# FEMA Region 6 Weather Threat Briefing

Wednesday, August 20, 2025

**Disclaimer:** The purpose of this briefing is to provide a <u>Regional</u> weather threat assessment and is meant as a general overview. County/Parish decision makers should consult their local NWS forecast offices for the latest detailed, local weather information.

# Summary

- <u>Severe Storms:</u> Marginal risk (level 1 of 5) of severe storms across west-central-eastern Texas and Louisiana today and tonight. Main hazard will be localized downburst winds and brief heavy rain.
- Flash Flooding: Marginal risk (level I of 4) for much of FEMA 6 region today and W NM, C-S TX, and C-S LA tomorrow.
  - NM Burn Scars: Persistent monsoonal activity leads to a Moderate risk (level 2 of 4) of flash flooding for Ruidoso/Sacramento complex this afternoon and evening.
  - The threat for both areas will decrease Thursday and Friday. Additional rain activity over the weekend will bring moderate risk back to HPCC burn scar complex.
- <u>Heat:</u> Hazardous heat continues across SE OK, AR, NETX, and N LA today. Heat index up to 109 degrees. Relief from the heat is expected during the second half of the week.
- <u>Tropical</u>: Hurricane Erin continues to move north across the western Atlantic Ocean. No impacts to FEMA Region 6.
  - Two disturbances in the Atlantic, one with medium (60%) chance and another with a low (30%) chance of development are not expected to bring impacts to FEMA 6 in the next 7 days.







Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall







significant wind gusts (≥ 74 mph)








Heat Advisory in effect across SE OK, AR, NE TX, N LA. Heat index values of 105-109 degrees.










#### Tomorrow's Tornado & Severe Wind / Hail Probabilities












