
Level 4 of 5: NE TX, SE OK, SW AR, NW LA

- Very large hail of 2 inches or greater




Severe thunderstorms will become likely this afternoon through this evening, especially across Northeast Texas, Southeast Oklahoma, and Southwest Arkansas and extreme Northwest Louisiana. Damaging winds, very large hail, and strong tornadoes (EF2+, 111mph) will be possible with these storms.

Isolated to scattered strong to severe storms are possible late Friday into Saturday morning across the Hill Country and into portions of the I-35 corridor. Main hazards would be large hail and damaging winds.



A Few Strong Storms this Morning - More Storms East This Afternoon




Thunderstorms are expected to develop after 11 PM and quickly overspread the area overnight. Some of the storms may be severe. The severe weather threats include large hail and damaging winds, along with deadly lightning.

Scattered showers and a few thunderstorms will continue mainly across north and northwest parts of the region through midday. By this afternoon, additional scattered storms are expected with a severe threat mainly east of I-35.

Hazardous Weather



The greatest snowfall totals are expected to be across the southwest Texas Panhandle where 3 to 6 inches may fall on Saturday. Lesser amounts are expected as you go farther north and east.



There is a moderate Heat Risk today across Deep South Texas and the Rio Grande Valley with a pocket of major Heat Risk across portions of Mid-Valley into the Lower Valley. The combination of high humidity levels and very warm temperatures will result in peak heat indices ranging between 100-108F degrees along the Rio Grande Valley and portions of the Northern Ranchlands. If you are spending time outdoors, make sure to take frequent breaks in the shade and stay hydrated.






Keetch-Byram Drought Index

Keetch-Byram Drought Index


