STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: On July 24, Gov. Abbott visited Cotulla to assess flood damage and provide an update on the state's response to the recent severe flooding. During the visit, he credited local officials, first responders, volunteers, and residents for their swift actions, saying their efforts helped save lives. Additionally, Texas is requesting the addition of 30 counties to its Major Disaster Declaration request for FEMA Individual Assistance.

On July 22, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) received federal approval to extend the time Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients can apply for replacement benefits for food lost or destroyed by recent flooding.

On July 20, Gov. Abbott surveyed flood-damaged communities by helicopter and provided an update during a press conference in Kerrville on Texas' ongoing response to severe floods that impacted large parts of the state last week.

On July 17, Gov. Abbott requested a Presidential Disaster Declaration to support Texas' ongoing response and recovery efforts following severe weather and flooding impacting communities across the state. Gov. Abbott also visited Uvalde County to receive

updates on flood conditions, survey damage, and meet with state and local officials coordinating the local response. This was followed by the Governor holding a press conference in the City of Uvalde.

On July 16, Gov. Abbott held a severe weather briefing and press conference at the State Operations Center in Austin to provide an update on the state's ongoing response to flooding across Texas. Response efforts continue while coordinating with local partners to provide assistance where it is needed most.

On July 14, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster declaration for 59 Texas counties as severe storms continue to threaten the state. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant. The Governor also directed the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to continue 24-hour operations at Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's ongoing response to severe storms and flash flooding.

On July 12, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate state emergency response resources ahead of severe weather and flash flooding threats expected to impact multiple regions of Texas over the next several days.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes Disaster District (DD) 1, 2, and 7)

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties): DDEOC 2 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) under 26-0013 18MAY Severe Weather and remains activated under 26-0019 12JUL Severe Weather.

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): DDEOC 7 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) under 26-0013 18MAY Severe Weather and remains activated under 26-0019 12JUL Severe Weather.

Haskell County: On July 18, Haskell Memorial Hospital reopened with no unmet needs.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

Region 5 continues recovery and response operations. State, federal, and mutual aid resources remain deployed to support affected counties. Nebraska TF-1 is staged in Live Oak County and Texas TF-2 is staged in Nueces County. The region is primarily facing flood waters impacting rivers and lakes. The region has set up five shelter locations as needed within Live Oak County.

DD 19 – Laredo (Includes Jim Hogg, Starr, Webb, and Zapata, Counties): DDEOC 19 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties): DDEOC 20 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 19.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24):

Region 6 continues recovery and response operations. State and federal resources remain deployed to support affected counties. Floodwaters have receded in many locations, while recovery operations, damage assessments, infrastructure inspections, and assistance requests remain ongoing. Some downstream river areas continue to experience elevated water levels and residual flood impacts.

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): DDEOC 18 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on July 14. Flooding affected multiple river basins and watersheds across Southwest and South-Central Texas, resulting in road closures, high-water rescues, infrastructure damage, and prolonged recovery operations. State and local agencies continue coordinating response efforts focused on: Protection of life and property, emergency sheltering operations, damage assessment activities, restoration of critical infrastructure, emergency communications support, and coordination of state and federal assistance programs.

Bandera County: Recovery operations continue with county personnel conducting damage assessments and making temporary repairs in areas impacted by flooding.

Bexar County: Floodwaters have largely receded. Recovery efforts, infrastructure inspections, and damage assessments remain ongoing throughout the county.

Frio County: There was no significant damage due to the flood water. Frio County EMC advised that no residents have reported homes being affected by flood water.

Gillespie County: County recovery operations continue with coordinated tree debris removal from impacted properties.

Kerr County: Over 800 damage assessments have been conducted. The Kerr Together Long-Term Recovery Group (LTRG) is working to establish a call center to assist residents.

McMullen County: Flood waters are slowly receding from impacted areas. Major flooding is still in the forecast, and vulnerable persons may require evacuation. Livestock and lowlands continue to be threatened and most roads near the river will become dangerous. In Tilden, local crews closed sections of streets due to road issues from failing storm drains.

Medina County: The county focus remains on life safety, evacuation support, sheltering, flood monitoring, and public information. TDEM resources and local responders continued assisting threatened residents while operational priorities remained centered on public safety and river conditions.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 decreased activation to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 23. DDEOC 24 continues to support flood response activities while monitoring weather forecasts, river conditions, infrastructure impacts, and resource requirements. Coordination with local, state, and regional partners remains ongoing to ensure timely support and effective response operations.

Dimmit County: Water restoration continues in Carrizo Springs, and a water tanker remains on standby at Dimmit County Regional Hospital to refill the facility's holding tank as needed. All palletized water has been offloaded from semi-trailers, and the trailers will return to the Freeman Coliseum staging area.

Kinney County: Recovery operations continue for individual and public sector impacts. Current efforts are focused on compiling damage information, cost tracking, and supporting recovery planning. The county library has been designated as the central location for residents seeking assistance with submitting damage surveys via Individual State Assessment Tool (iSTAT). A Public Damage Assessment (PDA) team met with the Kinney County team and conducted assessments.

Uvalde County: Uvalde County continues to meet with partner agencies, county and city officials regarding debris management operations.

Zavala County: Recovery efforts continue with floodwater slowly receding, and some areas and roadways remain inaccessible. County officials are monitoring sewer system impacts in Batesville and Chula Vista. County officials will establish an Unmet Needs Committee, comprising voluntary organizations, county leadership, emergency management, and community stakeholders.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 8 – El Paso (Includes Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, and Presidio Counties): DDEOC 8 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 9 – Midland/Ft. Stockton (Includes Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler Counties): DDEOC 9 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties): DDEOC 10 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 14.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

The State Operations Center (SOC) has activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of this severe weather incident. The SOC is directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM ESF 2 / Communications Coordination Group (CCG) partners are monitoring the situation and continue to prepare resources to respond as necessary.

As of July 23, the Texas Department of Public Safety (TXDPS) is providing hand-held Public Safety Radios to support operations at the Uvalde EOC. Bexar County is also providing Land Mobile Radio (LMR) radios to support radio cache operations being conducted at the Uvalde EOC.

All public, private and volunteer sector assets have been demobilized except for Starlink, Land Mobile Radios (LMR), and system enhancements.

The Hill Country Telephone Coop continues restoration efforts resulting from the flooding event which impacted communications infrastructure across the Texas Hill Country. Progress has been made over the past few days, including restoration of several major network facilities and commercial power to multiple locations. Restoration of service is nearly complete. Remaining impacts center around pole owner restorations and moving from temporary repairs to permanent.

ESF-5 Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

The Incident Support Task Force is continuing to monitor statewide situations to support regional needs. An availability poll was sent out to collect member availability, and ISTF members from around the state were deployed to the counties affected by the July severe weather. ISTF regional staff have been rostered to manage membership strike teams.

Texas A&M University Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (TAMU-CVM):

On July 18, the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (TAMU VET) Type 3 Veterinary Medical Support team repositioned from Kerrville to Raymondville High School. TAMU VET has 12 vet members and support equipment supporting search and rescue canines in the field. Canine teams are on standby for flooding issues as waters continue down the river basin, while most work is water rescue and not canine search. The team has answered two queries from different handlers about their canines-no requests for TAMU VET services.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):

On July 23, all remaining EMAC Swift Water Rescue (SWR) boat squads, and the Type 3 Water Capable (WC) Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) teams from Colorado, Missouri, and Tennessee were demobilized.

Over the last 24 hours resources assisted 9 people and 5 animals. Total contacts include 44 rescues, 135 human/pet evacuations, and 17 shelter-in-place.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 2 (TEEX/TX-TF2): On July 15, TX-TF2 assessed minor tornado damage in Bexar County. On July 13, TXTF2 activated a Type 3 WC US&R.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service – Public Works Team (TX-PWRT):

As of July 25, TX-PWRT has one (1) team deployed to Carrizo Springs. One (1) member is deployed to Kerrville. PWRT is working through requests for the City of Cotulla on wastewater lift stations. PWRT continues to staff the SOC and communicate with TCEQ on the status of water & wastewater systems.

On July 24, TX-PWRT has one (1) team deployed to Carrizo Springs, offering assistance as the city gets their system back to fully operational. One (1) member of the Carrizo Springs team assessed two (2) lift stations in Cotulla yesterday.

As of July 23, TX-PWRT continued assistance in Carrizo Springs on the chlorine residual tests along with assistance for wastewater lift stations.

As of July 22, TX-PWRT assisted Carrizo Springs in flushing the water system and checking chlorine levels and residuals to ensure safe water for the city.

As of July 21, TX-PWRT in Carrizo Springs helped to install a portable pump and generator at the Ivy Booster Station. The team met with city and state personnel at the EOC, flushed hydrants to obtain chlorine residuals, and assessed for any potential water leaks.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

On July 23, TAMFS and Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) demobilized all resources except for one TIFMAS All Hazard (AH) Strike Team and one Type 1 Engine.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

AgriLife has the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) unit monitoring the weather situation from the flooding in South and Southwest Texas. Weather information has been pushed out, and contact has been made with officials in affected counties. County Extension Agents (CEA) and DAR Specialists are actively monitoring the weather situation and communicating with clientele to move livestock out of low-lying areas and to provide guidance on how to report AgSTAT damages.

There were [126 entries](#) from the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal from landowners with agricultural damage to fencing, crops, livestock and equipment, and [46](#) of those are requesting assistance from AgriLife. CEAs in those affected counties will be notified to contact the requested landowners to provide relief assistance.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC):

TABC has Enforcement Agents prepared to respond to areas affected by severe weather conditions. TABC has one liaison at the SOC and 35 Agents on available.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has placed emergency management staff and emergency response hazmat contractors on heightened readiness for possible deployment to assist with any air/water/waste related issues including drinking water/wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities.

As of July 25, TCEQ is tracking two drinking water systems that are on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) serving a population of 6,480. [TCEQ has approved 4 TDMS sites.](#)

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

DPS continues to support statewide response operations related to the severe weather impacting portions of Texas. Resources have been identified and strategically positioned across the affected areas for rapid deployment, including Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) swift water rescue boat teams, Aviation Operations helicopters hoist capabilities, and Special Operations Group (SOG) Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) teams.

On July 22, Texas DPS Highway Patrol (THP) is providing staffing at EOCs in New Braunfels and Cotulla. One THP sergeant and nine troopers are patrolling roadways day/evening shifts in New Braunfels. In Cotulla, 12 troopers are assisting with road closures. THP had a five-member team attached to Tennessee Task Force 1 to support welfare checks and provide translations services in flood threatened areas.

DPS Tactical Marine Unit (TMU) operators are conducting river surveys and recon of water flow in La Salle County.

Total contacts for this incident include 145 rescues and 80 evacuations.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) (Texas Emergency Medical Task Force):

DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Increased Readiness and is actively monitoring and supporting severe weather operations. DSHS will continue active SOC LNO coverage beginning July 14.

As of [July 25](#), DSHS CPD Food and Drug sanitarians [have completed calling all](#) 232 food, drug, and medical device firms that have been identified in the impacted areas. Of all the contacts, [30](#) firms have been determined to need onsite visits. [These onsite visits are expected to be completed over the next several days.](#)

As of July 23, DSHS Consumer Protection Division (CPD) Food and Drug program has 12 sanitarians on standby to support Public Health Region (PHR) recovery efforts. DSHS Social Media Team posted flood recovery messaging and generator safety usage tips across all DSHS platforms (Facebook, X, and Instagram). DSHS Public Information Officer (PIO) responded to a media inquiry on Wednesday about post-flood hazards and precautions people can take during cleanup.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of emergency weather response operations

on July 14. HHSC has activated its ice, water, and freight contracts to provide incident support.

As of July 16, one assisted living facility and two intermediate care facilities in the Uvalde area have evacuated due to weather impacts. Surveyors check in with all impacted facilities daily to assess status and identify unmet needs. There are no unmet needs.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

As of July 19, the TxDOT EOC has transitioned from in-person to virtual/on call status; EM staff continue to closely monitor. TxDOT continues to staff the SOC during this activation.

TxDOT is reporting 21 state-maintained road segment closures located across the Central and South Texas flood-impacted counties, with six closed from damage caused by flooding. Additionally, TxDOT is reporting 10 state-maintained roadways impacted by floodwater on the roadways.

Laredo District has shifted to assessment and repair as waters recede. TxDOT crews continued monitoring the rise of the Nueces River. FM/RM roadways remain closed/affected.

San Antonio District TxDOT crews will continue to perform debris removal and general cleanup as water continues to recede. Multiple Emergency Maintenance Contracts are under development including FM481, SH127, and FM2690 in Uvalde County and SH16, SH27, SH39, FM1338, and FM394 in Kerr County.

Austin District is working on damage assessments, debris removal and roadway repair as water recedes.

San Angelo District TxDOT crews completed more pavement repairs and cleared debris from locations as water receded. RM189 remains closed due to high water at low water crossings and a low water crossing on FM2092 and FM385.

TxDOT's Emergency Hazmat Contractor is working on plans to remove fiberglass tanks that dislodged and floated in the US-277 bridge channel in Sutton County.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

On July 23, Game Wardens reported assisting residents in La Salle and McMullen

counties impacted by the flooding with livestock and pet evacuations totaling 25 cattle and six pets.

As of July 21, Texas Game Wardens continued to support the communities of Tilden and Cotulla with drone support for flood and damage assessments.

To date, TPWD has assisted in 154 rescue operations, 92 evacuations including 407 pets and livestock, and 27 shelter-in-place orders for this response.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

TMD has activated 286 personnel, 73 vehicles, and 8 rotary wing aircraft.

To date, TMD has assisted in 19 rescue operations and 62 evacuation operations totaling 305 persons assisted and 25 pets.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

TXCC is monitoring the weather situation and is ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. There are no cyber threats related to this event.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

TDA maintains the Hay and Feed Hotline, a service for donating or requesting hay and other livestock feed resources, at (877) 429-1998. TDA also offers the AgriStress Helpline, offering confidential, professional mental health support to anyone seeking assistance at any time, at (833) 897-2474.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)

American Red Cross (ARC):

The ARC is conducting Accelerated Outreach at 3 DAC locations to connect disaster with survivors, identify unmet needs, provide recovery information, and assist with registration for potential Immediate financial assistance through in-person support and outreach teams.

Beginning Monday (27Jul - 15Aug), The ARC will begin Focused Outreach, conducting targeted follow-up with identified impacted households that have not responded to digital outreach efforts. Casework teams will support registration, connect survivors with available resources and determine eligibility for potential financial assistance. Additional assistance may be available for households facing the greatest barriers, resources permitting.

Operations – Zavalla County Judge and Emergency Manager requested a shelter be opened for a family that has suffered damage to their home. The DRO opened the shelter tonight. Judge has confirmed that the clients have new housing that they are scheduled to move into on Monday, July 27, we will continue to shelter this weekend.

The ARC has established a Level 2 Disaster Relief Operation (DR 546-27) for this response.

ARC has one open shelter: [Zavala County serving 2 clients](#).

ARC has a representative assigned to the Uvalde County EOC. Damage assessments have begun in Uvalde, Kendall, and Kerr counties. Field teams have completed 330 assessments.

The Salvation Army:

In response to the major storm impacting Central and South Texas, The Salvation Army is supporting shelter feeding as requested across the area and evaluating conditions to begin service in affected areas as requested.

As of July 25, The Salvation Army has distributed a total of [14,447 meals, 13,131 drinks, and 11,211](#) snacks across Uvalde, Zavala and Kerr Counties.

Texans On Mission (TXM):

As of July 23, TXM continues to assess homeowner requests for flood recovery assistance. The Kerrville site is operating at full capacity with three flood recovery teams. Crosspoint Church and Highland Park Church are scheduled to send 53 volunteers over the next two days to support flood recovery efforts, with rebuild leaders assisting the group. Almost 1,800 boxes have been handed out. Kerrville has processed 138 requests with 84 remaining. Uvalde has processed 55 requests with 32 remaining. Boerne has processed 35 requests with 19 remaining. In total, 228 requests have been received and processed. To date, totals include: 576 meals, 131 assessments, 40 hours heavy equipment usage, 73 laundry loads, 106 showers, and 2,605 volunteer hours.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) Disaster Relief:

SBTC Disaster relief has responded to the flooding occurring in Southwest Texas. As of July 25, SBTC have prepared [11,100 meals](#), 501 emotional and spiritual care contacts, provided 100 showers, completed 33 loads of laundry, and served 1,730 volunteer hours.
