
Seven-Day Graphical Tropical Weather Outlook











Heavy Rain May Lead to Localized Flooding Tonight

Potential for Flooding due to Heavy Rainfall



Stronger storms this afternoon through this evening may produce heavy rainfall. Additional persistent rainfall may occur through the overnight hours.

Due to a few rounds of rainfall possible from this afternoon through Monday morning, there will be the potential for localized flooding during this time frame. The highest potential for seeing the heavy rainfall is across the northeastern Panhandles from late this evening through early Monday morning.







Keetch-Byram Drought Index


