STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 21, Governor Greg Abbott announced that he directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request officials from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) join state and local partners in conducting preliminary damage assessments in Panhandle communities affected by recent wildfire activity and South Texas communities impacted by April severe storms. These assessments will help determine if the state meets the thresholds for additional federal disaster assistance.

On May 16, Gov. Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a request from the State of Texas for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the Hunggate Fire in Randall County, which has threatened and damaged homes and infrastructure in the Texas Panhandle and forced local evacuations.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 1 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on May 15. DDEOC 1 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 24.

Randall County: The Hunggate Fire burned 34,131 acres and is contained with seven structures lost. There have been approximately 310 evacuations. A temporary shelter was established at the Cole Community Center in Canyon. The Chocolate Chip Fire has been merged with the Hunggate Fire.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

On May 22, the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Specialist stationed at the Incident Management Team (IMT) in Amarillo demobilized at the end of shift and traveled back to their home base. Assessment teams with DAR, County Extension Agents (CEA) and Area Chief have demobilized and will continue to monitor recovery needs remotely. The local CEA will monitor ongoing needs and assist with monetary donations through the agricultural program area committee and the Amarillo Foundation.

Preliminary damage assessments from the Hunggate Fire, compiled by the USDA–Farm Services Agency, DAR, and the CEA, indicate significant agricultural losses. Current reports show the loss of 10 heads of cattle, damage or destruction to approximately 154 miles of fencing, and the loss of more than 1,000 bales of hay.

AgriLife Extension and USDA will continue to record damages as landowners report them. For the 26-0001 Incident, iSTAT submissions from May 15 through today include 24 entries in the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal from landowners reporting agricultural damage to fencing, crops, livestock, and equipment. Four of those landowners have requested assistance from the AgriLife Extension Service. County Extension Agents in the affected counties are contacting these landowners and providing relief assistance as the requests are received.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

The Texas A&M Forest Service has pre-positioned heavy equipment, engines, and aircraft across regions impacted by elevated fire weather conditions. Out-of-State personnel and equipment are integrated with TAMFS in aviation support, field operations and other support roles to augment State resources for a safe and effective response. In total, TAMFS had 20 personnel committed to the Hunggate FMAG Wildfire.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

TxDOT continues their mission of maintaining safe roadways for the traveling public during adverse conditions such as wildfires. TxDOT Emergency Management continues to support the State Operations Center (SOC).

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF):

As of May 19, all resources have been released from the Hunggate Fire.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC):

On May 26, the ARC reported no activity in the final report for this incident.
