STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The Texas Disaster Portal continues to be updated regularly with the latest guidance, resources, and information from state agencies engaged in the response to New World Screwworm. The one-stop-shop portal, located on the Texas Division of Emergency Management website, can be accessed online at screwworm.texas.gov.

The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) continues to support New World Screwworm response efforts through livestock inspections, movement control, surveillance, and producer outreach within infested and adjacent zones. Inspection teams remain deployed to identify cases, support treatment, issue movement certificates, and enforce movement requirements, while compliance checkpoints and outreach efforts continue to promote adherence to NWS guidelines. TAHC also expanded an existing infested zone in Brewster County and established a new infested zone in portions of Sutton and Schleicher Counties following newly confirmed cases, demonstrating continued surveillance and rapid response to contain the spread of NWS.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) continues to support the New World Screwworm response through wildlife surveillance and proactive outreach to landowners and permit holders. Efforts remain focused on increasing awareness,

encouraging reporting, and strengthening early detection within active infested and surveillance zones, as well as surrounding high-risk areas.

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service continues to provide the New World Screwworm Preparedness and Response Education Course to support livestock inspection efforts. The course remains available online and continues to equip livestock producers, animal health professionals, and stakeholders with the knowledge needed to enhance preparedness, response, and surveillance activities across Texas.

The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) continues to support the New World Screwworm response through food safety inspections, coordination with partner agencies, stakeholder outreach, and veterinary preparedness efforts. The agency is monitoring regulated facilities in infested zones, promoting inspector certification training, and coordinating regional training to strengthen response capabilities.

On June 19, Governor Greg Abbott announced the launch of an enhanced website that offers comprehensive information for Texans related to the New World Screwworm (NWS). Located in TDEM's Disaster Portal, Texans can visit screwworm.texas.gov to access a "one-stop shop" of information and resources from state agency partners engaged in NWS response.

State agencies are working closely with local, state, and federal partners in the field and at the State Emergency Operations Center. State partners have contacted thousands of landowners and stakeholders and remain engaged and prepared to support response operations as efforts continue to prevent further spread of NWS.

On June 8, Governor Abbott directed TDEM to activate the Texas State Emergency Operations Center to Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's New World Screwworm response operations.

Resources from multiple state agency partners and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) are being leveraged in response to this parasite detection.

On June 5, following confirmation of NWS detection in Texas, Gov. Abbott received a briefing and provided an update to Texans on the state's response at the Texas State Emergency Operations Center. The Governor also issued an updated state disaster declaration to address NWS and prioritize operations in Uvalde and Zavala counties.

On January 26, Gov. Abbott issued a statewide disaster declaration certifying that the spread of NWS threatened Texas's livestock industry and economy and posed an imminent threat of widespread and severe property damage for all Texas counties. The declaration also authorized the use of all available resources of the state government to cope with this disaster and allowed for the allocation of state resources to address the spread of the parasite to the Texas NWS response team.

On June 25, 2025, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Animal Health Commission and

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a joint Texas New World Screwworm Response Team to lead the state's prevention and response efforts.

For more than 18 months since being informed of a positive case of NWS in Mexico, the USDA has been working to combat the impacts in coordination with state and local partners. Such measures by the USDA include importing and dispersing sterile flies in South Texas, outreach with local producers, and building a facility to assist with sterile fly operations.

The Texas Emergency Management Council continues to monitor developments.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

Region 6 has contacted every County Judge in the region regarding the outbreak, status, and anticipated future briefings. Region 6 is coordinating and communicating with local officials and state and federal partners. Currently, personnel are assisting with the needs of the unified command post located in Eagle Pass.

DD 18 – New Braunfels (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): Disaster District Emergency Operations Center (DDEOC) 18 is activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 is activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions).

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM):

On June 8, the State Operations Center (SOC) activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of the New World Screwworm incident. The SOC continues directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

Mission Information and Details

- To date, TAHC has inspected 16,644 animals in the infested zones, and 591 certificates have been issued for movement out of the infested zones.
- TAHC inspectors have been mobilized to conduct animal inspection/movement/outreach within the identified infested and adjacent zones. These groups will conduct inspections of livestock to identify myiasis, assist producers with topical/systemic treatments, and collect larval samples for official laboratory identification. Additionally, they will perform pre-movement inspections, ensure proper treatment compliance, and issue official NWS movement certificates as quickly as possible.
 - On July 14, a total of 3 inspections were completed on 39 animals moving out of the infested zones. The number of inspections is being impacted by inclement weather.
- TAHC compliance and checkpoint strike teams are operating roadside checkpoints. Roadside checkpoints have been established within the infested and adjacent zones to ensure NWS guideline compliance.
 - On July 14, with the assistance of TAMFS, a total of 38 stops were completed; 13 stops were provided for education/outreach, and 25 verified NWS guideline compliance.
- Livestock Market inspections are being conducted to screen livestock for signs of myiasis and verify all animals entering a market from an Infested Zone possess a valid NWS movement certificate. Animals moving to slaughter are monitored to ensure they enter proper slaughter channels and any changes to a non-slaughter status are confirmed to receive immediate treatment at the market.
- TAHC Regional Staff are working with local producers in the region to answer questions and assist with the coordination of local jurisdictions and assets.
- NWS Identification Specialists, located at the NVSL Mobile Lab and USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Lab, are screening suspect larval and fly submissions from the infested and adjacent zones for rapid identification. One (1) TAHC entomologist has been assigned to the mobile laboratory to assist.
- Providing information, outreach, and education to industry, animal owners, stakeholders, and the public about NWS to encourage surveillance and proper reporting.
- The TAHC New World screwworms webpage is updated regularly to provide information and resources, as it becomes available.

The situation is evolving, and new information will be provided as investigations continue.

Executive Director Orders identifying Infested Zones remain in effect, pursuant to Texas Agriculture Code, Chapters 161 – 168, and applicable regulations found in Title 4 of the Texas Administrative Code, Part 2, Chapters 31-60. This order remains in effect until the quarantine is released by the Commission.

July 15

On July 14, 2026, the Infested Zone established in Brewster County was expanded in association with an additional NWS case detected on a calf. A modified executive director order was issued and designated as Infested Zone 13.A.

On July 14, 2026, a new Infested Zone was established due to a confirmed case of NWS on a canine in Sutton County. Due to this detection, areas of Sutton and Schleicher Counties are designated as Infested Zone 14.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

To protect the State's natural resources, including fish and wildlife, through land-based and marine patrol, TPWD will serve as a force multiplier responding to requests for support from our federal, state, and local partners to prevent, detect, control, or eradicate parasitic disease outbreaks. TPWD will deploy coordinated resources to prevent, detect, control, and eradicate parasitic disease within the Texas-Mexico Border region.

TPWD staff will continue to coordinate native wildlife surveillance efforts, which will include:

- Working with landowners to organize active wildlife surveillance on their properties
- Inspection of hunter-harvested carcasses when necessary, including animals harvested in State Parks and Wildlife Management Areas.
- Inspection of recently road-killed wildlife.
- Inspection of animals is handled as part of routine wildlife handling, whether that is by agencies, researchers, or other entities that encounter wildlife on a regular basis.
- Reporting from wildlife rehabbers, private practice vets, law enforcement, taxidermists, game processors, and the public.

July 15

- TPWD staff have investigated 4,352 animals statewide and investigated 47 animals of interest.
- To date, TPWD Staff have contacted 6,140 TPWD cooperators and permit holders by phone to notify them of the NWS infestations and promote surveillance.
- Approximately 94% of cooperating landowners located inside all active IZs and SZs (2,495) have received phone calls and updates on the NWS situation in their area.
- In addition to cooperators located in a zone, TPWD staff are also contacting all available TPWD cooperators that are currently not in a zone in South Texas,

Edwards Plateau, and Trans Pecos counties. As of 1 pm on July 15, 3,543 TPWD cooperators on that list have been contacted.

As of July 13

- TPWD staff are monitoring 83 game cameras on 15 state parks. San Angelo State Park, located in the Tom Green infected zone, is monitoring four game cameras; three game cameras are being monitored at the Devils Sink Hole, located in the Edwards surveillance zone.
- Since NWS was detected in Texas, TPWD staff have presented on NWS at 35 workshops, totaling approximately 4,307 attendees.
- TPWD Wildlife Division currently has 12 staff that have completed the AgriLife NWS training required to become a certified inspector with TAHC.
- TPWD staff are monitoring 352 game cameras on 36 Wildlife Management Area's. TPWD's Kerr Wildlife Management area, located within the Gillespie surveillance zone, is monitoring 10 game cameras; the Chaparral Wildlife Management Area, partially located in the La Salle surveillance zone is monitoring 7 game cameras for NWS infestations; and the Elephant Wildlife Management Area located in Brewster County is monitoring 14 cameras.
- TPWD staff have secured an accumulated total of 97 locations for NWS traps and 22 locations for GRC's for the USDA and TAHC.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

Currently, the AgriLife Extension SOC liaison, Public Information Officer (PIO), Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Team Members, DAR Administration, Extension Administration, and County Extension Agents are monitoring NWS movement and conditions, SOC response activity, and participating in weekly communication calls with Extension Administration, Entomologists, and Livestock Specialists. Disaster Assessment and Recovery Specialists are on standby to support County Extension Agents and ESF-11 partners with public education, animal response, and recovery efforts as requested. PIO continues to develop educational and outreach materials for publication and continues to participate in daily Joint Information Center activities.

Since June 2025, leading up to the first confirmed NWS case in Texas, AgriLife has:

- Conducted educational programs on NWS reaching over 21,200 participants.
- Established an 18-member working group of Extension Specialists across livestock, wildlife, and human disciplines focused on the development of educational information, outreach techniques, and resources for use by County Extension Agents and other appropriate Extension personnel across Texas.
- Two internal staff NWS webinar trainings completed by 500 AgriLife Extension and AgriLife Research personnel, were conducted with training support from the

TAHC and TPWD.

- Hosted a hands-on professional development NWS workshop hosted at the San Antonio Livestock Show Ground for 126 AgriLife Extension and AgriLife Research personnel. In addition to others in attendance at this workshop, County Extension Agents (CEAs) from 48 of the southern and western Texas Counties were in attendance.
- Developed a County Extension NWS Educational Tool kit, complete with videos and PowerPoint Slide Decks for use in local producer and community educational outreach efforts.
- Through a grant from USDA-APHIS, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension has distributed 1,000 NWS larva collection kits among the Southern and Western County Extension offices for use in NWS detection and identification.
- AgriLife Extension is wrapping up the development of a course that will train people on what to do and expect related to the occurrence of NWS. AgriLife Extension will provide maintenance and management of this course.
- Provided expertise with local and state government representatives to better inform their preparation should an incident occur.
- Texas A&M AgriLife Extension livestock entomology specialist conducted an NWS awareness training during the monthly meeting of the Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN) Agricultural Committee, as well as more in-depth training during the May 2026 EDEN webinar hosted by the EDEN professional development committee.
- The Ag Alert pest and disease alert system has seen a 600% increase in subscribers since the first detection of NWS on June 3. As of July 13, there were 1,698 subscribers. NWS cases are being posted on the site, along with other animal and plant pest and disease cases.
- As of July 13, 2026, the following online printable resources are now available through the AgriLife Extension New World screwworm hub:
 1. The AgriLife Extension pocket guide is available as a printable resource on the AgriLife website. The pocket guide provides basic information about New World screwworm, available treatment options as well as general resources for Texans.
 2. A Field Guide for Beef Cattle Producers provides early detection information, reporting, sample collection, submission, and treatment information. This resource is also available on the AgriLife Extension NWS hub.

July 15

- [The New World Screwworm Preparedness and Response Education Course for Livestock Inspection remains available on AgriLife Learn and the Texas Animal Health Commission websites. As of 8:30 am on July 15, 5,271 individuals had enrolled, with 2,392 completing the modules and earning completion certificates.](#)

As of July 14

- County Extension Agents across the state are actively working with landowners to educate them on best management practices for monitoring livestock for infestation. Since June 1, County Extension Agents have conducted 136 NWS educational programs, reaching 18,932 landowners.

Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL):

The Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL) has deployed one laboratory professional to the Texas Animal Health Commission's (TAHC) Pleasanton office to join the United States Department of Agriculture mobile detection unit deployed from USDA's National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL). The lab is now operational and accepting samples for identification. A second professional remains stationed in the State Operations Center (SOC) in Austin.

TVMDL is educating clients to contact TAHC for triage of a suspected fly or larvae instead of direct submission to TVMDL. However, TVMDL Client Services staff review every daily submission and flag any cases submitted for fly/larvae ID. Laboratorians who have passed the USDA proficiency test for NWS identification stand ready to review submissions and will immediately contact TAHC and USDA should a suspect case be identified. Suspect samples will be routed as directed by TAHC and USDA.

Staff participate in the TAHC Virtual Joint Information Center daily calls.

Laboratory personnel at all four agency locations are on standby to support ESF-11 partners as needed.

TVMDL veterinarians are assisting the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in producing screwworm collection kits.

TVMDL is working to validate high-throughput testing, should the need arise.

July 15

- With support from TVMDL, the NVSL mobile lab reviewed 1 submission on July 14, 2026. TVMDL received 1 submission from a private citizen on July 14, 2026, and began receiving and screening flies from traps. Seven trap submissions were received from USDA personnel in addition to 4 trap submissions from TDA staff. In total, 12 submissions were received by TVMDL College Station on July 14, 2026, and represent the following totals:

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Increased Readiness in support of this incident. DSHS continues working with state partners and lead agencies to ensure ESF-8's ongoing support.

DSHS is prepared to support, as needed, to assist in protecting the Texas livestock industry and wildlife. DSHS is ready to respond to human cases, should that occur.

July 15

- DSHS is monitoring 3 establishments in current Infested Zones, including 1 Slaughter and Processing plant in Uvalde County, 1 Custom Exempt in Medina County, 1 Federal Custom Exempt in Tom Green County.
- DSHS continues to conduct active inspection and monitoring activities in accordance with existing regulations.

Ongoing Coordination

- Zoonosis Control Branch
 - Zoonosis Control continues to support and coordinate with lead agencies in their response.

 - Zoonosis Control (ZC) is sharing NWS resources as they become available.

- ZC is advocating the need and necessity of completing the NWS inspector certification training.
- Veterinarian engagement 07/14/2026:
 - Ongoing:
 - ZC continues to share NWS resources as they become available.
 - ZC contacted vendors for NWS training for vets. These vendors are willing to assist with training for vet clinics (provide meals). Planning to provide training week of July 20th or week of the 27th in Amarillo and Lubbock.
 - PHR 1 Zoonosis is advocating the need and necessity of completing the NWS inspector certification training.

Planned future events include:

- On July 17, a comprehensive 4-hour NWS training for Animal Control Officers and Sanitarians will be held at the Hidalgo County Health and Human Services Department in Edinburg. This course will cover companion animal care, wildlife impacts, public health considerations, and Sterile Insect Technique (SIT) dispersal operations.
- NWS Workshop July 15, 2026 to be hosted by Aransas County Animal Care Services. The District Regional Director (DRD), Zoonosis Manager, and Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) personnel will be in attendance to support and build their NWS plans.

DSHS staff across regional offices continue reaching out to partners to ensure animal control officers, veterinarians, local health departments, county judges, tribal nations, and other regional partners have the latest guidance and resources for identification, sampling, and reporting NWS.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

The Texas Department of Agriculture continues to conduct surveillance, gather intelligence, collect evidence, and monitor any signs of the New World Screwworm fly in relevant portions of the state. Traps specific for the New World Screwworm have been deployed and are continually monitored, with all suspect samples sent to our state and federal partners for identification of suspect fly species.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ continues to closely monitor the NWS response and will coordinate with state and federal partners to provide technical assistance and guidance on carcass disposal.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) continues to support the New World Screwworm response by providing logistical assistance, supporting State Operations Center operations, coordinating compliance checkpoint locations with TAHC, and sharing daily response updates and educational information statewide to maintain operational awareness and readiness.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

The Texas Military Department (TMD) is supporting state agency partners in response with a SOC support team. TMD has activated an Aerial Dispersal Team in South Texas to assist partners with sterile fly dispersal.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

TXCC is monitoring the situation and stands ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this event have been identified.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

As DPS continues to support NWS response, the updated checkpoints for La Salle, Edwards, Gillespie, Tom Green, Crockett, Medina, Jim Hogg, and Brewster Counties have been distributed to DPS field personnel. THP personnel continue to patrol the affected areas identified by TAHC in Zavala, La Salle, Edwards, Gillespie, Tom Green, Sutton, Crockett, Terrell, Medina, Jim Hogg, and Brewster Counties. THP is available to respond to requests for assistance if needed.

Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET):

On June 18, VET returned from an assigned status in the field to an available status from home stations and remains available on an as-needed basis.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS is providing agency personnel to assist TAHC as checkpoint investigators in the screwworm-infected zones.
