Isolated severe storms (level 1 to 2 of 5 risk) are possible Sunday evening for the eastern half of South-Central Texas, including the Hill Country, northern I-35 corridor, and Coastal Plains. The primary threats are large to very large hail, damaging winds, and locally heavy rain.





Moisture remains in place across the Borderland, and a Pacific low pressure system is moving in from the west. This combination will increase shower and storm chances over western areas Sunday. Through the evening and overnight, Sunday night, we expect showers, and even some storms, to begin shifting east. By Monday, all areas have potential for scattered shower and thunderstorms.

Strong to severe storms possible Sunday





- → A disturbance moving down from the north will trigger showers and thunderstorms over SE Texas.
- → The first round of storms expected during the morning hours. The second round is expected during afternoon and evening hours.
- Isolated strong to severe storms will be possible across the area, with the greatest risk over areas north of I-10.



#### **Potential Impacts**

- → Damaging wind and hail
- → Locally heavy rain
- → An isolated, brief tornado cannot be ruled out



#### Actions


- Remain weather-aware, especially if having outdoor plans.

  - → Check the forecast for updates.






A disturbance will be moving down from the north on Sunday. Showers & thunderstorms expected in the morning over the Brazos Valley/Piney Woods region and should quickly dissipate as they move southward. Another stronger cluster of thunderstorms is expected to develop over portions of SE Texas in the afternoon and evening. Conditions will be favorable for this second round of storms to be strong to severe at times. Main threats are damaging winds and hail. Cannot rule out a brief isolated tornado. Some locations may also see brief periods of heavy rain.




A Marginal Risk for severe weather is in place across SE TX and parts of far SW LA today as an upper-level disturbance passes overhead. While convection will be isolated, any storms that do develop will have good potential to become severe.



Isolated thunderstorms, some severe, are forecast to develop across portions of the Caprock and the western Rolling Plains this afternoon as a cold front stalls. Some storms may be severe, capable of producing damaging wind gusts up to 60 mph and hail up to the size of the quarters. Hot temperatures are expected today, with winds becoming southeast this afternoon at around 10-15 mph.



Isolated thunderstorms are possible Sunday afternoon into the evening. Large hail and damaging winds are the main threats, along with dangerous lightning.




A Slight Risk of severe weather exists for portions of Deep East Texas today. All hazards will be possible, with the most likely hazards being large hail and damaging winds.



## **Fire Danger Forecast**




