STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: [Governor Greg Abbott](#) today announced the launch of an [enhanced website](#) that offers comprehensive information for Texans related to the New World Screwworm (NWS). Located in TDEM's Disaster Portal, Texans can visit [screwworm.texas.gov](https://www.screwworm.texas.gov) to access a “one stop shop” of information and resources from state agency partners engaged in NWS response.

The Texas Animal Health Commission continues certifying individuals with the NWS Certified Inspector Program.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is supporting state and federal response operations by helping secure locations for surveillance and control activities. TPWD personnel have completed specialized NWS inspector training and continue to provide educational presentations, sample collection training, and operational guidance to agency staff and external stakeholders to strengthen statewide preparedness and response capacity.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service is providing ongoing educational programs to strengthen inspection and response capabilities among livestock industry personnel, while AgriLife Research scientists have received national recognition for their contributions to innovative NWS detection, treatment, and mitigation strategies. Operational readiness has been enhanced through the production and distribution of additional sampling resources, and AgriLife leadership remains actively engaged with state policymakers to support response initiatives, including the evaluation of medicated feed as a potential tool for managing NWS risks in deer populations.

Texas Department of State Health Services teams are conducting outreach, inspections, training exercises, and preparedness planning with animal control officers, local governments, healthcare partners, veterinarians, and community organizations to strengthen detection, reporting, and response capabilities. Concurrently, DSHS continues to update reporting tools, guidance materials, and public-facing communications to ensure consistent, accurate, and timely information is available to support statewide NWS surveillance and response efforts.

On June 18, Texas agencies continued to strengthen preparedness, surveillance, and response efforts related to New World Screwworm (NWS). The Texas Animal Health Commission conducted animal surveillance and inspections through coordinated inspection and movement teams, while the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department expanded monitoring across multiple Wildlife Management Areas, including properties within surveillance zones, using an extensive game camera network to support early detection of potential infestations. Texas A&M AgriLife continued outreach and preparedness activities with local officials, including in Williamson and Jim Wells counties. Concurrently, the Texas Department of State Health Services enhanced public health readiness through tabletop exercises, webinars, consultations with local health departments, diagnostic testing support, guidance development, and clinician education efforts that have increased awareness and preparedness among healthcare providers statewide.

State agencies are working closely with local, state, and federal partners in the field and at the State Emergency Operations Center. State partners have contacted thousands of landowners and stakeholders and remain engaged and prepared to support response operations as efforts continue to prevent further spread of NWS.

On June 8, Governor Abbott directed TDEM to activate the Texas State Emergency Operations Center to Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's New World Screwworm response operations.

Resources from multiple state agency partners and the U.S. Department of Agriculture

(USDA) are being leveraged in response to this parasite detection.

On June 5, following confirmation of NWS detection in Texas, Gov. Abbott received a briefing and provided an update to Texans on the state's response at the Texas State Emergency Operations Center. The Governor also issued an updated state disaster declaration to address NWS and prioritize operations in Uvalde and Zavala counties.

On January 26, Gov. Abbott issued a statewide disaster declaration certifying that the spread of NWS threatened Texas's livestock industry and economy and posed an imminent threat of widespread and severe property damage for all Texas counties. The declaration also authorized the use of all available resources of the state government to cope with this disaster, and allowed for the allocation of state resources to address the spread of the parasite to the Texas NWS response team.

On June 25, 2025, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Animal Health Commission and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a joint Texas New World Screwworm Response Team to lead the state's prevention and response efforts.

For more than 18 months since being informed of a positive case of NWS in Mexico, the USDA has been working to combat the impacts in coordination with state and local partners. Such measures by the USDA include importing and dispersing sterile flies in South Texas, outreach with local producers, and building a facility to assist with sterile fly operations.

The Texas Emergency Management Council continues to monitor developments.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

Region 6 has contacted every County Judge in the region regarding the outbreak, status, and anticipated future briefings.

Region 6 is coordinating and communicating with local officials and state and federal partners. Currently, personnel are assisting with the needs of the unified command post located in Eagle Pass.

DD 18 – New Braunfels (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 18 is activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 is activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM):

On June 8, the State Operations Center (SOC) activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of the New World Screwworm incident. The SOC directed interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

Mission Information and Details

- Three (3) Animal inspection/movement groups with multiple teams conducting animal surveillance/inspection and outreach activities within the infested and adjacent zones. They serve as the interface with landowners/producers regarding all prevention activities.
- Six (6) compliance and checkpoint strike teams are operating 16 roadside checkpoints. Roadside checkpoints have been established within the infested and adjacent zones to ensure NWS guideline compliance.
- Evaluating and processing movement certificate requests as quickly as possible for continuity of business.
- TAHC Regional Staff are working with local producers in the region to answer questions and assist with coordination of local jurisdictions and assets.
- NWS Identification Specialists, located at the NVSL Mobile Lab and USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Lab, are screening suspect larval and fly submissions from the infested and adjacent zones for rapid identification.

- Providing information, outreach, and education to industry, animal owners, stakeholders, and the public about NWS to encourage surveillance and proper reporting.
- The [TAHC New World screwworms webpage](#) is updated regularly to provide information and resources, as it becomes available.

The situation is evolving, and new information will be provided as investigations continue.

Executive Director Orders identifying Infested Zones remain in effect, pursuant to Texas Agriculture Code, Chapters 161 – 168, and applicable regulations found in Title 4 of the Texas Administrative Code, Part 2, Chapters 31-60. This order remains in effect until the quarantine is released by the Commission.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

To protect the State's natural resources, including fish and wildlife, through land-based and marine patrol, TPWD will serve as a force multiplier responding to requests for support from our federal, state, and local partners to prevent, detect, control, or eradicate parasitic disease outbreaks. TPWD will deploy coordinated resources to prevent, detect, control, and eradicate parasitic disease within the Texas-Mexico Border region.

TPWD staff will continue to coordinate native wildlife surveillance efforts, which will include:

- Working with landowners to organize active wildlife surveillance on their properties
- Inspection of hunter-harvested carcasses when necessary, including animals harvested in State Parks and Wildlife Management Areas.
- Inspection of recently road-killed wildlife.
- Inspection of animals is handled as part of routine wildlife handling, whether that is by agencies, researchers, or other entities that encounter wildlife on a regular basis.
- Reporting from wildlife rehabbers, private practice vets, law enforcement, taxidermists, game processors, and the public.

June 19

- TPWD Staff have [contacted 4,410](#) TPWD cooperators and permit holders by

phone to notify them of the NWS infestations and promote surveillance.

- In addition to cooperators located in a zone, TPWD staff are also contacting all available TPWD cooperators that are currently not in a zone in South Texas and the Edwards Plateau by phone to notify them of the NWS situation and promote surveillance. As of this report, 2,630 TPWD cooperators on that list have been contacted.
- TPWD staff have actively secured 61 NWS traps and 22 Ground Release Chambers locations by contacting TPWD cooperating landowners at the request of TAHC and USDA.
- TPWD staff have investigated 2,066 animals statewide and investigated 19 suspect cases.
- TPWD Wildlife staff completed the NWS Certified Inspector Training.
- TPWD staff are monitoring 229 game cameras in 22 Wildlife Management areas. San Angelo State Park is monitoring five game cameras.
- TPWD Wildlife veterinarians and Wildlife Health Specialists have provided NWS presentations, refresher courses, sample collection training, and SOP overview to 351 TPWD Wildlife staff, 386 TPWD LE, and 76 State Park attendees. TPWD staff have presented on NWS at seven workshops totaling approximately 1,505 attendees.

As of June 18

- All cooperators located inside Edwards, Gillespie, La Salle, Sutton, Tom Green, and Zavala County Infested and Surveillance Zones. (1,709) have received phone calls and updates on the NWS situation in their area.
- TPWD's Kerr Wildlife Management Area is located within the Gillespie County Surveillance Zone and is monitoring 9 game cameras, and the Chaparral Wildlife Management Area monitoring 7 game cameras for signs of NWS infestations on the property.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

Currently, the AgriLife Extension SOC liaison, Public Information Officer (PIO), Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Team Members, DAR Administration, Extension Administration, and County Extension Agents are monitoring NWS movement and conditions, SOC response activity, and participating in weekly communication calls with Extension Administration, Entomologists, and Livestock Specialists. Disaster Assessment and Recovery Specialists are on standby to support County Extension Agents and ESF-11 partners with public education, animal response, and recovery efforts as requested. PIO continues to develop educational and outreach materials for

publication and continues to participate in daily Joint Information Center activities.

Since June 2025, leading up to the first confirmed NWS case in Texas, AgriLife has:

- Conducted educational programs on NWS reaching over 21,200 participants.
- Established an 18-member working group of Extension Specialists across livestock, wildlife, and human disciplines focused on the development of educational information, outreach techniques, and resources for use by County Extension Agents and other appropriate Extension personnel across Texas.
- Two internal staff NWS webinar trainings completed by 500 AgriLife Extension and AgriLife Research personnel, were conducted with training support from the TAHC and TPWD.
- Hosted a hands-on professional development NWS workshop hosted at the San Antonio Livestock Show Ground for 126 AgriLife Extension and AgriLife Research personnel. In addition to others in attendance at this workshop, County Extension Agents (CEAs) from 48 of the southern and western Texas Counties were in attendance.
- Developed a County Extension NWS Educational Tool kit, complete with videos and PowerPoint Slide Decks for use in local producer and community educational outreach efforts.
- Through a grant from USDA-APHIS, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension has distributed 1,000 NWS larva collection kits among the Southern and Western County Extension offices for use in NWS detection and identification.
- AgriLife Extension is wrapping up the development of a course that will train people on what to do and expect related to the occurrence of NWS. AgriLife Extension will provide maintenance and management of this course.
- Provided expertise with local and state government representatives to better inform their preparation should an incident occur.
- Texas A&M AgriLife Extension livestock entomology specialist conducted an NWS awareness training during the monthly meeting of the Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN) Agricultural Committee, as well as more in-depth training during the May 2026 EDEN webinar hosted by the EDEN professional development committee.

June 19

- As of 8 a.m. on June 19, 2,743 individuals are enrolled in the NWS Preparedness and Response Education Course for Livestock Inspection, with 785 course completions.
- The USDA announced the outcome of the NWS Grand Challenge program, where the focus is to develop new tools to aggressively detect, treat, or mitigate

the impacts of NWS. Several AgriLife Research scientists were recognized for this challenge.

- 708 new NWS sample kits have been made for distribution.
- AgriLife Leadership testified to the State House Agriculture Committee on efforts associated with AgriLife towards supporting the NWS response, including progress on inclusion of medicated feed for deer.

As of June 18

- The NWS Preparedness and Response Education Course for Livestock Inspection is currently live and available on the [AgriLife Learn](#) educational platform.
- Williamson County held a New World Screwworm discussion that included the city Emergency Management Coordinators and a county epidemiologist. On June 17, a large multi-county educational event was held in Jim Wells County for the Coastal Bend region.

Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL):

The Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL) has deployed one laboratory professional to the Texas Animal Health Commission's (TAHC) Pleasanton office to join the United States Department of Agriculture mobile detection unit deployed from USDA's National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL). The lab is now operational and accepting samples for identification. A second professional remains stationed in the State Operations Center (SOC) in Austin.

TVMDL is educating clients to contact TAHC for triage of a suspected fly or larvae instead of direct submission to TVMDL. However, TVMDL Client Services staff review every daily submission and flag any cases submitted for fly/larvae ID. Laboratorians who have passed the USDA proficiency test for NWS identification stand ready to review submissions and will immediately contact TAHC and USDA should a suspect case be identified. Suspect samples will be routed as directed by TAHC and USDA.

TVMDL staff are also contributing to the development of a livestock inspectors course, providing expertise on the requirement of a veterinarian-client-patient relationship for the administration of certain medications. Maintenance and management of this course will be provided by AgriLife Extension.

Staff participate in the TAHC Virtual Joint Information Center daily calls.

Laboratory personnel at all four agency locations are on standby to support ESF-11 partners as needed.

With support from TVMDL, the NVSL mobile lab reviewed 2 cases on June 13, 2026; none were received at any TVMDL location on June 13.

TVMDL veterinarians are assisting the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in producing screwworm collection kits. Talks are ongoing today to secure supplies for more kits.

With support from TVMDL, the NVSL mobile lab reviewed 8 cases on June 16, 2026; TVMDL reviewed one case from a private citizen on June 16 received at the College Station lab.

TVMDL is working to validate high-throughput testing, should the need arise.

As of June 18

- With support from TVMDL, the NVSL mobile lab reviewed 4 cases on June 17, 2026; TVMDL received one case from a private citizen on June 17 at the Canyon laboratory location.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Increased Readiness in support of this incident. DSHS continues working with state partners and lead agencies to ensure ESF-8 ongoing support.

There are currently no confirmed human cases of NWS in Texas. DSHS is prepared to support, as needed, to assist in protecting the Texas livestock industry and wildlife. DSHS is ready to respond to human cases, should that occur.

June 19

Food Safety

- Texas Meat Safety Assurance continues to support the livestock industry, actively monitor potential cases of New World Screwworm at slaughter, provide training, and information to stakeholders. Currently:
 - Inspections of every animal continue at state-inspected slaughter establishments, and weekly inspections continue at custom-exempt slaughter facilities.

- There are 0 inspected establishments and 0 Custom Exempt establishments conducting active slaughter activities in the infested zones and 3 inspected establishments and 1 Custom Exempt establishments conducting active slaughter activities in all Adjacent Surveillance Zones.
- DSHS Dairy sanitarians are working closely with permitted dairies to ensure appropriate use and withdrawal times for authorized drugs to treat NWS.
 - Texas currently has 299 Producer Dairies and 56 Retail Raw Dairies.
 - There is 1 Retail Raw Dairy located in Gillespie County.
- Meat Safety personnel are also continuing to engage in education efforts to increase awareness of New World Screwworm. Learning materials, in both Spanish and English, have been distributed to 153 slaughter establishments and follow-up in-person engagements have been conducted at 136 establishments.

Ongoing Coordination

- DSHS Public Health Region 1 (Panhandle)
 - 5 animal quarantine locations are being visited
- DSHS Public Health Region 4/5N (North Texas/ Piney Woods area)
 - Region 4/5N in collaboration with other regional ZC teams, completing and planning NWS tabletop exercises for ACOs and local stakeholders.
- DSHS Public Health Region 8 (San Antonio and Uvalde area)
 - DSHS Region 8 Zoonosis Control, Preparedness and Response continue outreach and response to stakeholder inquiries.
 - Zoonosis Control staff conducted shelter inspections in Kirby, Bexar County, and City of San Antonio. NWS outreach provided during inspections.
 - The Zoonosis Control team facilitated submission of samples to the state lab from a Victoria County patient for NWS to rule out. Results were expected on June 18; however, delayed due to shipping, currently low suspicion.
 - Preparedness and Response provided an NWS situation update to health and medical partners at the STRAC Emergency Hospital Disaster Group meeting.
 - Staff from Specialized Health and Social Services and Tx Health Steps programs have provided outreach to wound care centers in Region 8.
 - Comal County along with Guadalupe County will host a joint NWS

planning meeting on Wednesday, June 24, 2026, at 1:00pm. TAHC, TPWD, DSHS and TxAgriLife have been invited to attend and present the current situation.

- DSHS Public Health Region 9/10 (West Texas)
 - Provided training on current status of NWS, sample submission, and where to locate information and resources to a group of 12 Animal Control Officers.
- Zoonosis Control Branch (ZCB).
 - Animal Control Officer (ACO) Training New World Screwworm (NWS) Response webinar.

 - In preparation for this webinar, DSHS Zoonosis team is conducting a brief survey of ACOs to identify key training topics to include.

DSHS staff across regional offices continue reaching out to partners to ensure animal control officers, veterinarians, local health departments, county judges, tribal nations, and other regional partners have the latest guidance and resources for identification, sampling, and reporting new world screwworm.

Public Messaging

- DSHS has updated its website with reporting aids for animal control officers and local health departments and added flyers for agricultural producers, employees and general public. Additionally, DSHS is developing a new easy-to-read guide for the public to understand how to report possible cases of NWS.
- DSHS continues working with state agency partners to ensure that information shared about surveillance and reporting is correct and includes the most up to date federal and state resources.
- DSHS Public Information Officers continues to participate in Joint Information Center activities.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

The Texas Department of Agriculture continues to conduct surveillance, gather intelligence, collect evidence, and monitor any signs of the New World Screwworm fly in relevant portions of the state. Traps specific for the New World Screwworm have been deployed and are continually monitored, with all suspect samples sent to our state and

federal partners for identification of suspect fly species.

As of June 17

TDA Inspectors, field staff, and pertinent regional employees are actively pursuing accreditation under the Texas Animal Health Commission and Texas AgriLife NWS Certified Inspector Program. Certified TDA staff can conduct inspections and issue NWS Treatment/Movement Certificates for animals leaving an NWS-infested zone.

The deployment route encompassed placing traps every 3 mile along the US/Mexico Border from Webb County all the way to the Val Verde County, approximately 105 miles of roadway and rural terrain, focusing on areas identified as priority surveillance zones due to livestock movement, wildlife activity, transportation corridors, and proximity to the international border region.

This enhanced surveillance and trapping plan now has extended from the Boca-Chica and Starbase area in Cameron County, all along the Texas-Mexico border corridor, to Val Verde County.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ continues to closely monitor the New World Screwworm response and will coordinate with state and federal partners to provide technical assistance and guidance on carcass disposal.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

The TxDOT liaison is currently staffing the SOC, where TxDOT Emergency Management personnel continue to monitor the situation and support lead state agency partners. TxDOT continues to coordinate with TAHC regarding the increase and extended specialized fly trap locations along state-maintained Right-of-Ways (ROW) in impacted areas. Additionally, online identification and reporting information has been distributed to all TxDOT offices statewide.

TxDOT continues to coordinate with TAHC regarding compliance checkpoint locations along state-maintained roadways.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

Texas Military Department (TMD) is supporting state agency partners in response with a SOC support team.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

TXCC is monitoring the situation and stands ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this event have been identified.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

In support of the New World Screwworm Response affecting portions of Texas, the Texas Department of Public Safety personnel are assisting the Texas Animal Health Commission by providing a Texas Highway Patrol Trooper to serve as a liaison at the Incident Command Post in Eagle Pass. Additionally, area Troopers are conducting patrol operations in and around the affected areas of Edwards, Gillespie, La Salle, and Zavala Counties and remain available to respond to requests for assistance if needed at designated TAHC checkpoints. DPS has assisted TAHC with transportation of test samples as needed.

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET):

VET operational area is focused on the following counties: Gillespie, Mason, Kimble, Sutton counties, with options for Edwards or Uvalde counties.

As of June 18

- There has been no change in the counties where teams have worked to date: Gillespie, Kerr, Uvalde, Kimble, Sutton, and Mason. VET received another maggot

sample from a local who got it off one of their barn cats that was found deceased (with evidence of an animal attack) – the maggots were sent to the Kerrville lab for identification, and the cat was disposed of properly.

- All 5 VET Strike Teams continue to respond to call requests from the call log to provide inspections, treat wounds or collect samples from local ranchers – the calls are coming typically in the mornings, with less afternoon activity.
- VET continues to work out of their base at the Gillespie County AgriLife Extension office which has been a great working location and has helped strengthen our already existing relationship with our county partners (OEM in Gillespie, AgriLife Extension service, AgriLife DAR, and other county officials).
- VET attended the Gillespie County meeting on NWS held at the fairgrounds and sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau and Texas and SW Cattle Raisers – a meeting attended by over 1000 local ranchers and citizens.
- The total number of animal inspections since Sunday, June 14 at 12 p.m. is 5,775.

As of June 17

- Completed inspections on 200 goats and a few sheep at the Uvalde County sale barn.
- VET ST worked with TAHC inspector at the Gillespie County sale barn on Tuesday to assist with inspections of over 4000 sheep/goats and are back there on Wednesday for the cattle sale which will conclude later in the day on 6/17.
- Strike Teams visited multiple small ranches (4 by one strike team, 1-2 each for the others) in Gillespie and Kerr Counties – this also included exotic animal ranches and facilities, a process which continues today.
