FEMA Region 6 Weather Threat Briefing

Thursday, July 24, 2025

Disclaimer: The purpose of this briefing is to provide a <u>Regional</u> weather threat assessment and is meant as a general overview. County/Parish decision makers should consult their local NWS forecast offices for the latest detailed, local weather information.

• Flash Flooding:

- Slight risk (level 2 of 4) for flash flooding in NE NM, TX Panhandle, NW OK.
- Heavy rainfall relating a disorganized tropical disturbance continues in LA today, with LA and SETX seeing heavy rainfall late tonight, into tomorrow. Lingering, isolated heavy rain in SETX on Saturday.
- Burn Scar flash flooding in NM: Today, Major risk (level 3 of 4). Less monsoonal activity
 Friday-Saturday will lower burn scar flash flood risks to minor (level 1 of 4) to nearly none.
 Monsoonal moisture returns Sunday.
- <u>Heat:</u> Heat advisories over OK, AR, N-ETX, and N LA, with an Extreme Heat Warning for heat index temperatures of 110-115 F over portions of AR and LA.
 - Heat wave may intensify late weekend/early next week.
- <u>Tropical:</u> Low (10%) chance of development in the Gulf of America in 48 hours and 7 days. Mainly a heavy rainmaker for LA today and tomorrow, with SE Texas seeing isolated heavy rain late this evening and tomorrow.





Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall




Isolated minor river flooding in E AR continues. Rural secondary crossings, roadways, and croplands will be flooded.


Note: Numerical levels (e.g. level 1 of 4) will not be assigned to riverine flooding due to the varying levels of impacts across flood categories.

Marginal risk (level 1 of 5) for severe storms in NE NM,TX Panhandle,W OK.







Watches, Warnings, and Advisories

Flash Flood Watch over Ruidoso from 1-7 PM CDT. Rainfall rates up to 3" per hour.












Monitoring for heavy rainfall in NM, Far W TX.












Heat Risk across OK, AR, ETX, LA.










