisco has identified vulnerabilities in the Cisco security suite, such as their Adaptive Security Appliance (ASA), Firepower Management Center (FMC), and Firepower Threat Defense (FTD) software. System operators and administrators are encouraged to review the Cisco publication-3 and apply the necessary updates.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): The DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has deployed six flat water boats to Conroe. The DPS Aviation are conducting patrols in low-lying areas in search of water rescues needed and identifying high-water areas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is providing the following resources in support of severe weather affecting Texas. DPS Aviation Operations Division has four helicopter teams stationed in Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio ready to respond and DPS relocated a helicopter with hoist capabilities from Austin to Houston. Texas Highway Patrol's (THP) Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) has rescue specialists assigned to hoist capable helicopters, and flood water boats throughout the state.

Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR): TDLR sent out a press release and social media alerting customers to seek a licensed electrician for power restoration or damage repair. This includes how to find a licensed electrician on the TDLR website.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS has LNOs assigned to the SOC. DSHS is working with local entities who have submitted State of Texas Assistance Requests (STAR) for mosquito abatement and how to best meet their needs.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): As of June 7, there are 15 state-maintained roads impacted and 9 roads closed from recent storms. TxDOT has been responding to downed trees and flood conditions in the Tyler, Paris, and Atlanta districts. TxDOT is coordinating debris management with Terrell County and TCEQ, and local TxDOT crews continue with clean-up and road repairs throughout the state.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC is coordinating with local mental health and behavioral health authorities to have crisis counseling services available at DRCs. Counseling services are now available at the Harris Center, Burke Center, Bluebonnet Trails, and Spindletop DRCs.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has released the five General Support Unit (GSUs) and one General Support Unit Headquarters (GSUHQ) Team in support of the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM).

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD has assigned two liaisons to the SOC, and additional personnel and equipment are activated to respond to affected areas as needed. TPWD has performed 262 rescues, 144 evacuations, and 117 animal evacuations for 523 responses for this incident.

Federal Emergency Management Agency, Region 6 (FEMA R6): FEMA R6 announced they will open two disaster recovery centers, one in Harris County on May 24, and one in San Jacinto County on April 26, to assist residents affected by the severe weather.

American Red Cross (ARC): As of June 14, the ARC has closed the final shelter in Hockley County. The ARC has distributed 50,951 snacks and 63,488 meals. Detailed Damage Assessment (DDA) teams are supporting Individual Disaster Care (IDC) casework in multiple counties. [As of June 14, the ARC has conducted 8,991 DDA in the affected areas.](#)

Mercy Chefs: As of June 3, Mercy Chefs have provided 9,294 meals in Harris County.

Southern Baptists of Texas Convention (SBTC): A site is being set up at Central Baptist Church in Livingston to include an Incident Management Team, Cleanup and Recovery Team, and damage assessments. Additional teams on site include shower, laundry, feeding team, and refrigeration unit. As of May 31, SBTC has provided 14,878 volunteer hours, 23,920 meals, and 1,944 showers. On May 29, SBTC sent the Quick Response Feeding Unit to Levelland. On June 3, the Quick Response Feeding Unit (QRU) was sent to Sylvania Baptist Church in Smith County.

TEXANS ON MISSION (TOM): TOM has two Incident Management Teams (IMT) in Conroe and Kingwood. IMTs have provided electrical support, shower, laundry services, boxes, and meals to residents. Local flood recovery teams are in Rising Star and will have additional support coming to the area in the next few days. TOM has provided 2,219 showers, 36,968 meals, 1,522 loads of laundry, and 33,446 volunteer hours as of June 13.

The Salvation Army (TSA): On May 29, TSA mobilized their canteen food services to serve first responders in Levelland. TSA has distributed 10,193 meals, 9,483 snacks, and 7,443 drinks.
