STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On May 21, Governor Greg Abbott announced that he directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management to request officials from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) join state and local partners in conducting preliminary damage assessments in Panhandle communities affected by recent wildfire activity and South Texas communities impacted by April severe storms. These assessments will help determine if the state meets the thresholds for additional federal disaster assistance.

On May 19, Gov. Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a request from the State of Texas for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the Stinky Fire in Potter County, which has threatened homes, damaged property, impacted infrastructure, and prompted local evacuations in the Texas Panhandle.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes DDs 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 1 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on May 15. DDEOC 1 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on May 24.

Potter County: The Stinky Fire burned approximately 2,335 acres and is contained with 52 structures lost. There were approximately 1,300 evacuations.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

Emergency Management:

As of May 21, all ten Incident Support Task Force (ISTF) personnel and the Region 8 Regional Coordinator (RC) have been demobilized. A website has been established for monetary donations for the [Panhandle Disaster Relief Fund](#).

Mass Care:

As of May 21, the ISTF continues to monitor for potential Mass Care activities over the coming operational periods. At this time, no requests for Mass Care services or coordination have been received. Partner agencies remain on standby and remain prepared to provide support as community needs are identified, and requests for assistance are made.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

On May 24, the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Specialist stationed at the Incident Management Team (IMT) in Amarillo was demobilized. The Area Chief and DAR Specialists/County Extension Agents (CEA) have demobilized and will continue to monitor recovery needs remotely. The local CEA will monitor needs and provide recovery resources to local landowners. CEAs in affected counties are contacting the landowners to provide relief assistance as those requests are received.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS prepositioned heavy equipment, engines, and aircraft across regions impacted by elevated fire weather conditions. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is currently activated. Out-of-State personnel and equipment were integrated with TAMFS

in aviation support, field operations and other support roles to augment State resources for a safe and effective response. In addition, a targeted public awareness campaign is being conducted in the Panhandle region, including billboard messaging and coordinated outreach through local and regional news media. In total, TAMFS had 26 personnel committed to this event.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

As of May 21, All Hazards Package (AH PKG) Alpha has been reassigned to 26-0013 18MAY Severe Weather, Wildland Fire Support Package (WLFS PKG) Teams 14 and 15 have been demobilized, and WLFS PKGs reassigned to 26-0001 Wildfire Season 2026.

VOLUNTEER ORGANIZATIONS ACTIVE IN DISASTERS (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC):

As of May 31, ARC continues contacting clients and scheduling intake appointments for casework to assist affected households. ARC has cross-referenced damage assessments with the client list and has messaged clients to inform them of available ARC services. ARC is providing rehousing tips and support to families placed in housing for 30 days. Shelter Resident Transition (SRT) is working with these clients – no funding is being provided. ARC expects this activity to continue through June 4.
