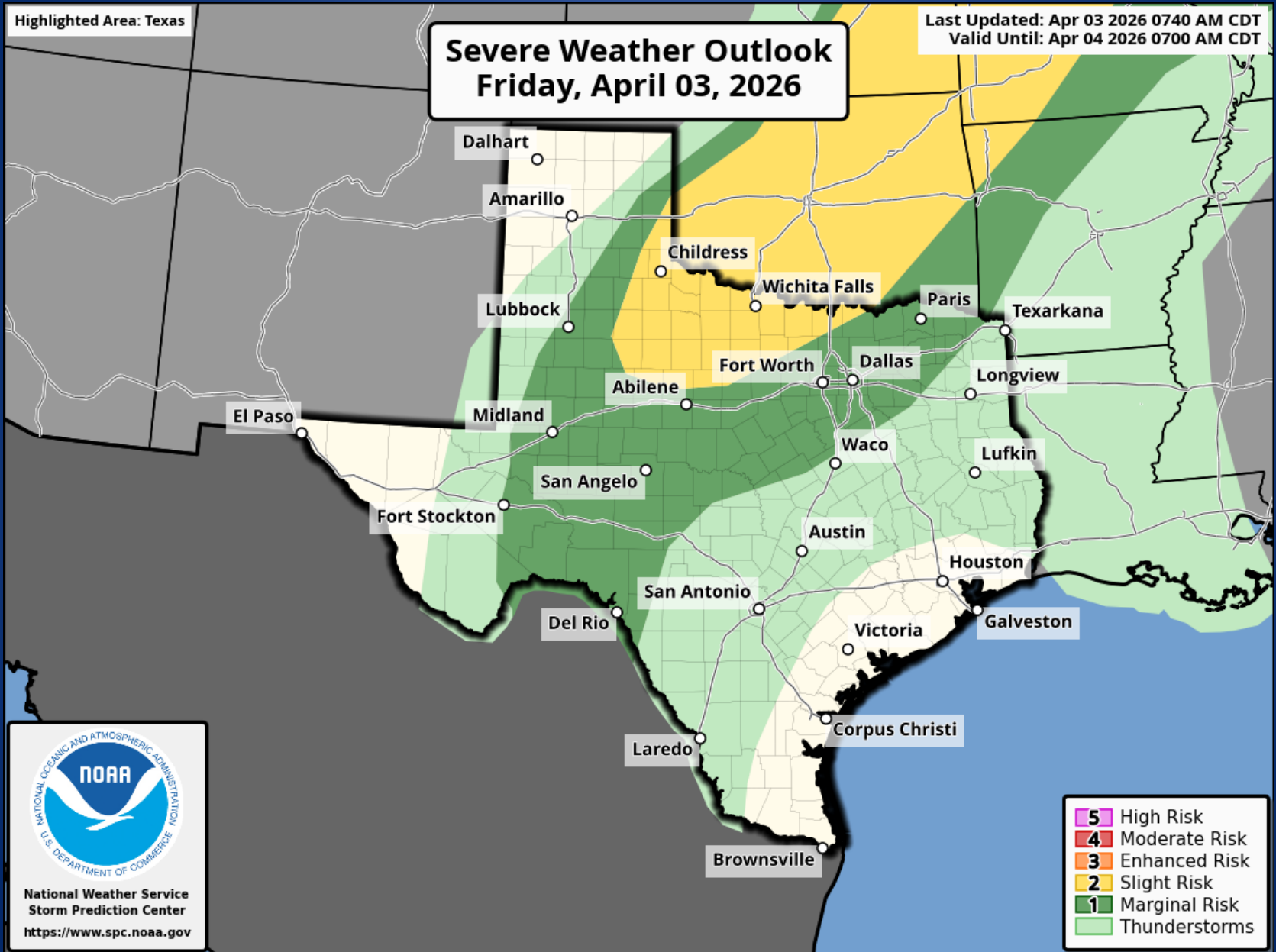

The ingredients will be in place this evening for a few strong to severe storms to potentially form across the southeastern Texas Panhandle. If storms do form, they could produce large hail and damaging wind gusts with a lesser threat for a tornado. There is uncertainty with how far south a cold front gets, which would limit the severe storm potential.

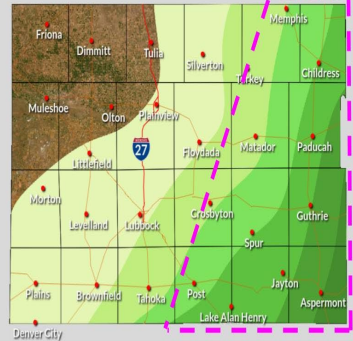

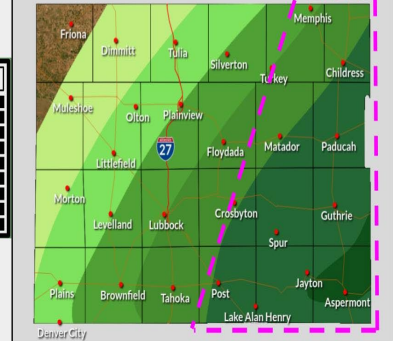

Storm Chances Tonight



- The first round of showers and storms is expected from late this morning through this afternoon.
- Storm chances increase (and expand a bit westward) tonight as a cold front passes through the region.
- The highest chances for severe weather and localized flooding will be off the Caprock (areas within the pink dashed lines above) both today and tonight.

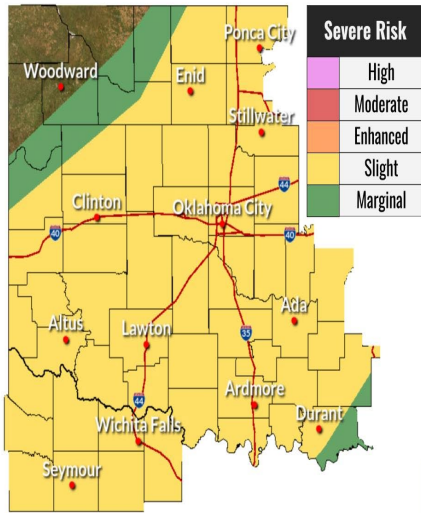
Despite chances for showers and thunderstorms farther east, many areas on the Caprock will also see elevated fire danger today.

Two rounds of showers and storms are expected today. The first round will be from late this morning through the afternoon and evening mainly. Better chances arrive with the second round late tonight. Severe weather and localized flooding are possible with both rounds, especially off the Caprock.

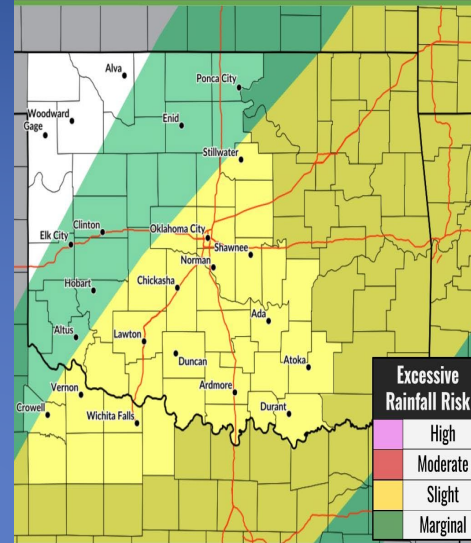

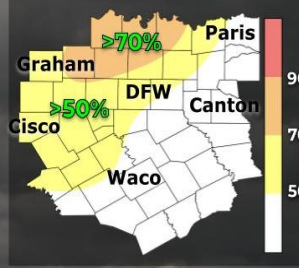

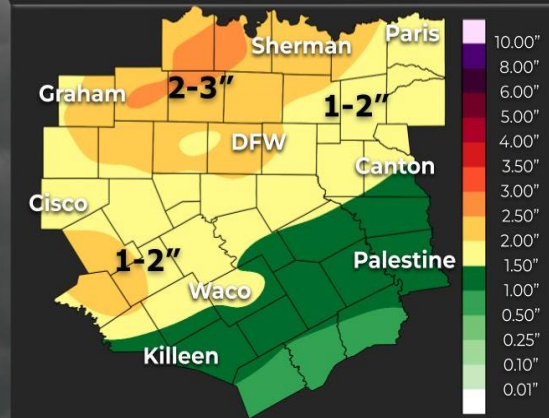
What's Changed: The flood threat has increased, with higher confidence in localized rain totals greater than 3".

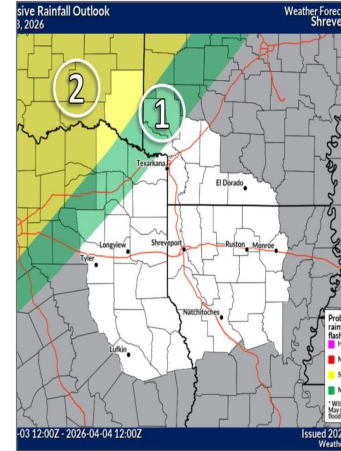

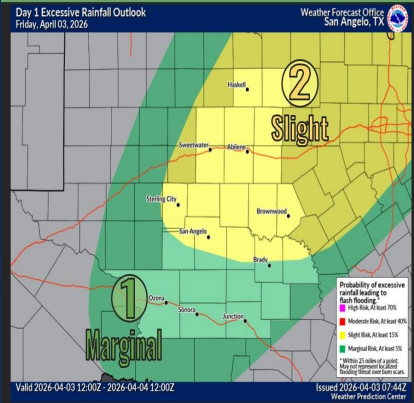

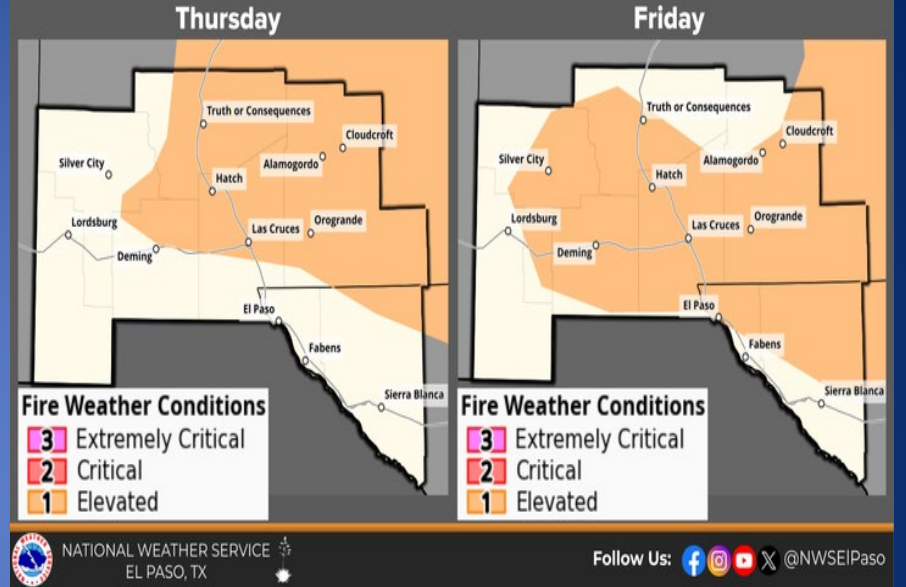

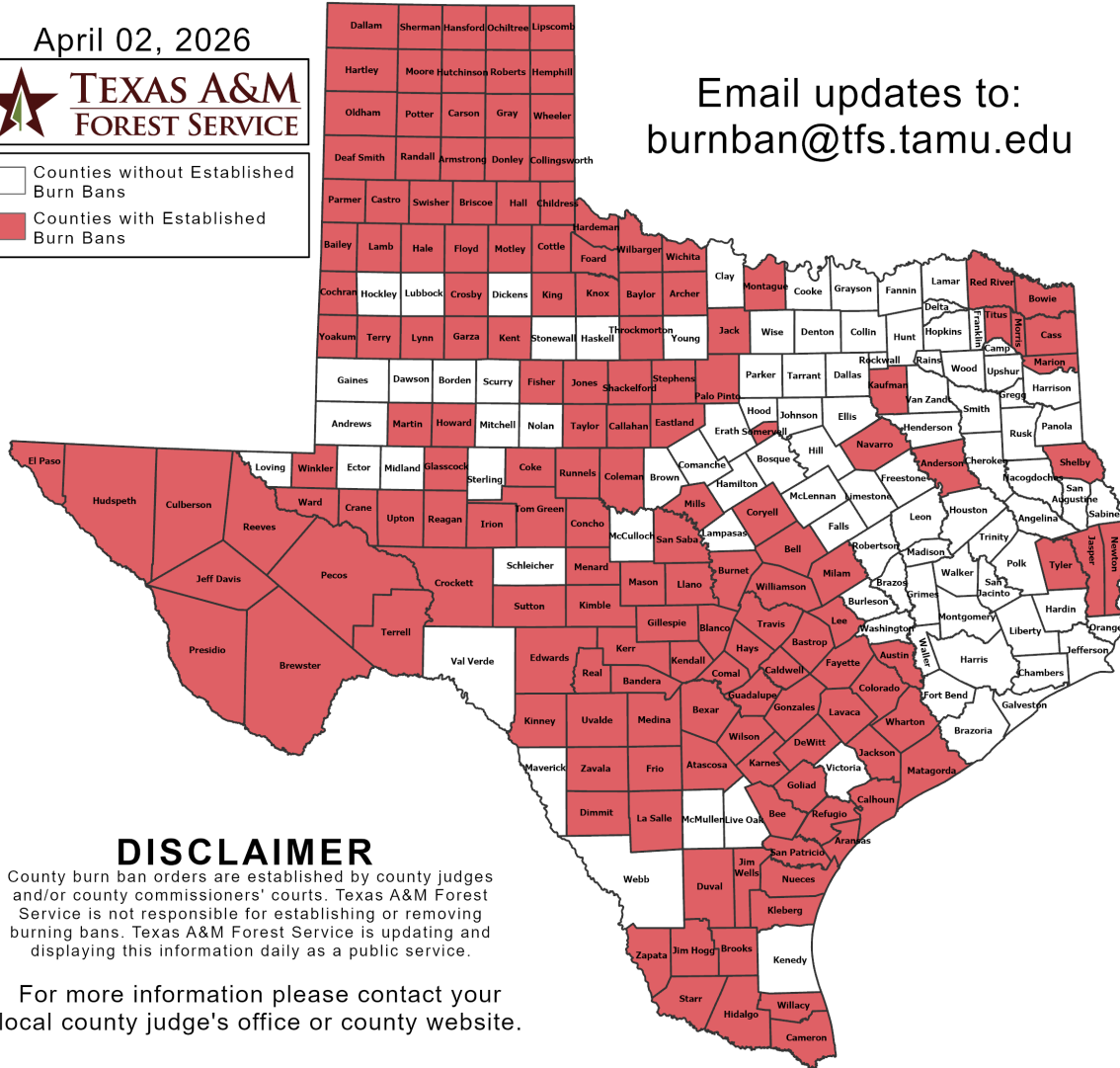
