STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On March 20, Governor Abbott [announced](#) that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the state's request for a Fire Management Assistance Grant for the Pauline Road Fire in San Jacinto and Montgomery Counties. The approval of this Fire Management Assistance Grant makes Texas eligible for a 75 percent reimbursement from the federal government for costs associated with fighting the Pauline Road Fire. Fire Management Assistance Grants are available to states and local jurisdictions for the mitigation, management, and control of fires on publicly or privately owned forests or grasslands, which threaten such destruction and would constitute a major disaster.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties)

Comanche County: The Salt Creek fire has burned 175 acres and is 85% contained. One home is threatened due to the fire.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 19 – Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata, Counties)

Zapata County: The Rio Grande fire has burned 37 acres and is 95% contained.

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties):

Aransas County: The Salt Flats fire has burned 157 acres and is 95% contained. Eighteen homes have been lost due to the fire.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties)

Real County: The Golden Eagle fire has burned 50 acres and is 30% contained. Two homes are threatened due to the fire.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 12 – Austin (Includes Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis, and Williamson Counties)

Bastrop County: The Sayer fire has burned 4 acres and is 95% contained.

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

Grimes County: The Grind Stone fire has burned 15.3 acres and is 95% contained.

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties)

San Saba County: The Cedar Draw fire has burned 28 acres and is 60% contained. One home is threatened due to the fire.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

Communication Coordination Group (CCG): Cellular providers have optimized their systems to accommodate increased network activity in the Gillespie County area following the recent impacts.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS): The Texas A&M Forest Service continues to closely monitor fire weather conditions and has prepositioned heavy equipment, engines, and personnel—along with fixed-wing and rotor-wing aircraft.

Texas Military Department (TMD): Texas Military Department (TMD) will support Texas A&M Forest Service in suppressing wildland fires in Texas. TMD has activated one Rotary Wing Medium MRP and crew from San Antonio to support the Texas A&M Forest Service with aerial fire suppression operations in response to critical fire weather conditions. TMD has deployed two rotary wing aircraft and eight personnel in support of the incident. To date, the Rotary Wing aircraft have flown a total of 9.2 hours, conducting 49 bucket drops and delivering 30,130 gallons of water for aerial wildfire suppression.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD):

American Red Cross (ARC): The American Red Cross continues to have resources on standby to respond to humanitarian needs arising from expected severe weather and other disasters in Texas. The American Red Cross currently operates three shelters in Aransas, Bowie, and Cameron Counties, housing 18 individuals. Food and Disaster Emergency Services (DES) distribution operations are ongoing in Cameron, Pharr, and Hidalgo Counties. Additionally, the ARC has initiated client casework and is distributing Immediate Assistance to those affected.
