STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On July 22, Governor Greg Abbott [announced](#) that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) received federal approval to extend the time Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients can apply for replacement benefits for food lost or destroyed by recent flooding.

On July 20, Gov. Abbott [surveyed flood-damaged communities](#) by helicopter and provided an update during a press conference in Kerrville on Texas' ongoing response to severe floods that impacted large parts of the state last week.

On July 17, Gov. Abbott requested a [Presidential Disaster Declaration](#) to support Texas' ongoing response and recovery efforts following severe weather and flooding impacting communities across the state. Gov. Abbott also visited Uvalde County to receive updates on flood conditions, survey damage, and meet with state and local officials coordinating the local response. This was followed by the Governor holding a press conference in the City of Uvalde.

On July 16, Gov. Abbott held a severe weather briefing and press conference at the State Operations Center in Austin to provide an update on the state's ongoing response

to flooding across Texas. Response efforts continue while coordinating with local partners to provide assistance where it is needed most.

On July 14, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster declaration for 59 Texas counties as severe storms continue to threaten the state. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant. The Governor also directed the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to continue 24-hour operations at Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's ongoing response to severe storms and flash flooding.

On July 12, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate state emergency response resources ahead of severe weather and flash flooding threats expected to impact multiple regions of Texas over the next several days.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes Disaster District (DD) 1, 2, and 7)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties): DDEOC 2 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) under 26-0013 18MAY Severe Weather and remains activated under 26-0019 12JUL Severe Weather.

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): DDEOC 7 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) under 26-0013 18MAY Severe Weather and remains activated under 26-0019 12JUL Severe Weather.

Haskell County: On July 18, Haskell Memorial Hospital reopened with no unmet needs.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

DD 19 – Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata, Counties): DDEOC 19 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties): DDEOC 20 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 19.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24):

Regional flood response operations continue across affected counties following sustained rainfall and elevated river and creek levels. Emergency management partners remain engaged in life safety, incident stabilization, and property protection efforts. Coordinated actions are focused on monitoring flooding impacts, supporting local jurisdictions, managing resource requests, and maintaining situational awareness throughout the region.

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): DDEOC 18 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on July 14. Local jurisdictions continue monitoring flood-prone areas and implementing protective measures where necessary. High-water crossings and secondary roadways remain affected in multiple counties.

Bandera County: Recovery operations continue with county personnel conducting damage assessments and making temporary repairs in areas impacted by flooding.

Bexar County: Bexar County remains in monitoring and recovery posture, with six roadways closed due to low-water crossings, residual flooding impacts, and debris. No significant incidents have been reported by the San Antonio Office of Emergency Management (OEM) or the Bexar County OEM. Bexar County OEM continues to support 24-hour operations at the Freeman Coliseum staging area with personnel.

Frio County: Power outages in Pearsall have been restored, and the county is no longer in flood stage. Repairs are being coordinated for four bridges impacted by flooding.

Gillespie County: County recovery operations continue with coordinated tree debris removal from impacted properties.

Kerr County: The first county office reopens on July 23. The city of Kerrville is warning residents and visitors to stay away from Town Creek and other parts of the Guadalupe River. A sanitary sewer overflow was discovered south of downtown and recent flooding made parts of the area inaccessible, delaying repair operations.

McMullen County: McMullen County EOC has coordinated feeding operations with support from the Corpus Christi Foodbank.

Medina County: The county focus remains on life safety, evacuation support, sheltering, flood monitoring, and public information. TDEM resources and local responders continued assisting threatened residents while operational priorities remained centered on public safety and river conditions.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on July 14.

Dimmit County: Water restoration continues in Carrizo Springs, and a water tanker remains on standby at Dimmit County Regional Hospital to refill the facility's holding tank as needed. One water distribution site was established at the local fire station, and a commodities distribution was conducted by the Laredo Food Bank.

Kinney County: Recovery operations continue for individual and public sector impacts. Current efforts are focused on compiling damage information, cost tracking, and supporting recovery planning. The county library has been designated as the central location for residents seeking assistance with submitting damage survey via Individual State Assessment Tool (iSTAT).

Uvalde County: Uvalde County continues to meet with partner agencies, county and city officials regarding debris management operations.

Zavala County: Recovery efforts continue with floodwater slowly receding, and some areas and roadways remain inaccessible. County officials are monitoring sewer system impacts in Batesville and Chula Vista. County officials will establish an Unmet Needs Committee, comprising voluntary organizations, county leadership, emergency management, and community stakeholders.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 8 – El Paso (Includes Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, and Presidio Counties): [DDEOC 8 returned to Level IV \(Normal Conditions\) on July 22.](#)

DD 9 – Midland/Ft. Stockton (Includes Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler Counties): [DDEOC 9 returned to Level IV \(Normal Conditions\) on July 22.](#)

DD 10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties): DDEOC 10 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 14.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

The State Operations Center (SOC) has activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of this severe weather incident. The SOC is directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM ESF 2 / Communications Coordination Group (CCG) partners are monitoring the situation and continue to prepare resources to respond as necessary.

[All public, private and volunteer sector assets have been demobilized except for Starlink, Land Mobile Radios \(LMR\), and a Low Earth Orbit Cellular Tower \(LCT\) and system enhancements.](#)

[The Hill Country Telephone Coop continues restoration efforts resulting from the flooding event which impacted communications infrastructure across the Texas Hill Country. Progress has been made over the past few days, including restoration of several major network facilities and commercial power to multiple locations. Restoration of service is nearly complete. Remaining impacts center around pole owner restorations and moving from temporary repairs to permanent.](#)

ESF-5 Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

The TDEM ISTF has 36 members deployed to areas of the state affected by severe weather and flooding. There are 17 ISTF members currently enroute to Freeman Coliseum in San Antonio.

Texas A&M University Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (TAMU-CVM):

On July 18, the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (TAMU VET) Type 3 Veterinary Medical Support team repositioned from Kerrville to Raymondville High School. TAMU VET has 12 vet members and support equipment supporting search and rescue canines in the field. Canine teams are on standby for flooding issues as waters continue down the river basin, while most work is water rescue and not canine search. The team has answered two queries from different handlers about their canines-no requests for TAMU VET services.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):

On July 22, multiple resources changed locations in anticipation of the effects from Tropical Storm Bertha. Floodwater in the Frio and Nueces rivers continues downstream, and resources remain in areas where problems may arise.

There have been no requests for service over the last 24 hours. Total contacts include 44 rescues, 117 human/pet evacuations, and 17 shelter-in-place.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 2 (TEEX/TX-TF2): On July 15, TX-TF2 assessed minor tornado damage in Bexar County. On July 13, TXTF2 activated a Type 3 WC US&R.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service – Public Works Team (TX-PWRT):

On July 22, TX-PWRT assisted Carrizo Springs in flushing the water system and checking chlorine levels and residuals to ensure safe water for the city.

On July 21, TX-PWRT in Carrizo Springs helped to install a portable pump and generator at the Ivy Booster Station. The team met with city and state personnel at the EOC, flushed hydrants to obtain chlorine residuals, and assessed for any potential water leaks.

On July 19, TX-PWRT staged at Freeman Coliseum was requested to respond to Carrizo Springs. The team found that the floodwaters are slowly receding, leaving the Ivy booster station still inaccessible. Recommendations for water distribution solutions are being reviewed with the locals and TDEM. TX-PWRT continues to staff the SOC and communicate with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) on the status of water systems.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

As of July 20, TAMFS has 10 Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) All

Hazard (AH) Strike Teams assigned.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

AgriLife has the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) unit monitoring the weather situation from the flooding in South and Southwest Texas. Weather information has been pushed out, and contact has been made with officials in affected counties. County Extension Agents (CEA) and DAR Specialists are actively monitoring the weather situation and communicating with clientele to move livestock out of low-lying areas and to provide guidance on how to report AgSTAT damages.

On July 18, AgriLife demobilized at end of shift from DDEOC 24 for ESF 11 representation. CEAs and DAR Specialists continue to monitor the weather and flood situation. They are working with USDA and clientele to assess agricultural damage as soon as it is safe to do so. Specialists and CEAs continue to promote iSTAT damage reporting across affected counties.

There were [81](#) entries from the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal from landowners with agricultural damage to fencing, crops, livestock and equipment, and [31](#) of those are requesting assistance from the AgriLife Extension Service. CEAs in those affected counties will be notified to contact the requesting landowners to provide relief assistance.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC):

TABC has Enforcement Agents prepared to respond to areas affected by severe weather conditions. TABC has one liaison at the SOC and 35 Agents on available.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has placed emergency management staff and emergency response hazmat contractors on heightened readiness for possible deployment to assist with any air/water/waste related issues including drinking water/wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities.

[As of July 22](#), TCEQ is tracking [two](#) drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) serving a population of [6,480](#).

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

DPS continues to support statewide response operations related to the severe weather impacting portions of Texas. Resources have been identified and strategically positioned across the affected areas for rapid deployment, including Tactical Marine

Unit (TMU) swift water rescue boat teams, Aviation Operations helicopters hoist capabilities, and Special Operations Group (SOG) Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) teams.

As of July 22, Texas DPS Highway Patrol (THP) is providing staffing at EOCs in New Braunfels and Cotulla. One THP sergeant and nine troopers are patrolling roadways day/evening shifts in New Braunfels. In Cotulla, 12 troopers are assisting with road closures. THP had a five-member team attached to Tennessee Task Force 1 to support welfare checks and provide translations services in flood threatened areas.

DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) operators are conducting river surveys and recon of water flow in La Salle County.

Total contacts for this incident include 145 rescues and 80 evacuations.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) (Texas Emergency Medical Task Force):

DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Partial Activation and is actively monitoring and supporting severe weather operations. DSHS will continue active SOC LNO coverage beginning July 14.

On July 21, DSHS disseminated the Post Severe Weather Mosquito Abatement Technical Guidance document that outlines requirements needed to be met for DSHS to provide state support to jurisdictions. Dimmit Regional Hospital is operating at 100% with no water-related disruptions. Municipal water service was restored last night in Carrizo Springs. Fresenius Medical Care in Carrizo is still on backup water with 2x 6,000 gal tankers dedicated to resupplying their system and reports no unmet needs.

As of July 19, Consumer Protection Division Food and Drug Branch is deploying additional sanitarians to help with retail food inspection operations for parts of the state with no local health jurisdiction.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of emergency weather response operations on July 14. HHSC has activated its ice, water, and freight contracts to provide incident support.

As of July 19, no additional long-term care facilities have been evacuated.

As of July 16, one assisted living facility and two intermediate care facilities in the Uvalde area have evacuated due to weather impacts. Surveyors check in with all impacted facilities daily to assess status and identify unmet needs. There are no unmet needs.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

As of July 19, the TxDOT EOC has transitioned from in-person to virtual/on call status; EM staff continue to closely monitor. TxDOT continues to staff the SOC during this activation.

TxDOT is reporting 21 state-maintained road segment closures located across the Central and South Texas flood-impacted counties, with six closed from damage caused by flooding. Additionally, TxDOT is reporting 10 state-maintained roadways impacted by floodwater on the roadways.

Laredo District has shifted to assessment and repair as waters recede. TxDOT crews continued monitoring the rise of the Nueces River. FM/RM roadways remain closed/affected.

San Antonio District TxDOT crews will continue to perform debris removal and general cleanup as water continues to recede. Multiple Emergency Maintenance Contracts are under development including FM481, SH127, and FM2690 in Uvalde County and SH16, SH27, SH39, FM1338, and FM394 in Kerr County.

Austin District is working on damage assessments, debris removal and roadway repair as water recedes.

San Angelo District TxDOT crews completed more pavement repairs and cleared debris from locations as water receded. RM189 remains closed due to high water at low water crossings and a low water crossing on FM2092 and FM385.

TxDOT's Emergency Hazmat Contractor is working on plans to remove fiberglass tanks that dislodged and floated in the US-277 bridge channel in Sutton County.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

As of July 22, UAS Game Wardens are being repositioned due to expiration of Temporary Flight Restrictions (TFR) and will remain available.

On July 21, Texas Game Wardens continued to support the communities of Tilden and

Cotulla with drone support for flood and damage assessments.

On July 20, Game Wardens continued resource coordination and staffing support at the McMullen, La Salle, and the Comal County Regional EOC.

On July 19, TPWD fulfilled multiple requests for UAS support in La Salle County for aerial imagery of river flooding and affected zones. Game Wardens responded to landowner requests and assisted in relocating cattle from flooded areas to higher ground. Game Wardens deployed vessels to herd and move the livestock.

As of July 18, Game Wardens and Game Warden Search and Rescue Boat teams have responded to numerous calls for service in affected communities. Contacts have included residents needing rescue and evacuation from flooded homes, vehicles submerged in floodwater and swept off roadways. Texas Game Warden SAR Boat Teams are working closely with Task Force personnel to coordinate response efforts and meet ongoing operational needs. Boat Teams helped gather supplies at Walmart for delivery to a local shelter utilizing vessels for delivery in Uvalde.

Game Warden Aviation helicopter crews rescued a man from swift water flooding by hoisting him to safety outside his home. During the same response, the aviation team also hoisted fellow first responders from a flooded area to ensure their safety. In addition, Game Warden Search and Rescue boat teams conducted three separate rescue operations, evacuating two adults and one child from flooded areas.

To date, TPWD has assisted in 154 rescue operations, 92 evacuations including five pets, and 27 shelter-in-place orders for this response.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

TMD has activated one Battalion Mission Command (BNMC), two General Support Unit Headquarters (+) (GSUHQ+), six General Support Unit Hybrids (GSU-H), and three Ground Transportation Platoons (GTP) in support of our State Agency partners at Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM). TMD has activated four Rotary Wing Medium (RWM), one Rotary Wing Heavy (RWH), a TF Aviation Battalion Mission Command (BNMC), and a Tactical Air Control Party-TRE Response (TACP-TRE) MRPs in support of our State Agency Partner TX-TF1. TMD has activated four TETN Teams and one MDC/LNO. TMD has activated 373 personnel, 93 vehicles, and 10 rotary wing aircraft.

To date, TMD has assisted in 19 rescue operations and 61 evacuation operations

totaling 185 persons assisted and 22 pets.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

The TXCC is monitoring the weather situation and is ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. There are no cyber threats related to this event.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC):

The ARC has established a Level 2 Disaster Relief Operation (DR 546-27) for this response.

On July 19, ARC initiated coordination with The Salvation Army to support feeding operations at the Uvalde County Fairplex. Engaged local partners in preparedness planning for the potential transition to long-term sheltering operations. Through RC Respond, received 74 client assistance requests to date. The majority of requests involve cleanup kits, muck-out support, and financial assistance needs.

ARC has two open shelters: Uvalde County serving 14 clients and La Salle County serving 0 clients.

ARC has a representative assigned to the Uvalde County EOC. Damage assessments have begun in Uvalde, Kendall, and Kerr counties. Field teams have completed 330 assessments.

The Salvation Army:

In response to the major storm impacting Central and South Texas, The Salvation Army is supporting shelter feeding as requested across the area and evaluating conditions to begin service in affected areas as requested.

On July 21, the Salvation Army had their last day in service in Kerr County. The Salvation Army distributed 8,136 meals, 7,415 drinks, and 6,791 snacks across Uvalde, Zavala and Kerr Counties.

Texans On Mission (TXM):

TXM has responded to the flooding that took place in Central & Southwest Texas this past week. The main operations site was opened in Trinity Baptist Church, Kerrville on July 20 with a full IMT, shower/laundry, feeding, box unit, asset protection and two flood

recovery teams followed by a 3rd team on July 23. A satellite site will open in Uvalde on July 21 with a site coordinator, feeding, laundry and one flood recovery team and in Boerne on July 22 with a site coordinator, shower/laundry, feeding and one flood recovery team. Assessors are at all three locations. The box team has been handing out boxes and visiting with homeowners. We have received over 160 total homeowner requests with more coming in. To date, totals include 31 assessments and 447 volunteer hours.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) Disaster Relief:

SBTC Disaster relief has responded to the flooding occurring in Southwest Texas. SBTC have prepared 7,494 meals, 227 emotional and spiritual care contacts, provided 49 showers, completed six loads of laundry, and served 1,070 volunteer hours.
