STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: High to extreme wildfire danger continues across northern portions of Texas. The state has experienced new wildfire starts on a daily basis over the past several days. Multiple wildfires remain active across the state and state emergency response resources remain engaged in support of local officials.

On August 25, Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a request from the State of Texas for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the Ross Fire in Palo Pinto and Jack Counties. State and local response personnel are actively engaged in suppression, containment, and public safety operations.

The Texas State Emergency Operations Center remains activated at Level II (Escalated Response) status in support of 26-0001 Wildfire Season 2026.

On August 4, Governor Abbott announced that he directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to activate additional state wildfire response resources in anticipation of increased fire weather conditions in areas of the Texas

Panhandle.

On August 3, Governor Greg Abbott amended and renewed the disaster proclamation related to fire weather.

According to the Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS), August is typically the peak month for wildfires due to hot, dry conditions. Across large regions of Texas, wildfire potential is expected to increase due to dry vegetation, with a heightened concern over the next several days in the Panhandle and North Texas areas.

On July 4, Governor Greg Abbott amended and renewed the disaster proclamation related to fire weather.

On June 7, Governor Abbott amended and renewed the disaster proclamation related to fire weather.

On May 21, Gov. Abbott announced that he directed the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) to request officials from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) join state and local partners in conducting preliminary damage assessments in Panhandle communities affected by recent wildfire activity. These assessments will help determine if the state meets the thresholds for additional federal disaster assistance.

On May 19, Gov. Abbott announced that the FEMA has approved a request from the State of Texas for a FMAG for the Stinky Fire in Potter County, which has threatened homes, damaged property, impacted infrastructure, and prompted local evacuations in the Texas Panhandle.

On May 16, Gov. Abbott announced that FEMA has approved a request from the State of Texas for an FMAG for the Hunggate Fire in Randall County, which has threatened and damaged homes and infrastructure in the Texas Panhandle and forced local evacuations.

On May 8, Gov. Abbott issued a disaster proclamation related to fire weather conditions that began on August 10, 2025, as amended and renewed in subsequent proclamations, certifying that increased fire weather conditions pose an imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property.

On March 18, Gov. Abbott announced that FEMA has approved a request from the State of Texas for an FMAG for the Corner Pocket Fire in Donley County, which threatened and damaged homes and infrastructure in the Texas Panhandle and forced local evacuations.

On February 19, Gov. Abbott announced that FEMA has approved a request from the State of Texas for an FMAG for the 8 Ball Fire that started in Armstrong County and entered Donley County, which has threatened homes and infrastructure in the Panhandle area and has prompted local evacuations.

On February 17, Gov. Abbott directed TDEM to increase the readiness level of the Texas State Emergency Operations Center (SOC) to Level II (Escalated Response) ahead of critical wildfire danger anticipated across portions of the western half of Texas.

On February 15, Gov. Abbott announced that he directed TDEM to activate additional

state wildfire response resources in anticipation of elevated-to-critical fire weather conditions in large areas of South, West, and Northwest Texas.

Operational priorities:

- Protect life and property.
- Support rapid & effective response.
- Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
- Accurately track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

Region 1 (Includes Disaster District (DD) 1, 2, and 7)

DD 1 – Amarillo (Includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties)

Hall County: Prairie Dog Fire burned 21 acres and [is contained](#).

DD 2 – Lubbock (Includes Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum Counties)

DD 7 – Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Taylor Counties): DDEOC 7 maintains Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) status in support of the fire weather threat.

Shackelford County: Chimney Creek Fire burned 154 acres and [is contained](#).

Region 2 (Includes DDs 3, 4, and 22)

TDEM Region 2 staff are actively meeting and working with TAMFS and Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) partners to enhance response and recovery processes within the region with the assistance of TDEM Regions 1, 3, 5, and the Incident Support Task Force (ISTF). Partners from numerous state agencies and external partners are coordination on the response in the field and in the Regional Emergency Operations Center (REOC).

On August 25, a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) was approved for the Ross Fire in Palo Pinto County, spanning into Jack County. As of August 27, there are no mandatory evacuation orders in place in Palo Pinto or Jack Counties, and one shelter remains open in Young County. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is working in coordination with state partners to mitigate road closures around the Ross Fire.

DD 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young Counties): DDEOC 3 maintains Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) status.

DD 4 – Dallas/Ft. Worth (Includes Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise Counties). DDEOC 4 maintains Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) status.

Palo Pinto County: Ross Fire has burned 85,303 acres and is 31 percent contained.

Region 3 (Includes DDs 5, 6, 14, and 15)

As of August 28, Region 3 has been experiencing a gradual increase in fire behavior, with moderate-extreme fire behavior presenting daily and sporadically across all four Districts. Region 3 has two personnel deployed to the Ross Fire in Palo Pinto County. As of August 26, various additional resource were staged in Region 3 from the Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS), Texas Military Department (TMD), and Texas Department of State Health Service (DSHS).

DD 5 – Mt. Pleasant (Includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus Counties). On August 28, DDEOC 5 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) status.

DD 6 – Tyler (Includes Anderson, Camp, Cherokee, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Marion, Panola, Rains, Rusk, Smith, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties). On August 28, DDEOC 6 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) status.

Gregg County: Gregg 7815 Fire burned 0.52 acres and is contained.

Panola County:

- Panola 7781 Fire burned 0.54 acres and is contained.
- Panola 7788 Fire burned 0.2 acres and is contained.

Rusk County: Rusk 7775 Fire burned one acre and is contained.

Wood County: Wood 7771 Fire burned 15 acres and is contained.

DD 14 – Lufkin (Includes Angelina, Houston, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler Counties): On August 28, DDEOC 14 activated to Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions) status.

Angelina County:

- Angelina 7793 Fire burned one acre and is contained.
- Angelina 7798 Fire burned 10 acres and is contained.

Nacogdoches County: Nacogdoches 7803 Fire burned seven acres and is contained.

DD 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, and Orange Counties).

Jasper County: Jasper 7774 Fire burned 0.47 acres and is contained.

Region 4 (Includes DD 16)

DD 16 – Houston (Includes Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharton Counties).

Walker County: Walker 7789 Fire burned 22.55 acres and is contained.

Region 5 (Includes DDs 19, 20, and 21)

TDEM Region 5 staff is actively communicating and coordinating with TAMFS and local jurisdictions to enhance response and recovery processes within the region.

As of August 25 at 8 pm, there are no state-supported wildfires in Region 5.

As of August 25, two Region 5 County Liaison Officers and one Voluntary Agency Liaison are assisting Region 2 on state-supported wildfires.

DD 21 – Weslaco (Includes Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy Counties).

Willacy County: Wildlife Fire burned 14 acres and is contained.

Region 6 (Includes DDs 17, 18, and 24)

DD 18 – San Antonio (Includes Atascosa, Bandera, Bexar, Comal, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, McMullen, Medina, and Wilson Counties)

Atascosa County: Box House Brush Fire has burned 100 acres and is contained.

Gillespie County:

- White Oak Fire has burned 129 acres and is 65 percent contained.
- Dos DuderStadt Fire burned 171 acres and is contained.

Kerr County: Turkey Fire burned 80 acres and is contained.

DD 24 – Del Rio (Includes Dimmit, Kinney, La Salle, Maverick, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties). The Pena Creek Fire has caused an evacuation with one structure lost.

Dimmit County: Pena Creek Fire has burned 238 acres and is contained.

Region 7 (Includes DDs 8, 9, and 10)

DD10 – San Angelo (Includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties)

Edwards County: Whitetail Fire has burned 300 acres and is 20 percent contained.

Sutton County:

- Granger Fire has burned 275 acres and is 80 percent contained.
- West Fork Fire has burned 250 acres and is 10 percent contained.
- 2 Sierra Fire burned 80 acres and is contained.

- BR314 Fire burned 60 acres and is contained.

Region 8 (Includes DDs 11, 12, 13, and 23)

DD 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties).

Leon County: Center Fire has burned 120 acres and is 65 percent contained.

Madison County: Madison 7802 Fire burned 26 acres and is contained.

DD 23 – Killeen (Includes Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills, and San Saba Counties). On August 24, DDEOC 23 has increased to level III-Increased Readiness Conditions.

Coryell County: Yellow Square Fire has burned 221 acres and is 90 percent contained.

Hamilton County: Rio Escondido Fire has burned 2,713 acres and is 85 percent contained.

San Saba County: Keys Crossing Fire burned 10 acres and is contained.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Division of Emergency Management, Texas A&M University System (TDEM):

The State Operations Center (SOC) remains activated to Level II (Escalated Response) status in support of this fire incident. The SOC is directing interagency coordination to maintain unified communication, deploy necessary resources, and support response operations in affected regions across Texas.

ESF-2 Communications Coordination Group (CCG):

The Communications Coordination Group (CCG) partners continue to respond to issues with telecommunications resulting from the wildfire weather impacting the State of Texas.

As of August 28, Communications Unit Leaders (COMLs) from TDEM and TAMFS are supporting the Ross Fire IMT. TDEM has deployed two Cellular Rapid Deployable (CRD), which is a mobile cellular platform. Communications partners have deployed a Cell On Light Truck (COLT) to support increased mobile wireless needs, Push-to-Talk (PTT) resources, and backup generators for cellular tower sites.

Land Mobile Radio (LMR) Operations partners have deployed a Site on Wheels (SOW) to service Public Safety frequency bands.

The Texas Emergency Deployment Response Team (TERT) is providing dispatcher support to the Palo Pinto County Sheriff's Office (SO).

ESF-5 Incident Support Task Force (ISTF):

The Incident Support Task Force has deployed personnel to Palo Pinto and Jack Counties in support of the 26-0021 24AUG Ross Fire response. Deployed personnel are assisting affected jurisdictions with donations management and EOC support. ISTF has 15 members on standby and ready to deploy.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service Public Works Response Team (TX/PWRT):

PWRT continues to support and coordinate operations from the SOC and are monitoring requests for service.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife):

AgriLife is monitoring fire weather conditions and SOC response activity in person for coverage. Disaster Assessment and Recovery (DAR) Specialists and County Extension Strike Team members are on standby to support any efforts associated with animal response or other fire weather response efforts as requested.

An AgriLife representative is activated to TDEM DDEOC 4 for situational awareness. AgriLife has 25 DAR Specialists and four Area Chiefs on standby. As of [August 28](#), AgriLife DAR Specialists and Area Chiefs are engaged in livestock assistance in TDEM Region 2. [All needs are being met.](#)

Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS):

TAMFS has pre-positioned heavy equipment, engines, and aircraft across regions impacted by elevated fire weather conditions. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is activated. A targeted public awareness campaign is being conducted in the Panhandle region to include billboard messaging and outreach through local and regional news media. In total, TAMFS has [590](#) personnel, with [45](#) Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) Single Resource Engines/Tenders, [9](#) TIFMAS Wildland Engine Strike Teams, and a variety of aircraft, engines, dozers, and motor graders committed to this event.

As of [August 28](#), the TAMFS response to the Ross Fire in Palo Pinto and Jack Counties has a total of [146](#) personnel, [68](#) engines, tenders, heavy equipment, and [13](#) aircraft committed to the fire.

Texas Military Department (TMD):

The Texas Military Department (TMD) is supporting TAMFS in suppressing wildland fires throughout the state of Texas.

As of August 27, TMD has activated 29 personnel and four aircraft for this response.

On August 19, TMD activated one Rotary Wing Medium MRP and one Rotary Wing Mixed MRP with crews to include three UH-60s and one CH-47 to provide direct support with aerial fire suppression capabilities in response to ongoing fire weather.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):

Texas Game Wardens have identified resources ready to support as needed in response to the increased wildfire threat affecting the State of Texas. TPWD is working closely with TDEM and other ESF partners through the SOC to ensure resources are available if needed.

Texas Game Wardens have responded to multiple wildfires in TDEM Regions 2 and 8.

As of August 27, TPWD Game Warden Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) teams are supporting local Law Enforcement and TAMFS with situational awareness and hot spot locating for the Rio Escondido and Ross wildfires.

TPWD Aviation teams have two helicopters supporting water drops for the Ross wildfire.

TPWD Game Wardens and Park Police are supporting local Law Enforcement with road closures and evacuations as needed.

TPWD Wildland Wildfire team has deployed two Type-6 Engines to support response efforts with the Ross wildfire.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):

TxDOT works to maintain safe roadways for the traveling public during adverse conditions including wildfires. TxDOT is staffing the SOC and coordinating with TAMFS for ongoing DMS wildfire messaging. Up to date road conditions are available on drivetexas.org.

As of August 28, TxDOT is tracking two state-maintained road closures due to smoke and low visibility from wildfires. The TxDOT Fort Worth district is providing traffic control support and equipment and operators to assist locals in support of the Ross Fire.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):

In response to wildfire activity, DSHS is continuously monitoring wildfires and requests for assistance in the state of Texas. The DSHS State Medical Operations Center (SMOC) is at limited activation and supporting the response. The SMOC is monitoring impacts to healthcare facilities in the impacted area. EMTF resources are supporting wildland fire fighting operations with force protection, evacuation assistance, rescue operations in the local impacted area and resource coordination with the TAMFS.

As of August 27, the Emergency Medical Task Force (EMTF) resources continue to support Texas wildfire firefighting operations in the Texas Panhandle and portions of North, East and South Texas, providing force protection, evacuation assistance and

rescue operations in coordination with TAMFS.

As of August 26, eight Wildland Fire Support (WLFS) Packages are assigned, staged, and are assisting TAMFS throughout the TDEM Regions impacted by wildfires. On August 25, for the Ross Fire, DSHS EMTF has deployed four Wildland Fire Support (WLFS) Packages, and activated two All Hazards Teams (AH), additional Wildland Paramedic Units (WPU), Ambulances, Rapid Extraction Module (REM) Teams, Medical Unit Leader (MEDL), and Medical Incident Support Teams (MIST).

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR):

Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) is monitoring the situation using cybersecurity tooling and threat intelligence feeds. No cyber threats related to this weather event have been identified.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):

The State of Texas Agriculture Relief (STAR) Fund has been activated to support farmers and ranchers affected by wildfires. Ranchers needing hay or feed can use TDA's Hay Hotline at (877) 429-1998. Mental health support is available through the AgriStress Helpline by professionals familiar with rural challenges at (833) 897-2474.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):

In support of the wildfires occurring statewide, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) personnel from the Weatherford and Mineral Wells areas are providing resources to assist fire response. Personnel include the Texas Highway Patrol (THP), Commercial Vehicle Enforcement (CVE), and K-9 Troopers.

As of August 28, DPS THP and CVE officers are assisting with traffic control, road blocks, and roadway patrol to identify and respond to traffic incidents. Radio and communication support through the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) has also been provided at the Ross Fire.

FINAL COMMENTS: The State Operations Center (SOC) is currently operating at Level II (Escalated Response Conditions). The Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) continues to monitor the situation and will provide additional situation reports as needed.

The four levels of SOC activation are:

Level I (Emergency Conditions)
Level II (Escalated Response Conditions)
Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions)
Level IV (Normal Conditions)
