#### • Flash Flooding:

- Marginal risk (level I of 4) today over NM,W and STX, OK; NM and EAR on Tuesday; W NM
   Wednesday/Thursday and much of NM on Friday.
- NM Burn Scars: Moderate risk (level 2 of 4) today with a slight to moderate risk (levels 1-2 of 4) into Thursday.

#### • Tropical:

Eastern Atlantic has a low chance (30%) for development in the next 7 days. No impacts in the next 7 days.





Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall




Minor flooding along the Navasota River above Groesbeck and along the **Cowleech Fork Sabine River at** Greenville this morning. Flooding of rural roads expected.










S-Cntrl TX through noon today.











### Drought Monitor











