STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The Texas State Emergency Operations Center remains activated at Level II (Escalated Response) to support local flood response operations as flood threats continue [across South Texas and recovery efforts remain ongoing across Southwest and South-Central Texas](#). Personnel continue to coordinate requests from local officials for the appropriate phase of the disaster. Recovery staff continue to engage on clean up assistance, and personnel are connecting affected Texans with available resources. Staff across the state continue to encourage impacted individuals to report damage online at damage.tdem.texas.gov.

On July 24, Gov. Abbott [visited Cotulla](#) to assess flood damage and provided an update on the state's response to the recent severe flooding. During the visit, he credited local officials, first responders, volunteers, and residents for their swift actions, saying their efforts helped save lives. Additionally, Texas requested the addition of 30 counties to its Major Disaster Declaration request for FEMA Individual Assistance.

On July 22, Governor Greg Abbott [announced](#) that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) received federal approval to extend the time Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients can apply for replacement benefits for food lost or destroyed by recent flooding.

On July 20, Gov. Abbott [surveyed flood-damaged communities](#) by helicopter then provided an update during a press conference in Kerrville on Texas' ongoing response to severe floods that impacted large parts of the state last week.

On July 17, Gov. Abbott requested a [Presidential Disaster Declaration](#) to support Texas'

ongoing response and recovery efforts following severe weather and flooding impacting communities across the state. Gov. Abbott also visited Uvalde County to receive updates on flood conditions, survey damage, and meet with state and local officials coordinating the local response. This was followed by the Governor holding a press conference in the City of Uvalde.

On July 16, Gov. Abbott held a severe weather briefing and press conference at the State Operations Center in Austin to provide an update on the state's ongoing response to flooding across Texas. Response efforts continue while coordinating with local partners to provide assistance where it is needed most.

On July 14, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster declaration for 59 Texas counties as severe storms continue to threaten the state. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant. The Governor also directed the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to continue 24-hour operations at Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's ongoing response to severe storms and flash flooding.

On July 12, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate state emergency response resources ahead of severe weather and flash flooding threats expected to impact multiple regions of Texas over the next several days.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes Disaster District (DD) 1, 2, and 7)

As of July 28, Region 1 has one staff member deployed to assist with severe weather and has had a total of 14 members deployed to support the State of Texas and TDEM Regions 5, 6, 7, and 8.

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): DDEOC 1 remains activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) for severe weather.

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties): DDEOC 2 [remains](#) activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) [for severe weather](#).

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): DDEOC 7 [remains](#) activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) [for severe weather](#).

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

Region 5 continues recovery and response operations. State and mutual aid resources remain deployed to support affected counties. As of [July 28](#), per WGRFC The Nueces River is forecasted for Major Flooding impacting Live Oak County and Jurisdictions along or near the Nueces River. Lake Corpus Christi is currently at 32.1% full and is forecast to reach 96% full.

TDEM field staff met with local officials across the counties to emphasize the importance of coordinated communication, information flow, and messaging.

Situational awareness has also been established with the U.S. Coast Guard in Corpus Christi.

[On July 28, a meeting was held with officials from Corpus Christi, Weasley Seale Dam, Jim Wells County, Nueces County, and San Patricio County to address potential impacts on downstream jurisdictions in the event that a water release from Wesley Seale Dam is warranted. A follow-up meeting is scheduled for July 31.](#)

[As of July 28, TDEM personnel continue to assist local partners with messaging coordination, local resource and cost tracking, and advanced planning for potential needs related to damage assessments, debris management, and recovery operations.](#)

[On July 28, TDEM staff and All Hazards Incident Management Team personnel produced mapping and planned flood operations, including land, water, and aerial resources.](#)

[Additionally, TDEM personnel assisted local officials in Live Oak County with public messaging coordination, local resources and cost tracking, and advanced planning for damage assessments, debris management, and recovery operations.](#)

[Additional TDEM personnel are rostered to assist impacted counties in continuing to support local jurisdictions with response and disaster recovery.](#)

[DDCEOC 20 continues to coordinate with local, state, and federal personnel to identify potential needs.](#)

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties): DDEOC 20 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 19. DDEOC 20 operates from 0700-1900 daily.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24):

Region 6 continues recovery and response operations. State and federal resources remain deployed to support affected counties.

The iSTAT assessments have been completed for the following counties within Region 6: Bandera, Dimmit, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, Real, and Zavala. Assessments are being scheduled for La Salle and McMullen Counties; and are ongoing in Val Verde County.

The pSTAT has been completed for Bandera, Dimmit, Gillespie, Kendall, Kinney, Real, and Valverde Counties. Assessments are scheduled for Bexar, Comal, La Salle, and Maverick Counties; and are ongoing for Kerr, McMullen, and Uvalde Counties.

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): DDEOC 18 activated to Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) on July 14. Damage assessments are ongoing for homes, businesses, public facilities, and infrastructure. Response efforts are transitioning to recovery operations.

Bexar County: As of July 29, Bexar County plans to have all damage assessments done this week. The recovery team is at Fair Oaks Ranch doing Damage Assessments and will meet with the City of San Antonio for follow on Damage Assessments. All roadways are now open within Bexar County. Any community needs are being met by the local jurisdiction.

Gillespie County: Gillespie County remains at Level III (Increased Readiness) for in person operations. The County is still deciding how they want to go about handling the remaining sand and gravel Debris. AgriLife is hosting a seminar where agriculture producers can learn more about the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Texas Department of Agriculture to help procure funds for damage sustained from the flood.

Kendall County: The county continues to focus on cleanup and recovery management activities following recent flood impacts. Local debris management operations remain ongoing, including dumpster pickup services for residents as recovery efforts progress.

Kerr County: Kerr County remains at Level III (Increased Readiness) with the operational period being from 8:00 am – 5:00 pm. The Emergency Operations Center is staffed from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on weekdays and staffed from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm on weekends. TxDOT has been removing vegetative debris from their Rights of Way in the county. ISTF has been working with the Kerr Together LTRG on damage reporting. Calvary Church is still open 8:00 am – 5:00 pm as a relief center. The Kerr Together LTRG is assisting with community support and gathering/sharing any community needs that are not being met.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 decreased activation to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 23. Disaster District 24 remains focused on

recovery, damage assessments, resource coordination, and support to impacted local jurisdictions.

Dimmit County: On July 28, the TX-PWRT was on scene to assist in the Ivy-1 well, which tested positive for E Coli and Coliform bacteria. The city must continue flushing/disinfecting operations for an additional week. They have installed a new motor and control panel for Ivy 2. The intent is to submit samples for both Ivy 1 and 2 wells by Thursday for Friday results. The city is lifting the boil water notice but is also maintaining Stage IV water restrictions until the other two wells are cleared. They are currently pumping only from Nelson well which did not sustain any damage/issues from the flood.

Kinney County: As of July 28, recovery activities for both individuals and public jurisdictions are ongoing. Kinney County continues to assess damages while encouraging individuals to submit damage reports. A meeting was held with Fort Clark Springs to provide information about pSTAT and iSTAT submissions. The Kinney County Library still serves as the central location for the public to receive assistance with submitting iSTAT information.

La Salle County: As of July 28, all debris is currently removed from public roadways to allow traffic to pass. A Disaster Assistance Center (DAC) is currently operating at 915 Huddleston St., Cotulla, TX 78014. The following organizations are assisting with DAC: Red Cross, Camino Real, TDEM's Incident Support Task Force, HEB, La Salle County, and the City of Cotulla. Regional and HQ Recovery personnel went out with SBA and FEMA personnel to complete and submit iSTAT entries.

Real County: As of July 28, Camp Wood Crossing roadway is inaccessible. pSTAT activities are being conducted and ongoing. County officials continue to monitor flood impacts with a temporary road having been constructed across a private ranch to provide an evacuation route for impacted residents. The County Judge extended the Disaster Declaration. City of Camp Wood has also submitted Disaster Declaration and its extension to the SOC. The County Judge stated that there are 3 roads that are affecting residents due to the road closures and crews are on site and working the roads to get the residents access to their needs.

Uvalde County: As of July 28, there are two roads that remain closed: RM 334 and FM 481. ISTF teams continue to support the city and county as they work on debris management plans. Public messaging efforts remain ongoing related to long term recovery plans and debris management plans to keep residents informed. Damage assessments will continue as previously inaccessible areas become more accessible.

Zavala County: On July 28, water continued to slowly recede throughout the county. The boil water notice remains in effect for Chula Vista. All lift stations are functional. Sewer systems are backing up in Batesville, as well as 2 sewer line collapses in Chula Vista. The County is expecting more breaks in the forecasted days. ISTF Members are placed at Nutrition Centers in Crystal City and Batesville for any unmet needs and to catch incoming people to input iSTAT Data. As of July 27, the total number of iSTAT assessments completed is 401. A DAC will be in Batesville (245 FM-117, Batesville, TX 78829) and Crystal City (1210 N Seventh Ave, Crystal City, TX 78839). EMTF Strike Team rerouted from Crystal City back to San Antonio. Two ambulances from Carrizo

Springs will back-fill until August 1, and Alpha Transport Services will pick up on August 3. TDEM has a Recovery Coordinator in place in Crystal City to assist local government with cost tracking.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 8 – El Paso (Includes Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, and Presidio Counties): DDEOC 8 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 9 – Midland/Ft. Stockton (Includes Andrews, Borden, Crane, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Glasscock, Howard, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler Counties): DDEOC 9 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 22.

DD 10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties): DDEOC 10 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) on July 14.

As of July 28, all known pSTAT and iSTAT assessments have been completed and entered into the STAT tool. DD 10 will be returning to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 29. Recovery staff will continue to communicate with affected jurisdictions and begin the RFI process. Regional staff who assisted with damage assessments will be returning to duty stations in the morning, July 29th.

Long Term Recovery coordination will continue until all needs are met.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

Grimes County: Recovery Operations continue in Grimes County. The Public State of Texas Assessment Tool (pSTAT) has been completed in the county with estimated damage costs and supporting documentation for state assistance accompanying the assessments.

As of July 27, Region 8 personnel have been deployed to impacted TDEM Regions for assistance.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

The State Operations Center (SOC) has activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of this severe weather incident. The SOC is directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response

operations in affected regions across Texas.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM ESF 2 / Communications Coordination Group (CCG) partners are monitoring the situation and continue to prepare resources to respond as necessary.

On July 28, DPS and the CCG coordinated additional radios to deploy to Live Oak County in the event of flooding from the Nueces River. TAMFS provided one Communication Platform, one Communications Technician (COMT), and one VHF Repeater to Live Oak.

ESF-5 Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

The Incident Support Task Force continues to monitor statewide situations to support regional needs. An availability poll was sent out to collect member availability, and ISTF members from around the state were deployed to the counties affected by the severe July weather. ISTF regional staff were rostered to manage membership strike teams.

Texas A&M University Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (TAMU-CVM):

As of July 18, the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (TAMU VET) Type 3 Veterinary Medical Support team repositioned from Kerrville to Raymondville High School. TAMU VET has 12 vet members and support equipment supporting search and rescue canines in the field. Canine teams are on standby for flooding issues as waters continue down the river basin, while most work is water rescue and not canine search. The team has answered two queries from different handlers about their canines-no requests for TAMU VET services.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):

As of July 28, resources continued their missions within areas of flooding concerns. The WS Fort Worth rescued two people in Uvalde County.

Total contacts among Task Force resources include 52 rescues, 135 human/pet evacuations, and 17 shelter-in-place.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service – Public Works Team (TX-PWRT):

As of July 28

- Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) / Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT) continues to support and coordinate operations from the SOC. PWRT will continue to work with state partners to assess any water/wastewater, utility, or other public works needs.
- TX-PWRT had 1 team of 5 members released from Carrizo Springs. 3 members demobilized, and 2 members joined the team in Cotulla performing bypass pumping operations. 1 member continued assessments of Kerrville's water and wastewater systems today.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS and TIFMAS have one TIFMAS Strike Team (ST) in Live Oak County.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

AgriLife has the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) unit monitoring the weather situation from the flooding in South and Southwest Texas. Weather information has been pushed out, and contact has been made with officials in affected counties.

County Extension Agents (CEA) and DAR Specialists are actively monitoring the weather situation and communicating with clientele to move livestock out of low-lying areas and to provide guidance on how to report AgSTAT damages.

As of July 28, there were 152 entries from the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal

from landowners with agricultural damages to fencing, crops, livestock, and equipment, and 55 of those are requesting assistance from the AgriLife Extension Service. County Extension Agents in those affected counties will be notified to contact the requesting landowners to provide relief assistance.

On July 28, AgriLife has one DAR Specialist transporting the DAR Kennel/Pet Support Trailer to the city of George West to support sheltering operations at the Live Oak County Fairgrounds.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC):

TABC has Enforcement Agents prepared to respond to areas affected by severe weather conditions. TABC has one liaison at the SOC and 35 Agents available.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has placed emergency management staff and emergency response hazmat contractors on heightened readiness for possible deployment to assist with any air/water/waste related issues including drinking water/wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities.

As of July 28, TCEQ is tracking one drinking water system that is on a Boil Water Notice (BWN) serving a population of 5,380. TCEQ has approved 4 temporary debris management sites.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) (Texas Emergency Medical Task Force):

On July 26, DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Increased Readiness and is actively monitoring and supporting severe weather operations. DSHS will continue active SOC LNO coverage beginning July 14. EMTF resources continued 911 system support, SOC and Regional EOC support, and force protection for search and rescue operations.

As of July 28, DSHS Food and Drug Program sanitarians have conducted onsite visits of 27 out of 30 food establishment firms impacted by severe weather and flooding across Uvalde, La Salle, Kerr, Kinney, and Dimmit Counties. Surveillance operations of food establishments impacted by recent flooding in Live Oak County will be conducted by their local Health Department.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of emergency weather response operations on July 14. HHSC has activated its ice, water, and freight contracts to provide incident support.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

Texas Game Wardens have identified statewide resources that are ready to support response operations as needed due to the increased severe weather threat affecting Texas. These resources include swift water rescue boat teams, helicopters with hoist capabilities, and UAS teams.

As of July 28, TPWD Game Wardens have identified personnel and resources and are available to respond to the Live Oak County EOC with the Nueces River flooding threat in the Three Rivers area.

TPWD has assisted in 154 rescue operations, 92 evacuations including 407 pets and livestock, and 27 shelter-in-place orders for this response.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

As of July 28, 69 personnel, 31 vehicles, and two rotary wing aircraft remain activated.

TMD has assisted with 19 rescue operations and 61 evacuation operations totaling 305 persons assisted and 25 pets.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

As of July 28, TXCC is monitoring the weather situation and is ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. There are no cyber threats related to this event.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

As of July 28, TDA maintains the Hay and Feed Hotline, a service for donating or requesting hay and other livestock feed resources, at (877) 429-1998. TDA also offers the AgriStress Helpline, offering confidential, professional mental health support to anyone seeking assistance at any time, at (833) 897-2474.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)**American Red Cross (ARC):**

The ARC is conducting Accelerated Outreach at three Disaster Assistance Center (DAC) locations to connect disaster with survivors, identify unmet needs, provide recovery information, and assist with registration for potential Immediate financial assistance through in-person support and outreach teams.

Beginning Monday (27Jul - 15Aug), the ARC will begin Focused Outreach, conducting targeted follow-up with identified impacted households that have not responded to

digital outreach efforts. Casework teams will support registration and connect survivors with available resources and determine eligibility for potential financial assistance. Additional assistance may be available for households facing the greatest barriers, resources permitting.

The ARC has established a Level 2 Disaster Relief Operation (DR 546-27) for this response.

ARC has one open shelter: Dimmit County, serving 2 clients.

ARC has a representative assigned to the Uvalde County EOC. Damage assessments have begun in Uvalde, Kendall, and Kerr counties. Field teams have completed 330 assessments.

The Salvation Army:

In response to the major storm impacting Central and South Texas, The Salvation Army is supporting shelter feeding as requested across the area and evaluating conditions to begin service in affected areas as requested.

As of July 27, The Salvation Army has distributed a total of 18,705 meals, 18,326 drinks, and 12,245 snacks across Uvalde, Zavala and Kerr Counties.

On July 26, feeding operations in Uvalde and Zavala counties concluded. The Salvation Army Kerrville unit is evaluating needs for continued food service as conditions change.

Texans On Mission (TXM):

As of July 27, TXM continues to assess homeowner requests for flood recovery assistance. To date, totals include: 1,734 meals, 148 assessments, 105 hours heavy equipment usage, 213 laundry loads, 332 showers, and 7,167 volunteer hours.

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) Disaster Relief:

SBTC Disaster relief has responded to the flooding occurring in Southwest Texas. As of July 28, in Uvalde County, SBTC has prepared and served 14,300 meals, 637 emotional and spiritual care contacts, provided 160 showers, completed 67 loads of laundry, and served 2,990 volunteer hours. In Dimmit County, SBTC has provided 2 emotional and spiritual contacts, and served 140 volunteer hours. In Sutton County, SBTC has provided 66 showers, completed 68 loads of laundry, and served 170 volunteer hours.
