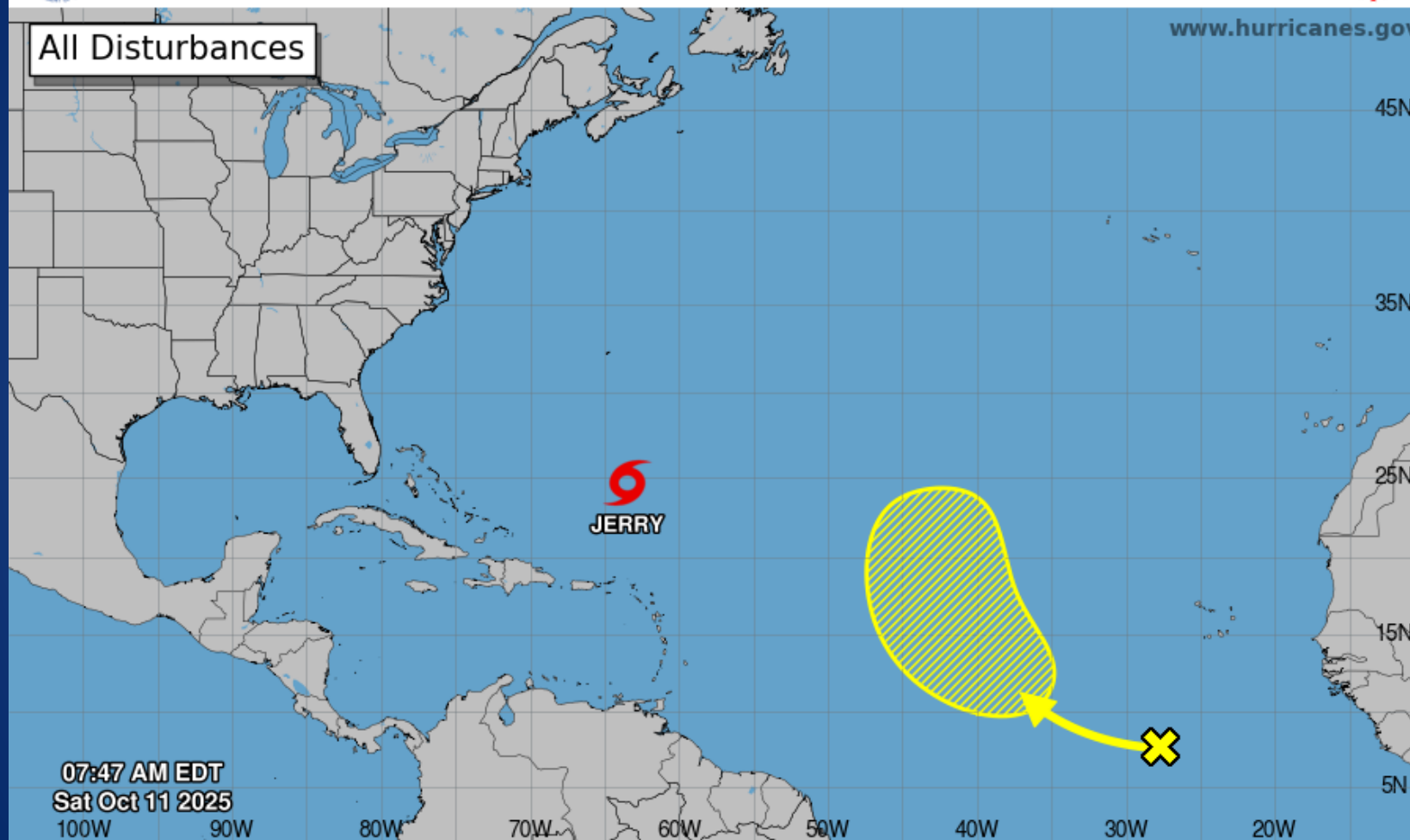
Seven-Day Graphical Tropical Weather Outlook

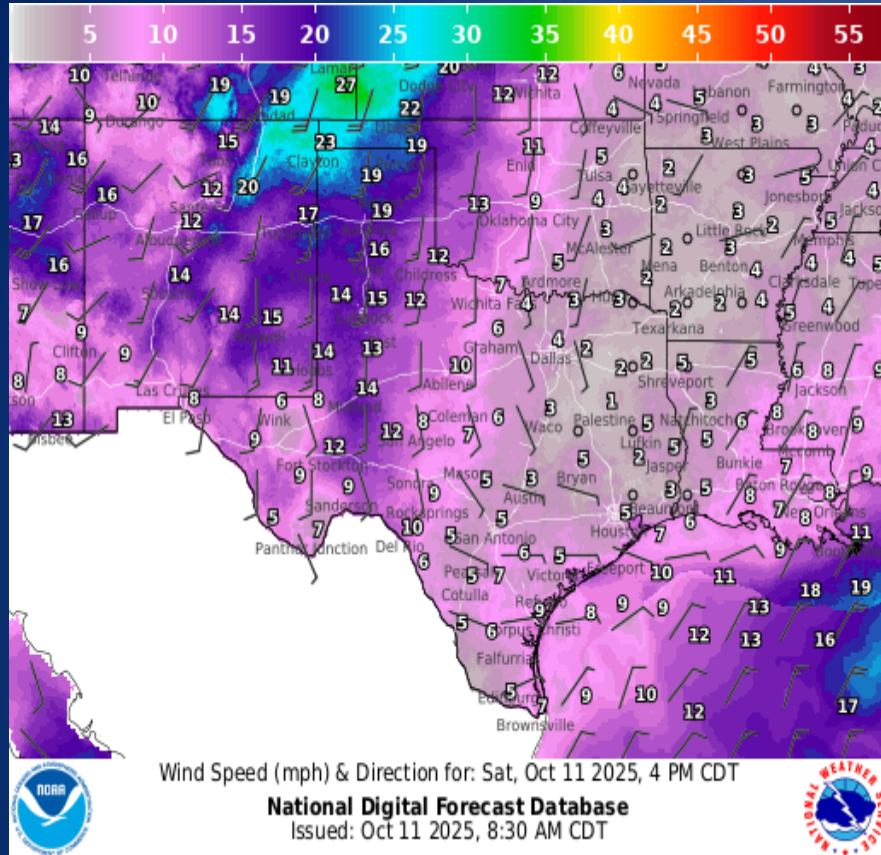

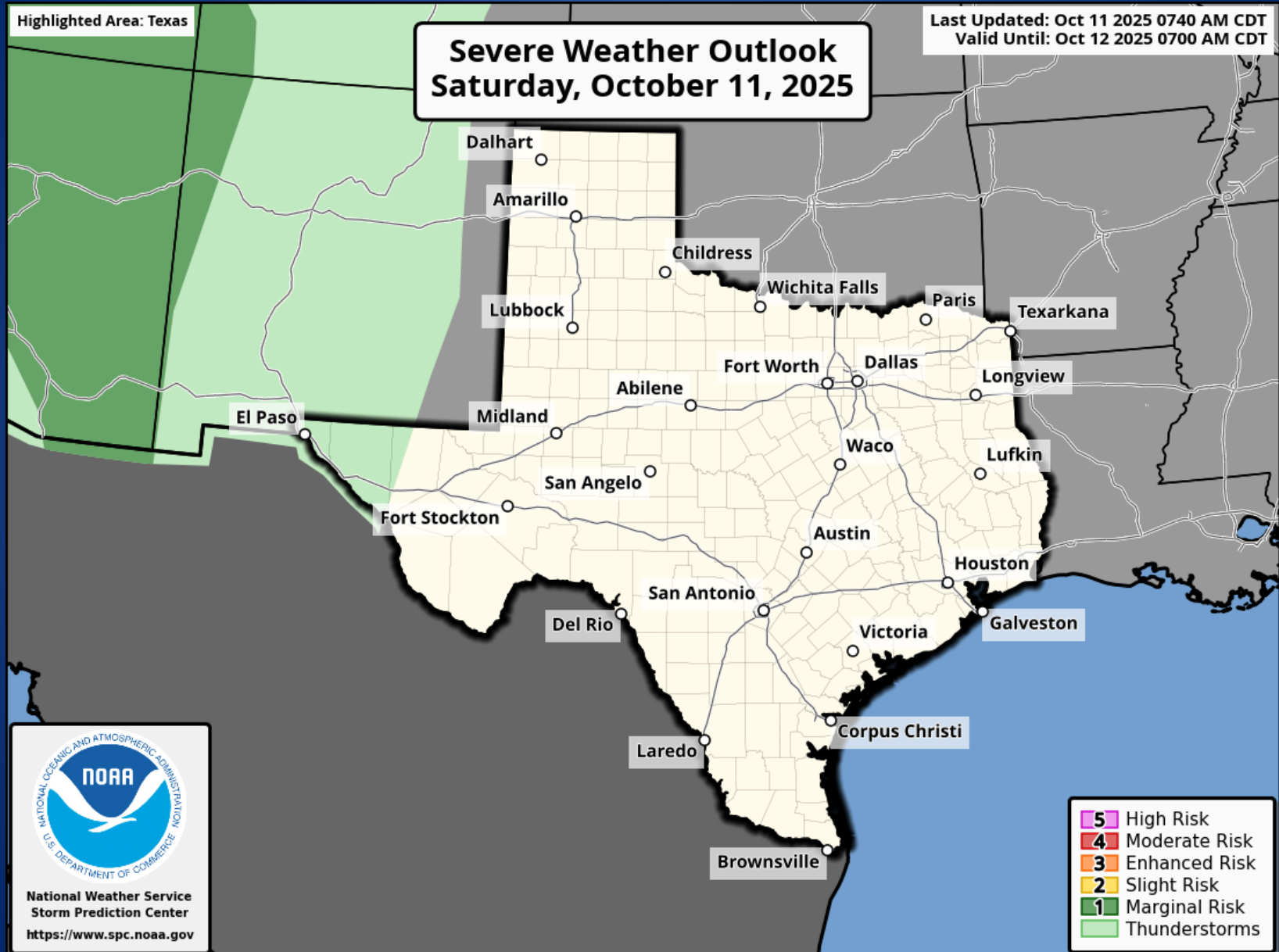

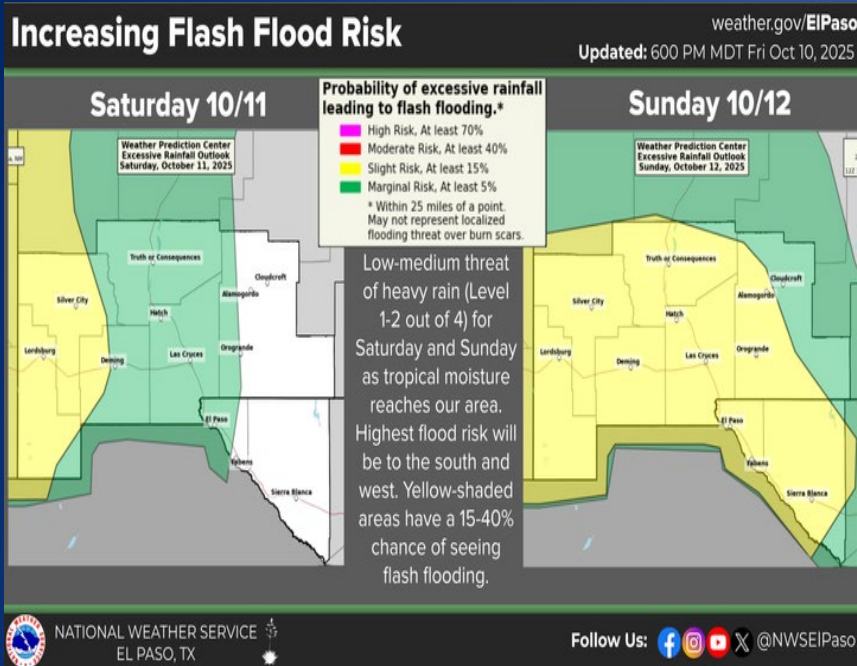

Increasing Flash Flood Risk



We will see record atmospheric moisture levels this weekend, peaking Saturday night. With that comes the potential for excessive rainfall, resulting in local flooding and flash flooding, especially on Sunday. Locations along and south of the I-10 corridor west of El Paso are most likely to see heavy rainfall through Sunday.

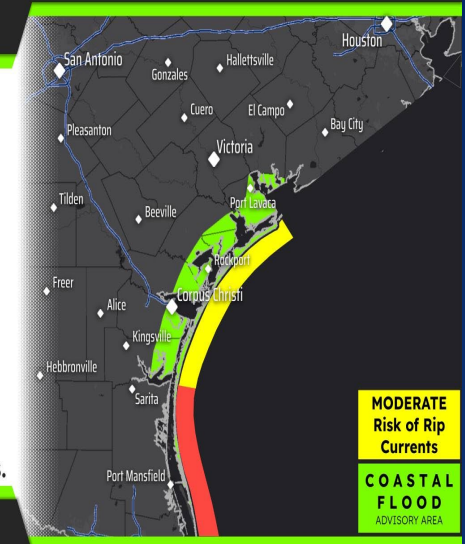

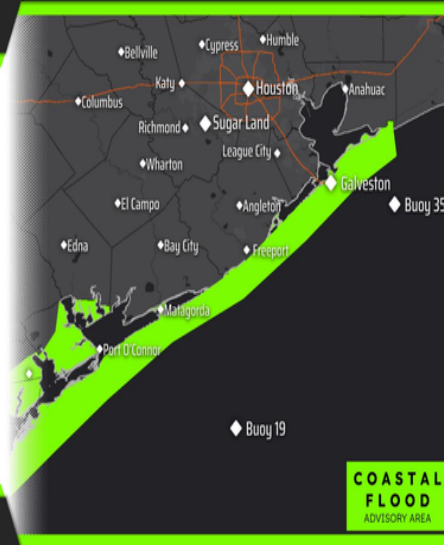

Hazardous Weather

Increased Risk For Fires This Weekend



Key Messages

- Elevated fire weather conditions are expected each afternoon (Saturday and Sunday).
- Breezy winds from the south at 10 to 20 mph will combine with low relative humidities.
- Conditions will allow fires to spread more easily.



Safety Precautions

- Make sure chains are not dragging from vehicles
- Don't drive on dry grass
- Avoid outdoor burning

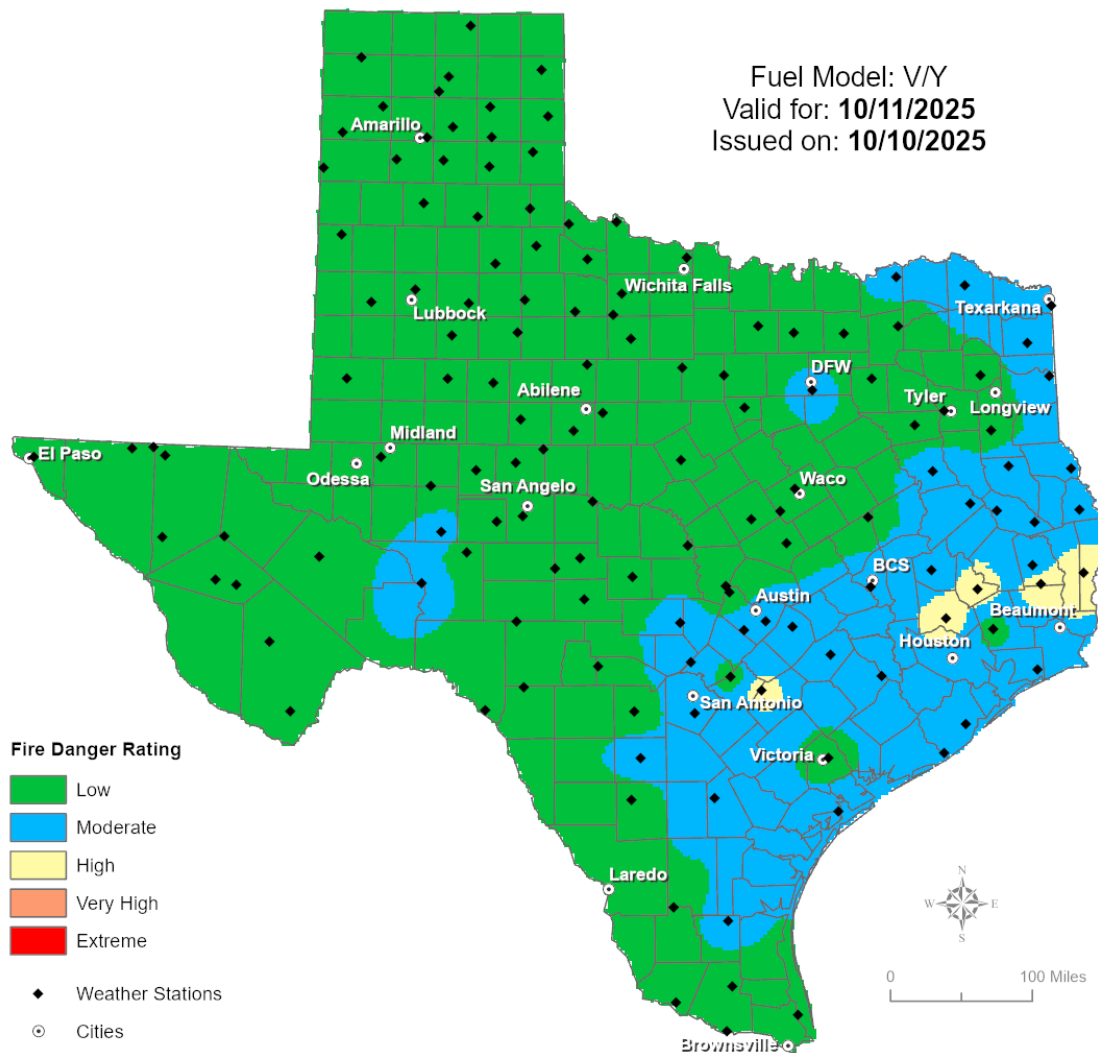

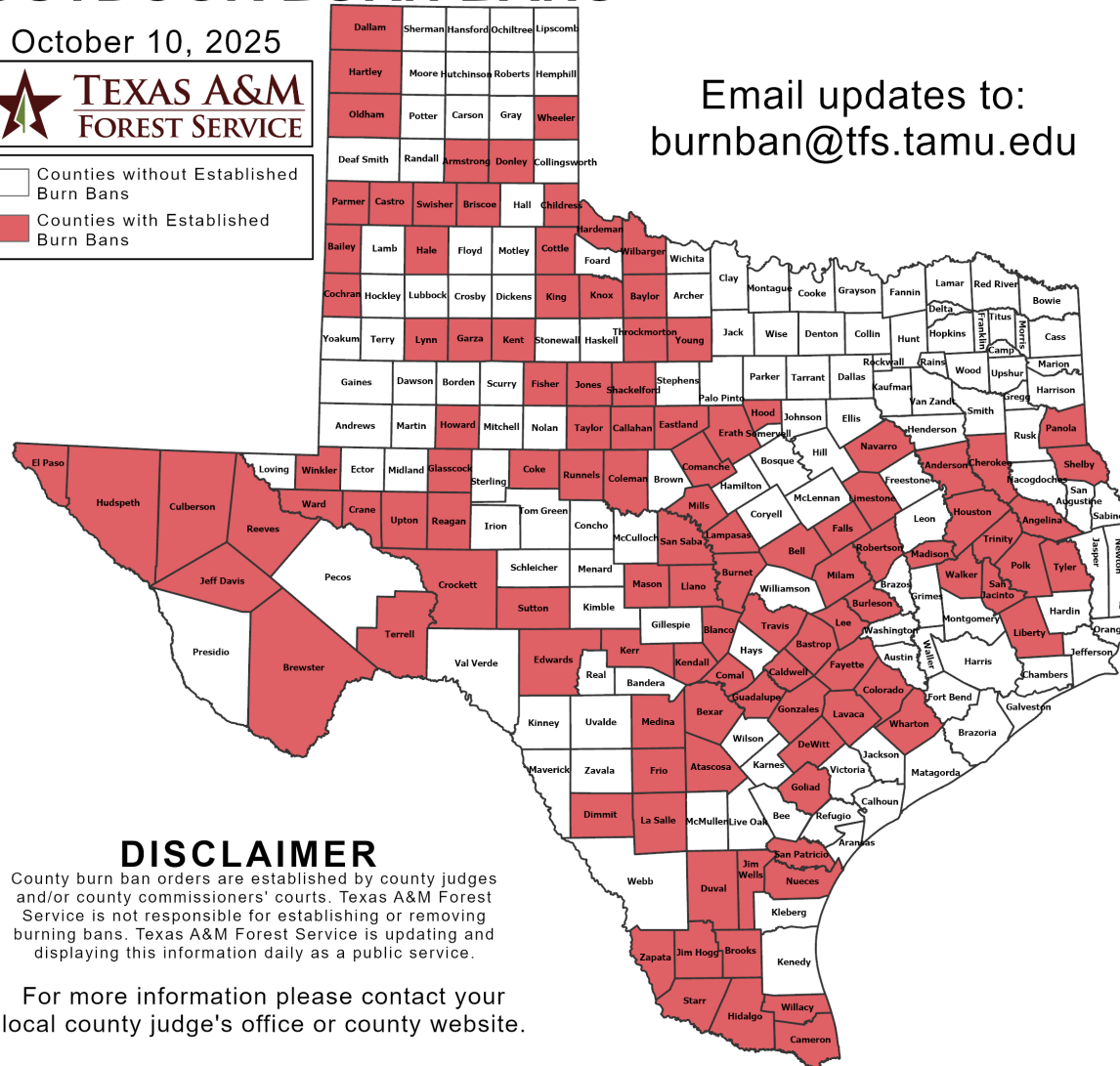

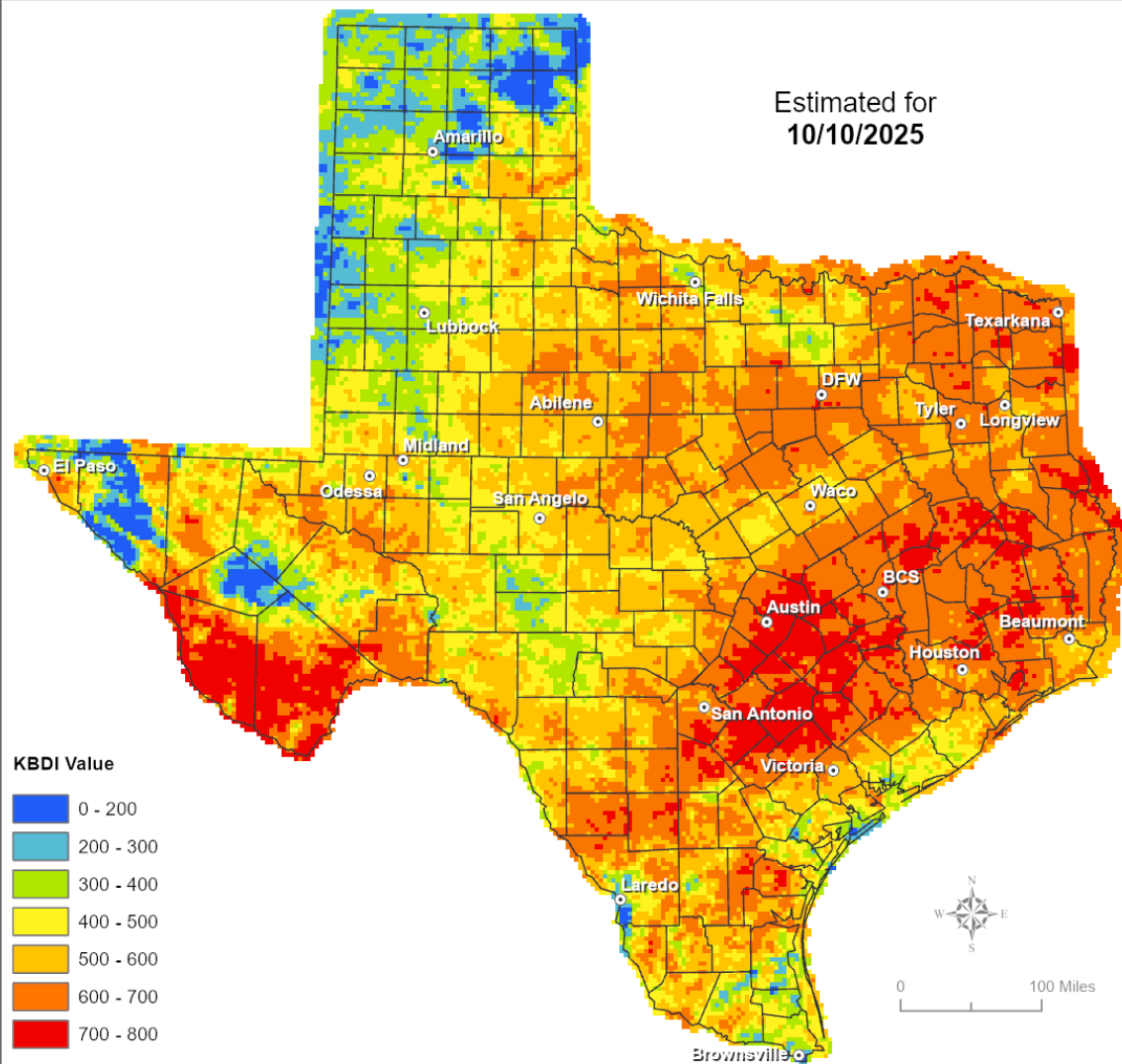

Keetch-Byram Drought Index

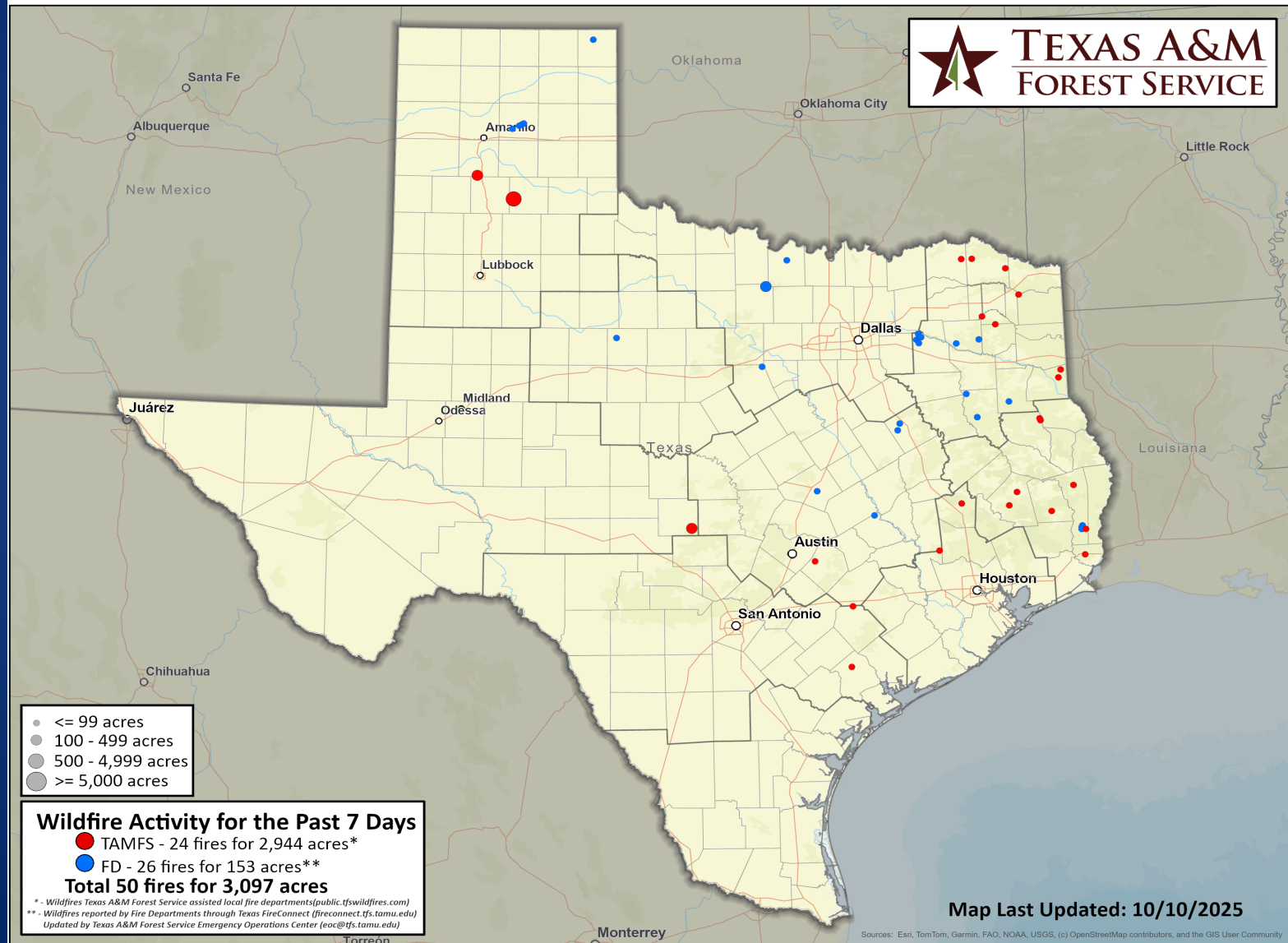
