STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On July 30, Governor Greg Abbott announced 10 additional Texas counties have been added to President Donald J. Trump's Major Disaster Declaration following recent flooding across the state. Those counties include Edwards, Guadalupe, Kimble, Lampasas, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Reeves, Schleicher, and Sutton.

On July 24, Governor Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request Real County be added to President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration following the recent catastrophic flooding that impacted communities across the state.

On July 23, Governor Abbott updated his disaster declaration following recent catastrophic flooding across Texas to include Edwards, Kinney, Real, and Schleicher counties, bringing the total to 30 counties. Additionally, the Governor directed TDEM to request that additional counties be added to President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration.

On July 22, Governor Abbott thanked his fellow Governors across the country for providing critical emergency response and recovery resources to Texas following a request for support after devastating flooding across the state.

On July 19, Governor Abbott announced that the federal government has updated President Trump's Major Disaster Declaration to include Hamilton and Travis counties in response to the recent flooding across Texas.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 18 – New Braunfels (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties):

On July 6, DDEOC 18 activated to Level III.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM): Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

As of July 19, CCG partners across the public, private and volunteer sectors continue to assess the situation and adjust their response, as necessary. Cellular providers have provided cellphone charging accessories that include wall and car charging adapters, portable batteries, and headlamps. T-Mobile has provided a Command Trailer to support operations at the Unified Command Center. The Mobile Connectivity Center (MCC) provided by AT&T will remain at the Hunt Store located at 1634 TX-39, from 10:00AM to 3:00PM.

The Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) SOC Support team continues to provide Auxiliary Communications (AUXCOM) support for the CCG. The team provides coordination of Amateur Radio field operations as well as resource tracking of CCG assets. Due to the stability in overall communications, the plan is to reduce the size of the Communications Team supporting the Incident Management Team (IMT).

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

As of July 31, the ISTF continues to assist jurisdictions across the state through coordination and resource alignment. Demobilization efforts have begun. To date, a total of 55 ISTF members have deployed, providing support in Burnet, Kerr, San Saba, Tom Green, Travis, and Williamson counties.

Mass Care:

Sheltering:

As of July 31, there are 12 operational shelters across the affected areas in Texas, with a population of 233 people and 32 pets.

Feeding:

As of July 31, over 585,563 hot meals have been served across multiple counties through the support and collaboration of our feeding partners; Operation BBQ Relief,

The Salvation Army, Mercy Chefs, Southern Baptist Men, World Central Kitchen, H-E-B, Feeding Texas, and the American Red Cross.

Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) is supporting efforts at the reunification centers (Team Rubicon, Global Empowerment Mission, Convoy of Hope, ITDRC).

The ISTF Voluntary Agency Liaison (VAL) team remains actively engaged in community response efforts, including volunteer and donations management, residential debris cleanup, and survivor services. Support is being provided across multiple sites such as Family Assistance Centers (FACs), Multi-Agency Resource Centers (MARC), Volunteer Reception Centers (VRCs), and Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC). Coordination continues to be a priority to align efforts, close service gaps, and advance long-term recovery goals. A Volunteer Reception Center is located at 855 Hays St., Kerrville, TX Disaster Funds:

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

As of July 31, there are seven Damage Assessment and Recovery (DAR) personnel activated. There were 490 entries from the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal from landowners with agricultural damage to fencing, crops, livestock, and equipment and 170 of those are requesting assistance from AgriLife. DAR Specialists and County Extension Agents (CEA) are assigned to the DRCs. DRC representatives have provided Ag recovery information to over 470 landowners.

One DAR Specialist and the TAMU VET demobilized and returned to College Station. Another DAR Specialist transferred to Kerrville to support staging operations. There are three DAR logistics personnel positioned at the Lancer TDEM warehouse in San Antonio. Five AgriLife DAR specialists will remain in Kerr County to support staging operations.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Public Works Response Team (PWRT):

As of July 22, all PWRT resources have demobilized, except for the SOC Liaison.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):

On July 31, Search and Rescue (SAR) missions continue in the Guadalupe River basin searching the debris piles and line steep elevation areas using K9s as needed. There are Four Swift Water Rescue boat squads positioned in Amarillo, Lubbock, Childress, and Wichita Falls due to the forecast of severe weather.

On July 23, resources continued search and rescue missions in the Guadalupe River Basin. Three K9 HRD teams, one from California, one from Wisconsin, and one from

South Carolina demobilized. Two SWR boat squads shifted from TDEM Region 7 to TDEM Region 1 due to the forecast of severe weather. Four additional SWR boat squads were activated to be positioned in TDEM Regions 3, 4, and 8 on July 24.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

As of July 31, a total of 134 personnel has been committed to this event. Two TAMFS squads are assisting with search and recovery operations. TAMFS has deployed one Skid Steer, five Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) Strike Teams in Kerr County, two mobile command posts, and two Heavy Equipment Bosses (HEQB). Additionally, the TAMFS EOC is staffed with multiple personnel assigned to state IMTs, and a Critical Incident Stress Management Team for first responder mental health support.

Department of Information Resources (DIR):

DIR is continuing to monitor the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified. The Texas.gov homepage banner has been updated to include flood recovery resources and a link to the Kerr County Flood Relief Fund.

Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC):

As of July 12, the PUC reported no significant power outages. One LNO remains assigned to the SOC and will support 24-hour operations if needed.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC):

Fourteen of TABC's Special Response Team (SRT) members are working alongside Texas DPS and TPWD in checkpoint, and search and recovery operations. Twenty SRT members remain on standby and are ready to respond if needed. Additional law enforcement personnel are available if more are needed if all SRT resources are used.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has staff available to respond to any air, water, and waste-related issues. TCEQ has authorized 17 temporary debris management sites.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

TDA is staffing shifts at the SOC to monitor unmet needs in the agricultural community. The free, confidential Agri-Stress Helpline offers 24/7 support via call or text for those experiencing stress or loss. Staffed by trained professionals, it serves the agriculture, forestry, and fishing sectors, providing support and referrals to local mental health resources. So far, it has helped over 285 Texans in 114 counties. Call or text 1-833-897-2474 for assistance.

TDA's Hay Hotline is open for those wishing to donate hay. Donors can register at <https://texasagriculture.gov/Home/Production-Agriculture/Hay-Hotline> and will be contacted if requests are received.

TDA's State of Texas Agriculture Relief (STAR) Fund is accepting applications from those who suffered agricultural losses due to the recent weather event. Funds may be used for rebuilding fences, restoring operations, and other disaster-related costs. Applicants in counties included in the Texas Governor's disaster declaration have 90 days from the proclamation date to apply. The deadline is November 4, 2025, at 11:59 p.m. Apply at <https://texasagriculture.gov/Home/Production-Agriculture/Disaster-Assistance/STAR-Fund/Severe-Weather>.

Through the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP), TDA food bank contractors distribute USDA-donated food to emergency feeding organizations. Texans can access this food via on-site meals or take-home packages.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

As of July 19, DPS continues assisting Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1) search teams with searches along the river and tributaries in Region 6. The Driver License Division's disaster recovery mobile unit was requested to assist with issuing replacement identification. Over 300 DPS personnel are actively working in coordination with local, state, and federal partners in search and recovery efforts, assisting at evacuation shelters, reunification centers, and providing security.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

As of July 31, there have been 1,748 vaccines provided to first responders, 876 Tdap and 872 Hepatitis A. A Wildland Paramedic Unit (WPU) was added to support SAR operations with two paramedics, a truck and trailer, and ATV. On July 26 Public Health Region (PHR) 8 assigned personnel and assets to Grimes Funeral Home along with the Texas Funeral Directors Association who continue to support operations with three personnel. DSHS is coordinating with TDEM on decontamination and demobilization of all assets located at the Grimes Funeral Home; PPE and body bags have been returned to the TDEM warehouse in San Antonio. All trailers are expected to be offsite by the end of day on July 28. Decontamination of the funeral home should be completed by July 30. The Peer Support Team in Kerr County has demobilized.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):

Search and recovery operations continued with ESF-9 assets and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Support in Kerr and Burnet Counties. Texas Mass Fatality Operations Response Team (TMORT) personnel were demobilized. The total patient contacts for this activation are 19,626 encounters, 450 treated, 194 transported.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

As of July 29, TxDOT had five locations on state-maintained roads closed due to flood damage. TxDOT liaisons are meeting daily with TDEM, TCEQ, and local authorities to coordinate debris management. As of July 28, TxDOT debris contractors have hauled over 33,800 cubic yards of debris from state-maintained right-of-ways in Kerr County.

As of July 22, TxDOT has contracted pilots to fly fixed-wing aircraft to re-map Cow

Creek and Post Oak Creek to aid in recovery efforts. TxDOT is also coordinating to contract a pilot to map 100 miles of Guadalupe River to aid recovery efforts. TxDOT crews and contractors continue to clear debris and perform road, pavement, and bridge repairs in the flood impacted areas. TxDOT is coordinating to build pad sites for an approved temporary debris site in Kerr Co. TxDOT has received over 80 requests to inspect bridges.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

As of July 25, one Other Needs Assistance (ONA) member has been deployed to each of the Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC) located in Burnet, Georgetown, Hunt, Kerrville, Leander, San Angelo, and San Saba.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

[As of July 31, TMD has activated 88 personnel, seven vehicles, and three aircraft in support of our state partners.](#) TMD has activated 1.5 Rotary Wing Medium Mission Ready Package (MRP), and a Rotary Wing Heavy MRP. There is an SOC Support Team in Austin, a Search and Extraction (SAE) MRP, Fatality Search and Recovery (FSRT) MRP, and a General Support Unit have been deployed to provide support for search and recovery operations.

Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA):

TDHCA is actively supporting the state's response to the severe weather event by supporting its community action agency partners at the local level and coordinating resources with HUD at the federal level.

The following partners are collaborating with local officials to identify and assist impacted households with immediate food/gas/hotel needs.

- Tom Green County: Concho Valley Community Action Agency
- Kerr County: Community Council of South-Central Texas
- Guadalupe County: Community Council of South-Central Texas
- San Saba County: Hill Country Community Action Association

American Red Cross (ARC):

As of July 31, there are 12 ARC-managed shelters in Burnet, Kimble, Tom Green, and Williamson counties. ARC has provided [237](#) meals in Tom Green and Williamson counties with 148 clean-up kits.

ARC continues delivering support to families of the hospitalized, missing, or deceased at the Kerrville Family Assistance Center (FAC). Personnel staffed the DRC with support for canteen operations, Individual Disaster Care (IDC), and webform enrollment. In Tom Green, Kimble, and Williamson Counties, ARC continued Shelter Resident Transition (SRT) casework, and feeding operations. [The Virtual Family Assistance Center \(VFAC\) is operating daily from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM to provide support to families of individuals who are deceased, missing, or hospitalized.](#)

The Salvation Army (TSA):

The TSA is supporting feeding operations and Emotional and Spiritual Care in Ingram (City West Church). In Kerrville, the San Antonio Canteen is at the Wal-Mart providing drinks, snacks, and distributing relief supplies. A volunteer reception center is set up in the Kerrville Social Services Building. The San Angelo canteen is at Hargraves Auto and is serving first responders and survivors. The Big Lake RRU are patrolling neighborhoods to provide food, hydration, and snacks. TSA has provided 6,877 meals, 32,366 drinks, 27,691 snacks, 1,438 hygiene kits, 1,066 clean up kits, 324 cleaning supplies, and 1,229 articles of clothing.

Southern Baptists of Texas Convention Disaster Relief (SBTC):

SBTC responded to two locations in the recent Central Texas Floods: Kerrville and Leander. In Kerrville, a Quick Response Feeding Unit (QRU), IMT, chaplains, shower/laundry units, and assessors are operational at First Baptist Church Kerrville. In Leander, a laundry unit deployed in support of TDEM Point of Distribution (POD) at Round Mountain Baptist Church. SBTC has provided 19,250 volunteer hours, 1,682 ministry contacts, and 14,166 meals.

Texans on Mission (TXM):

On July 27, TXM stood down operations in Kerrville and San Angelo. TXM provided 21,777 volunteer hours, prepared 6,339 meals, 205 assessments, and 282 heavy equipment hours.
