STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On April 4, Governor Greg Abbott directed TDEM to activate additional state emergency response resources ahead of increased threats of severe weather and flash flooding in large portions of the state beginning today through the weekend, as well as snow potential in the Panhandle.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- 1. Protect life and property.
- 2. Support rapid & effective response.
- 3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- 4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties)

DDEOC 1 Amarillo: Activated to Readiness Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on April 4.

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties)

DDEOC 2 Lubbock: Activated to Readiness Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on April 4.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT crews and emergency staff are rostered and prepared to respond statewide. Crews continue clearing debris, managing drainage, repairing damaged roadways, and providing traffic control. TxDOT is supporting response efforts by staffing the State Operations Center during the activation. As of April 4, TxDOT reports nine (9) state-maintained road closures due to flooding—one (1) in Hopkins County (Region 3) near Jim Chapman Lake and eight (8) in Region 5. Several additional roadways in the Rio Grande Valley remain affected by floodwaters. Amarillo, Lubbock and Childress Districts are prepared with equipment and crews to respond to winter weather this weekend.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has prepared department resources consisting of Texas Game Wardens and State Park Police Officers ready to support as needed in response to the increased Severe Weather threat. TPWD continues to work closely with TDEM and other state/federal partners through the State Operations Center to ensure TPWD resources and first responders are available should they be needed. TPWD personnel are continuously being advised of the current weather conditions and maintaining a state of readiness.

TPWD has Texas Game Wardens and State Park Police Officers ready to support operations as needed and is currently staffing the State Operations Center during the Level II Escalated Response activation. TPWD has positioned statewide resources to support ongoing response efforts. Currently, one liaison is assigned to the State Operations Center. Assets include a helicopter based in Austin, State Game Wardens, State Park Police Officers, Search and Rescue (SAR) boat teams, as well as 4x4 vehicles and both swift water and shallow-running boats, ready for deployment as needed.

TPWD Game Wardens responded to multiple severe weather incidents, including a tornado south of Clarksville in Red River County (no injuries reported), and another tornado north of Hawkins in Wood County. TPWD Search and Rescue Teams also responded to flooding incidents in Smith and Upshur Counties. In Smith County, four individuals were reported trapped in high water, but the incident was resolved prior to arrival. In Upshur County, a man was reported trapped on the roof of his car at Lake Gilmer. While responding, a TPWD Game Warden struck a washed-out roadway, sustaining minor injuries and damaging the patrol vehicle. On April 4, TPWD teams evacuated 5 individuals and 1 pet/animal.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF): As of April 5, EMTF 7 is on awareness, while SWX Package EMTF 4 is on standby. EMTF assets currently activated in support of the severe weather response include: one SWX Package with an

Ambulance Strike Team (AST) in Cameron County, one MIST deployed to the RELLIS campus in Brazos County, one SWX Package at Hensley Field in Dallas County, and one SCO and one MIST supporting operations at the State Operations Center in Travis County.
