STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The Texas State Emergency Operations Center remains activated at Level II (Escalated Response) to support local flood response operations as flood threats continue across South Texas and recovery efforts remain ongoing across Southwest and South-Central Texas. Personnel continue to coordinate requests from local officials for the appropriate phase of the disaster. Recovery staff continue to engage on clean up assistance, and personnel are connecting affected Texans with available resources. Staff across the state continue to encourage impacted individuals to report damage online at damage.tdem.texas.gov.

On July 24, Gov. Abbott visited Cotulla to assess flood damage and provided an update on the state's response to the recent severe flooding. During the visit, he credited local officials, first responders, volunteers, and residents for their swift actions, saying their efforts helped save lives. Additionally, Texas requested the addition of 30 counties to its Major Disaster Declaration request for FEMA Individual Assistance.

On July 22, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) received federal approval to extend the time Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients can apply for replacement benefits for food lost or destroyed by recent flooding.

On July 20, Gov. Abbott surveyed flood-damaged communities by helicopter then

provided an update during a press conference in Kerrville on Texas' ongoing response to severe floods that impacted large parts of the state last week.

On July 17, Gov. Abbott requested a Presidential Disaster Declaration to support Texas' ongoing response and recovery efforts following severe weather and flooding impacting communities across the state. Gov. Abbott also visited Uvalde County to receive updates on flood conditions, survey damage, and meet with state and local officials coordinating the local response. This was followed by the Governor holding a press conference in the City of Uvalde.

On July 16, Gov. Abbott held a severe weather briefing and press conference at the State Operations Center in Austin to provide an update on the state's ongoing response to flooding across Texas. Response efforts continue while coordinating with local partners to provide assistance where it is needed most.

On July 14, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster declaration for 59 Texas counties as severe storms continue to threaten the state. Additional counties may be added as conditions warrant. The Governor also directed the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to continue 24-hour operations at Level II (Escalated Response) to support the state's ongoing response to severe storms and flash flooding.

On July 12, Gov. Abbott directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate state emergency response resources ahead of severe weather and flash flooding threats expected to impact multiple regions of Texas over the next several days.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes Disaster District (DD) 1, 2, and 7)

As of July 28, Region 1 had one staff member deployed to assist with severe weather and had a total of 14 members deployed to support the State of Texas and TDEM Regions 5, 6, 7, and 8.

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson,

Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties): DDEOC 1 remains activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) for severe weather.

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties): DDEOC 2 remains activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) for severe weather. DDEOC 2 is monitoring the weather for heat-related advisories and warnings to ensure district safety.

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): DDEOC 7 remains activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) for severe weather. DDEOC 7 is monitoring the weather for heat-related advisories and warnings to ensure district safety.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19-21)

Region 5 continues recovery and response operations. State and mutual aid resources remain deployed to support affected counties. As of [July 30](#), per WGRFC, the Nueces River is forecasted for Major Flooding impacting Live Oak County and Jurisdictions along or near the Nueces River.

[As of July 30](#), per Water Data of Texas, Corpus Christi Lake is [33.8%](#) full.

TDEM field staff met with local officials across the counties to emphasize the importance of coordinated communication, information flow, and messaging.

Situational awareness has also been established with the U.S. Coast Guard in Corpus Christi.

TDEM personnel continue to assist local partners with messaging coordination, tracking local resources and costs, and advanced planning for potential needs related to damage assessments, debris management, and recovery operations.

TDEM staff and All Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT) personnel are planning for flood operations, including land, water, and aerial resources, and preparing and posturing to support local jurisdictions with requested needs.

[As of July 30](#), three AHIMTs are covering the following areas: one North Team is covering the Three Rivers to the Nueces River at HWY 59, two South Teams are covering from Highway 59 in George West to Lake Corpus Christi, and two Air Assets are staged in Beeville, Texas. A Public Information Officer assigned to the IMT continues to assist local jurisdictions with messaging efforts.

[On July 30](#), the Three Rivers Federal Correctional Institution staff met with the Live Oak County EMC to discuss potential flooding in the area.

[As of July 30](#), County Road (CR) 438 in the Simmons Community area and Tips Park in the Simmons Community area are closed.

On July 29, Live Oak County Emergency Management issued a Voluntary Evacuation for low-lying areas.

As of July 29, a shelter managed by the American Red Cross (ARC) is open at the following location: George West Junior High School Gymnasium.

As of July 29, an overflow standby shelter has been identified at the Three Rivers ISD High School Gym, with a capacity of 105. Service Animals are permitted.

The Incident Support Task Force (ISTF) continues to provide Emergency Operations Center (EOC) support to Live Oak County. Additionally, ISTF continues assisting the County EMC with public messaging coordination, local resource and cost tracking, and advanced planning for damage assessments, debris management, and recovery operations.

DDEOC 20 continues to coordinate with local, state, and federal personnel to identify potential needs. Additionally, TDEM has coordinated aerial assets to support the Live Oak County Judge and Local Officials to observe conditions.

DD 20 – Corpus Christi (Includes Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio Counties): DDEOC 20 remains activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) as of July 19.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24):

The Regional Emergency Operations Center (REOC) 6 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 29. Region 6 continues recovery and response operations along with coordinated efforts with the TDEM HQ Recovery Section. Overall, personnel remain focused on supporting survivors, strengthening local recovery partnerships, and preparing communities for the next phase of recovery.

The Individual State of Texas Assistance Tool (iSTAT) assessments have been completed for the following counties within Region 6: Bandera, Comal, Dimmit, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, [La Salle](#), Real, Val Verde, and Zavala. Assessments are ongoing in Maverick and McMullen Counties.

The Public State of Texas Assistance Tool (pSTAT) has been completed for Bandera, Bexar, Dimmit, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, [La Salle](#), [Maverick](#), Real, Uvalde, and Val Verde Counties. Assessments are ongoing for Comal and Maverick Counties.

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties): DDEOC 18 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 29. Damage assessments are ongoing for homes, businesses, public facilities, and infrastructure. Response efforts are transitioning to recovery operations.

Bexar County: As of July 29, Bexar County EOC is at Level IV (Normal Operations).

Bexar County officials plan to have all damage assessments done this week. The recovery team at Fair Oaks Ranch is conducting Damage Assessments and will meet with the City of San Antonio for follow up on Damage Assessments. All roadways are now open within Bexar County. Any community needs are being met by the local jurisdiction.

Gillespie County: Gillespie County remains at Level III (Increased Readiness) and will return to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 31. Debris management is still the focus of operations. The Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) has filed for the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and Texas Historical Commission (THC) permits for the Gillespie County Landfill authorizing a temporary debris site. The EMC is also looking at filing a possible TCEQ permit for debris burn sites. The Finance ISTF member continues to track and organize the precinct foreman's paperwork for duties and work done related to the flood for possible reimbursement.

TDEM Disaster Finance personnel continue supporting Gillespie County's recovery operations. Current efforts remain focused on providing disaster finance assistance and supporting local financial documentation needs.

Guadalupe County: The Guadalupe County EOC remains at Level IV (Normal Conditions). The County stands at four pSTAT entries, all related to damaged flood sensors. Nine iSTATs have been submitted in Guadalupe County. There are no state or federal resources operating in Guadalupe County.

Karnes County: Karnes County remains at Level IV (Normal Conditions). Debris removal and drainage clearing operations have concluded.

Kendall County: Kendall County remains at Level IV (Normal Operations). The county continues to focus on cleanup and recovery management activities following recent flood impacts. Local debris management operations remain ongoing, including dumpster pickup services for residents as recovery efforts progress.

Kerr County: Kerr County remains at Level III (Increased Readiness). Current ISTF personnel rotate out after July 31. Discussions on debris management are still ongoing and a high priority. ISTF personnel continue to assist with the Kerr Together LTRG with community needs forms, and iSTAT entries. Media and Communications personnel continue to support damage reporting messaging. Discussions with the City of Ingram, City of Kerrville, Kerr County, and state personnel regarding solutions and assessments on wastewater systems are still ongoing and is the newest high-priority item for the County. Road and Bridge personnel are still gathering pictures and videos of damage to County right of ways, and local officials are working on solutions for vehicles found in waterways.

Recovery operations continue in Kerr County with no major operational changes reported. The Kerr Disaster Assistance Center (DAC) served 54 survivors July 30 and will operate July 31 from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm before closing August 1. The Center Point DAC will remain open July 31 from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm and August 1 from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm.

Debris management remains a priority, with a meeting scheduled July 31 with the

Gordon Bridge Department to discuss countywide debris collection, removal strategies, and the safe recovery of stranded vehicles from area rivers. ISTF personnel continue supporting survivor intake, recovery education, rumor control, and managing survivor expectations throughout the recovery process. One additional ISTF member has been requested to continue supporting DAC intake operations, while the remaining ISTF personnel are scheduled to complete operations July 31 and fully demobilize on August 1.

Medina County: Medina County remains at EOC Level IV (Normal Operations). Maintaining Community Lifelines focused on life safety, evacuation support, sheltering, flood monitoring, and public information remain a priority.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Edwards, La Salle, Kinney, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties): DDEOC 24 **remains** at Level IV (Normal Operations) on July 29. DD 24 remains focused on recovery, damage assessments, resource coordination, and support to impacted local jurisdictions. **Currently, DD 24 is still tracking three TXDOT road closures. Another three are damaged, but passable with caution.**

Dimmit County: Dimmit County EOC is currently at Level IV (Normal Operations). **As of July 30, One Nelson well is being operated and powered by a booster pump. One Ivy well came back with positive test results of E. coli. Workers have been advised by TCEQ to continue to disinfect and flush the system. The County will then need to flush for a few days following and send another set of samples for TCEQ testing. The County requests assistance to submit pSTAT entries, and the TDEM CLO will be assisting with this process.**

Kinney County: As of July 29, recovery activities for both individuals and public jurisdictions are ongoing. Kinney County continues to assess damages while encouraging individuals to submit damage reports. The Kinney County Library continues to serve as the central location for the public to receive assistance with submitting iSTAT information.

La Salle County: As of July 30, La Salle County EOC returned to Level IV (Normal Operations). PWRT will continue to monitor lift stations. Pumps are being bypassed to continue operation of lift stations. La Salle County officially closed its DAC at 12:00 pm, July 30, after serving 12 disaster survivors. Prior to closure, the local fire department conducted door-to-door outreach encouraging residents to visit the DAC and complete iSTAT registrations. Remaining recovery supplies will be stored by the county to address future unmet needs.

The Commissioners formally approved the establishment of a Long-Term Recovery Committee, with committee members currently being selected for ratification at the next Commissioners Court meeting. The county has also identified a temporary debris management site and is awaiting TCEQ approval. One ISTF member will demobilize July 31, with remaining personnel scheduled to depart August 1 after completing final paperwork and transition activities.

Maverick County: Maverick County maintains a Level IV (Normal Operations) status.

On July 31, site visits are planned with the Wastewater Department to evaluate manholes that may have sustained damage due to the flooding.

Real County: Real County remains at Level IV (Normal Operations). Throughout Real County, pSTATs are ongoing. A bypass road has been constructed near Hackberry Rd to access Camp Eagle, as well as one at River Rd to access Camp Wood Hills. Camp Wood is still clearing debris inside the city.

Uvalde County: Uvalde County EOC remains at Level IV (Normal Operations). Farm to Market (FM) 481 remains closed and Highway 55 is passable with caution. ISTF teams continue to support the city and county as they work on debris management plans. Public messaging efforts remain ongoing related to long term recovery plans and debris management plans to keep residents informed. Damage assessments will continue as previously inaccessible areas become more accessible. One swift water boat team is still in the Concan area to assist local responders with calls for service. ISTF and TDEM are working with the Long-Term Recovery Group, local officials, volunteer agencies, and community stakeholders. ISTF continues to support the DAC to facilitate recovery resources. The Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) is closed and has transitioned from reception to case coordination. Recovery outlook remains focused on coordinated survivor services.

Uvalde County has largely transitioned from response into long-term recovery operations. Three ISTF personnel are scheduled to demobilize July 31, leaving two members to continue supporting recovery efforts. Housing remains a significant focus, as the American Red Cross may need to reactivate shelter operations due to funding limitations impacting temporary housing. Catholic Charities has assisted approximately 119 housing requests, primarily through Airbnb placements, while additional funding sources are being explored through nonprofit partners. Airbnb has also been asked to provide a statewide overview of organizations currently housing disaster survivors and the expected duration of those placements to assist with long-term housing planning.

The DAC remains operational but is expected to be relocated to a local community college as the current facility is not anticipated to remain open beyond Monday. Debris management planning continues, with the county's debris management plan scheduled for presentation to Commissioners Court August 3. Recovery coordination continues to expand through stakeholder engagement, with additional partners identified to support disaster case management. Catholic Charities has already initiated case management services, and a meeting is scheduled for July 31 to establish a formal case management process and coordinate disaster case management training.

Zavala County: Zavala County EOC remains at Level IV (Normal Operations). FM1433 remains closed to traffic due to flood waters. Discussions are ongoing regarding the DRC location and next steps in the recovery process. The County PIO continues to provide updates to county residents via social media outlets. Meals are still being served at the nutrition center in Batesville. Zavala County is looking to inquire about mosquito control.

The DAC in Batesville and Crystal City served a combined 35 households on July 30; 31 in Batesville and four in Crystal City. Both centers will remain open from 9:00 am to

7:00 pm through August 4, with closures on Sunday. Recovery partners continue supporting operations, including Texas Legal Aid, Camino Real Community Services, Southern Baptist Disaster Relief, and Samaritan's Purse.

Long-term recovery efforts continue to gain momentum through outreach to recruit additional community partners. Progress has also been made in identifying a potential fiscal agent through the Community Foundation of the Texas Hill Country, which now includes Zavala County. Debris management remains challenging due to limited county resources and local participation, requiring continued technical assistance from TDEM recovery staff. Additional regional recovery support is expected to be necessary as local leadership continues developing long-term recovery capabilities.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD 10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties): DDEOC 10 returned to Level IV (Normal Conditions) on July 29.

As of July 28, all known pSTAT and iSTAT assessments have been completed and entered into the STAT tool. Recovery staff continue to communicate with affected jurisdictions and have begun the Request for Information (RFI) process.

Long Term Recovery coordination will continue until all needs are met.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties)

Grimes County: Grimes County has met its disaster threshold for public assistance. Recovery Operations continue in Grimes County. The pSTAT has been completed in the county with estimated damage costs and supporting documentation for state assistance accompanying the assessments.

As of July 30, Region 8 continues to support other regions and have personnel deployed in support of 26-0019.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

The State Operations Center (SOC) has activated to Level II (Escalated Response) in support of this severe weather incident. The SOC is directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

TDEM ESF 2 / Communications Coordination Group (CCG) partners are monitoring the situation and continue to prepare resources to respond as necessary.

On July 28, DPS and the CCG coordinated additional radios to deploy to Live Oak County in the event of flooding from the Nueces River. TAMFS provided one Communication Platform, one Communications Technician (COMT), and one VHF Repeater to Live Oak.

ESF-5 Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

The Incident Support Task Force continues to monitor statewide situations to support regional needs. An availability poll was sent out to collect member availability, and ISTF members from around the state were deployed to the counties affected by the severe July weather. ISTF regional staff were rostered to manage membership strike teams.

Texas A&M University Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (TAMU-CVM):

As of July 18, the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (TAMU VET) Type 3 Veterinary Medical Support team repositioned from Kerrville to Raymondville High School. TAMU VET has 12 vet members and support equipment supporting search and rescue canines in the field. Canine teams are on standby for flooding issues as waters continue down the river basin, while most work is water rescue and not canine search.

The team has answered two queries from different handlers about their canines-no requests for TAMU VET services.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Texas Task Force 1 (TEEX/TX-TF1):

As of July 28, resources continued their missions within areas of flooding concerns. The WS Fort Worth rescued two people in Uvalde County.

Total contacts among Task Force resources include 52 rescues, 135 human/pet evacuations, and 17 shelter-in-place.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service – Public Works Team (TX-PWRT):

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) / Texas A&M Public Works Response Team (TX-PWRT) continues to support and coordinate operations from the SOC. PWRT will continue to work with state partners to assess any water/wastewater, utility, or other public works needs.

As of [July 30](#), TX-PWRT continues to support bypass pumping operations with one team of five in Cotulla.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

As of July 29, TAMFS and TIFMAS have one TIFMAS Strike Team (ST) in Live Oak County.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

AgriLife has the Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) unit monitoring the weather situation from the flooding in South and Southwest Texas. Weather information has been pushed out, and contact has been made with officials in affected counties.

County Extension Agents (CEA) and DAR Specialists are actively monitoring the weather situation and communicating with clientele to move livestock out of low-lying areas and to provide guidance on how to report AgSTAT damages.

As of [July 30](#), there were [163](#) entries from the State of Texas Assessment Tool portal from landowners with agricultural damages to fencing, crops, livestock, and equipment, and [60](#) of those are requesting assistance from the AgriLife Extension Service. County Extension Agents in those affected counties will be notified to contact the requesting landowners to provide relief assistance.

On July 29, the DAR Kennel/Pet Support Trailer is in use in Live Oak County to provide companion animal support and animal sheltering. Agents are monitoring flooding conditions in Live Oak and Nueces Counties.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC):

TABC has Enforcement Agents prepared to respond to areas affected by severe weather conditions. TABC has one liaison at the SOC and 35 Agents available.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):

TCEQ has placed emergency management staff and emergency response hazmat contractors on heightened readiness for possible deployment to assist with any air/water/waste related issues including drinking water/wastewater issues and/or emergency response activities.

As of July 30, TCEQ is tracking zero drinking water systems on a boil water notice (BWN). TCEQ will track any additional BWN as they are identified. TCEQ has approved [five](#) temporary debris management sites.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) (Texas Emergency Medical Task Force):

On July 26, DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at Increased Readiness and is actively monitoring and supporting severe weather operations. DSHS will continue active SOC LNO coverage beginning July 14. EMTF resources continued 911 system support, SOC and Regional EOC support, and force protection for search and rescue operations.

As of July 29, six sanitarians from the Food and Drug programs have completed the onsite visits for 30 food establishment firms impacted by the severe weather and flooding in Dimmit, Kerr, Kinney, La Salle, and Uvalde Counties.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):

HHSC began staffing the SOC in support of emergency weather response operations on July 14. HHSC has activated its ice, water, and freight contracts to provide incident support.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

Texas Game Wardens have identified statewide resources that are ready to support response operations as needed due to the increased severe weather threat affecting Texas. These resources include swift water rescue boat teams, helicopters with hoist capabilities, and UAS teams.

As of July 29, TPWD Game Wardens Search and Rescue (SAR) Boat Teams are monitoring the flooding condition of the Nueces River.

TPWD has assisted in 154 rescue operations, 92 evacuations, and 27 shelter-in-place orders for this response.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

As of [July 30, 39](#) personnel, [11](#) vehicles, and two rotary wing aircraft remain activated.

TMD has assisted with 19 rescue operations and 62 evacuation operations totaling 305 persons assisted and 25 pets.

Texas Cyber Command (TXCC):

As of July 29, TXCC is monitoring the weather situation and is ready to support the state's response efforts. TXCC is using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. There are no cyber threats related to this event.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

As of July 30, TDA maintains the Hay and Feed Hotline, a service for donating or requesting hay and other livestock feed resources, at (877) 429-1998. TDA also offers the AgriStress Helpline, offering confidential, professional mental health support to anyone seeking assistance at any time, at (833) 897-2474.

Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOAD)**American Red Cross (ARC):**

The ARC is conducting Accelerated Outreach at three DAC locations to connect disaster with survivors, identify unmet needs, provide recovery information, and assist with registration for potential Immediate financial assistance through in-person support and outreach teams.

The ARC has established a Level 2 Disaster Relief Operation (DR 546-27) for this response.

As of [July 30](#), ARC has [two](#) open shelters: in Live Oak County, George West Jr High School with a potential capacity of 117; [in Uvalde County, NCS Hampton Inn](#). The ARC has one shelter on standby in Live Oak County. Both shelters in Live Oak County accommodate service animals only. The ARC has coordinated with local restaurants to arrange shelter feeding, along with culturally appropriate food boxes.

The ARC Representative in Kerr and Uvalde Counties continues to attend community coordination meetings and has engaged seven new community partners.

The Salvation Army:

In response to the major storm impacting Central and South Texas, The Salvation Army is supporting shelter feeding as requested across the area and evaluating conditions to

begin service in affected areas as requested.

As of July 27, The Salvation Army has distributed a total of 18,705 meals, 18,326 drinks, and 12,245 snacks across Uvalde, Zavala and Kerr Counties.

On July 26, feeding operations in Uvalde and Zavala counties concluded. The Salvation Army Kerrville unit is evaluating needs for continued food service as conditions change.

Texans On Mission (TXM):

As of July 30, TXM continues to assess homeowner requests for flood recovery assistance. [Two recovery teams remain in Kerr County and one team in Uvalde County. Requests for assistance are beginning to slow down. Kerrville has processed 169 requests with 13 remaining; Uvalde has processed 69 requests with nine remaining. Boerne has completed all 36 requests.](#)

Southern Baptist Texas Convention (SBTC) Disaster Relief:

SBTC Disaster relief has responded to the flooding occurring in Southwest Texas. As of [July 31](#), in Uvalde County, SBTC has prepared and served [15,578](#) meals, [703](#) emotional and spiritual care contacts, provided [245](#) showers, completed [110](#) loads of laundry, and served [3,900](#) volunteer hours. In Dimmit County, SBTC has provided [57](#) emotional and spiritual contacts, [provided 57 showers, completed 33 loads of laundry,](#) and served [230](#) volunteer hours. In Sutton County, SBTC has provided [110](#) showers, completed [122](#) loads of laundry, made [19](#) emotional and spiritual care contacts, and served [260](#) volunteer hours.
