STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On March 18, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a request from the State of Texas for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the Corner Pocket Fire in Donley County, which threatened and damaged homes and infrastructure in the Texas Panhandle and forced local evacuations.

On March 9, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster proclamation related to fire weather conditions that began on August 10, 2025, as amended and renewed in subsequent proclamations, certifying that increased fire weather conditions pose an imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property.

On February 19, Gov. Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a request from the State of Texas for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the 8 Ball Fire that started in Armstrong County and entered Donley County, which has threatened homes and infrastructure in the Panhandle area and has prompted local evacuations.

On February 17, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to increase the readiness level of the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to Level II (Escalated Response) ahead of critical wildfire danger anticipated across portions of the western half of Texas.

On February 15, Gov. Abbott announced that he directed TDEM to activate additional state wildfire response resources in anticipation of elevated-to-critical fire weather conditions in large areas of South, West, and Northwest Texas.

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OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 1 [returned to Level IV \(Normal Operations\) on March 23.](#)

Armstrong County: Bright Lights Fire burned 251 acres and is 100% contained.

Potter County: [Dusty Ridge Fire has burned 26 acres and is 100% contained.](#)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties) [DDEOC 2 returned to Level IV \(Normal Operations\) on March 23.](#)

Motley County: Alamosa Fire burned 92 acres and is 100% contained.

Hockley County: Oklahoma Flat Fire burned 198 acres and is 100% contained.

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties) [DDEOC 7 returned to Level IV \(Normal Operations\) on March 23.](#)

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties)

Cottle County: Moon Camp Fire burned 164 acres and is 100% contained.

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, Wise Counties)

Erath County: Motorcycle (Erath 2901) Fire has burned 7 acres and is 100% contained.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties)

Cass County: Cass 2941 Fire burned 2 acres and is 100% contained. Cass 2959 Fire burned 1 acre and is 100% contained. [Cass 2999 Fire burned 5 acres and is 100% contained.](#)

Lamar County: Lamar 2949 Fire burned [40 acres](#) and is 100% contained. Mustang Creek Fire burned 30 acres and is 100% contained. [Lamar 3024 Fire has burned 25 acres and is 25% contained.](#)

Bowie County: [Bowie 3026 burned 1 acre and is 0% contained.](#)

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties)

Camp County: Camp 2882 Fire burned 5 acres and is 100% contained.

Cherokee County: Cherokee 2943 Fire burned 15 acres and is 100% contained.

Harrison County: Harrison 2922 Fire burned 7 acres and is 100% contained.

Henderson County: Henderson 2932 Fire has burned [24 acres](#) and is [100% contained.](#) Henderson 2877 Fire burned 35 acres and 100% contained.

Panola County: Panola 2930 Fire burned 6 acres and is 100% contained.

Rusk County: Rusk 2869 Fire burned 14.1 acres and is 100% contained.

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties)

Orange County: Orange 2883 Fire burned 1.53 acres and is 100% contained.

Sabine County: Sabine 2924 Fire burned 1.54 acres and is 100% contained.

Tyler County: Tyler 2842 Fire burned 4.5 acres and is 100% contained.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties)

Kenedy County: Armstrong Oaks Fire burned 2,245 acres and is [100% contained](#).

San Patricio County: Highway 89 Fire burned 25 acres and is [100% contained](#).

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 12 – Austin (Includes Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis, and Williamson Counties)

Bastrop County: Spring Pine Fire has burned [46 acres](#) and is [85% contained](#).

Williamson County: Williamson 2948 Fire burned 0.25 acres and is [100% contained](#).

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties)

Bell County: Indian Pass Fire burned 1.2 acres and is 100% contained.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

Cellular providers continue to monitor tower sites and top off backup generators. Backup cellular platforms are on standby to deploy.

Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

Mass Care:

Mass Care continues to monitor potential activities and provide sporadic feeding support. As of February 20, four feeding sites have provided a total of 1,115 meals in partnership with American Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Education:

TDEM maintains communications with public university systems, who confirmed they are monitoring the weather and have no disruptions to their normal operations.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Public Works Response Team (TX/PWRT):

PWRT continues to support and coordinate operations from the SOC and are monitoring requests for service.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

On February 22, AgriLife conducted fencing damage assessments and monitoring needs with local landowners in affected counties. On February 23, the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Animal Evacuation and Response Team demobilized and returned to headquarters.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS has pre-positioned heavy equipment, engines, and aircraft across regions impacted by elevated fire weather conditions. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is activated. Out-of-State personnel and equipment are integrated with TAMFS in aviation support, field operations, and other support roles to augment State resources. A targeted public awareness campaign is being conducted in the Panhandle region to include billboard messaging and outreach through local and regional news media. In total, TAMFS has 661 personnel committed to this event including eight Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) Strike Teams and six Out-of-State Strike Teams.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

TMD has activated one Rotary Wing Medium (RWM) Mission Ready Package (MRP) consisting of two UH-60s, to provide direct aerial fire support to TAMFS. TMD has activated 12 personnel for this event.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

Texas Game Wardens have responded to multiple wildfires in TDEM Region 1 and supported local Law Enforcement with evacuations for the 8-Ball, Lavender, and Spade wildfire, along with traffic control. In total, TPWD has assisted 100 people in evacuation.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

As of March 4, there were no roadways closed or impacted due to weather or wildfires. TxDOT has an Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) and a State Operations

Center (SOC) Liaison Officer (LNO) supporting in Austin. TxDOT continues to coordinate with Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS) for Dynamic Message Sign (DMS) wildfire messaging, if needed.

Up to date road conditions are available on drivetexas.org.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

DSHS provided an Emergency Medical Taskforce (EMTF) State Coordination Officer (SCO), and a DSHS Liaison Officer (LNO) for this event. The DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at limited activation and supporting the response. Two additional Wildland Fire Medical Support Units (WLFS) and one Wildland Paramedic Unit (WPU) have been deployed to Lubbock and Childress Counties. All WLFS resources have been extended through April 2.

Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):

EMTF has Wildland Fire Support (WLFS) Packages (PKG) and All Hazard Packages activated and prepositioned for increased Fire Weather conditions across the State. 67 personnel and 41 assets are assigned. All WLFS Packages have been extended to April 3, and All Hazard Packages have been extended to March 23. [All Hazard Package Charlie has been extended until March 29.](#)

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of severe weather conditions on February 17 and will remain for the duration of the incident.

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR):

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

The State of Texas Agriculture Relief (STAR) Fund has been activated to support farmers and ranchers affected by wildfires. Ranchers needing hay or feed can use TDA's Hay Hotline at (877) 429-1998. Mental health support is available 24/7 through the AgriStress Helpline by trained professionals familiar with rural challenges at (833) 897-2474.

Salvation Army:

The Amarillo Rapid Response Unit (RRU) has fed evacuees and first responders in

Donley County. In total, 89 meals and 120 bottled waters were provided.
