FEMA Region 6 Weather Threat Briefing

Monday, September 29, 2025

• Flash Flooding:

- Marginal risk (level 1 of 4) over S NM today.
- NM Burn Scars: Major (level 3 of 4) today in the south and Moderate (level 2 of 4) in the north.

Tropical Weather:

- Hurricane Humberto is expected to remain out in the Atlantic Ocean and not impact FEMA 6.
- Tropical Storm Imelda is forecast to move northward and strengthen into a hurricane on Tuesday.
 Track forecast has high confidence in a turn to the east on Tuesday. FEMA 6 impacts are not expected over the next week.





Note: Even though the image displays 5 days of forecasted rainfall, river forecasts only include 1-2 days of rainfall







Today's Tornado & Severe Wind / Hail Probabilities









Flood Watch over the Ruidoso burn scar area for this afternoon/evening. Rainfall rates up to 1" per hr.












Tomorrow's Tornado & Severe Wind / Hail Probabilities





"Day 3-7" Hazards Outlook








