**STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:** On March 31, Governor Abbott [directed](#) the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request that Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) officials join state and local partners in conducting joint preliminary damage assessments in South Texas communities impacted by recent flooding. These assessments will help determine whether Texas meets the federal threshold for disaster assistance.

On March 29, Governor Greg Abbott [issued](#) a disaster declaration for four South Texas counties impacted by rainfall and flooding that continues to affect homes, businesses, and the agricultural industry throughout the region. The counties included in the Governor's declaration are Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, and Willacy. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant.

On March 26, Governor Greg Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to [activate state emergency response](#) resources ahead of increased threats of severe weather and flash flooding in large areas of the state through the weekend.

### OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

## RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

**Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):** As of April 17, SWX PKG Teams have had 328 encounters, treated 270 individuals, and have had 196 transports.

### Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD):

**American Red Cross (ARC):** The American Red Cross continues to coordinate with local emergency managers to identify unmet community needs. One shelter remains open with a population of two in Bowie County. The Cameron County shelter has closed, concluding mass care services for the Rio Grande Valley. Client casework and Immediate Assistance distribution are ongoing.

**Texans On Mission (TXM):** Operations are currently focused on reviewing and assessing work requests in preparation for the arrival of four flood recovery units. All activities will pause for Easter weekend and resume on April 21. As of April 17, TXM has processed 451 work orders, with 179 remaining. The team has completed 127 assessments, 14 tear-outs, and 15 mold remediation jobs. Additionally, TXM has provided 237 volunteer showers, 609 volunteer meals, and processed 152 loads of laundry for volunteers.
