



Post-Tropical Cyclone or Remnants








Thunderstorm chances are high with numerous storms forecast to develop and move into West Texas late today and tonight. The risk for excessive rainfall includes all of the South Plains, the Rolling Plains, and the far southern Panhandle. Hourly rain rates between 1-2 inches per hour will be common, with up to 3 inches per hour possible. A few storms may be severe.

Rain chances will increase this morning from west to east across our area. The highest chances are during the overnight hours tonight.



Widespread showers and thunderstorms will overspread much of the area this morning. Additional showers and storms will develop during the afternoon, with the best chances across Central Texas. Heavy rain, gusty winds, and frequent lightning will be the main threats with any of the activity today. Cloudy skies will keep temperatures mostly in the 80s, though portions of Central Texas will likely climb into the low 90s.



Unsettled Weather Today Into The Labor Day Holiday

Key Messages

- Widespread showers and thunderstorms are expected once again today as a boundary lingers over the region.
- Tropical moisture already situated over the area is going to combine with this boundary, resulting in very efficiently raining showers/storms.
- Rain chances decrease slightly Sunday and Monday as the front begins washing out. However, any cells that do develop will have the same opportunity for heavy rainfall / high rain rates.
- Some locally heavy downpours with high rainfall amounts in a short period of time may occur today into Labor Day, bringing a potential for localized nuisance-type flooding.



Weather Map Today into the Holiday Weekend



A slow-moving frontal boundary from the north will collide with a surge of deep Gulf moisture to produce widespread showers and thunderstorms Friday then lingering into weekend. There is the potential for some strong thunderstorm wind gusts on Friday and for some heavy downpours with this activity Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.






Burn Ban




